Up the Beacon

No, not this Beacon, but THE Painswick Beacon is to receive the attention necessary after years of erosion and under funding of the area near the top - a point to which so many have made their way over centuries of pilgrimage. Walkers using the Cotswold Way, tribes from ancient times, hill fort occupants, golfers complete with clubs, joggers, horse riders, and so on could not help but cause erosion of the routes they have chosen.

Starting in July next year about £78,000 will be brought to bear on works to repair serious erosion, mainly on the top western rampart, more scrub clearance, hopefully pushing trees back from the north rampart, and introducing some interpretation signage. The funding is £50k from the 'Your Heritage' kitty of the Lottery Fund, £16k Gloucester Environmental Trust, £10k English Heritage, £2.5 English Nature, and modest amounts priming these contributions from this area itself.

Four interpretation boards are envisaged, one of which will be close to the ground at the hill fort itself. Others are likely to be located near the Royal William and the car park close to the Beacon and these, from the Cotswold AONB Trust, will refer to the history, archaeology and flora and fauna of the area.

We discussed these proposals with Nick Russell who is the Countryside Archaeological Adviser based in Shire Hall and he said "We will be returning to consult with all interested parties, including Painswick Parish Council, later this autumn, as we prepare the detail of what is intended". When we enquired about the local interest in the intended removal of the old triangulation point itself, Nick affirmed that he would be very interested in locating a very low level topograph, maybe set in stone, at the summit of the Beacon with or without the removal of the redundant triangulation edifice.

The numerous walkers interested in getting their bearings from Sugarloaf Mountain, Gloucester Cathedral and the mountains closer to Cader Idris on a very clear day will doubtless be delighted when this work is completed, and we and future generations will have a much better idea of yet another aspect of our heritage and the significance of the Beacon.

On the Beacon

Walkers on the Beacon may have noticed the extensive damage done to the turf in many places. A notice in the Golf Clubhouse explains that this is the work of crows who, following an infestation of Chafer beetles, are digging the beetles out of the ground for food.

HGV public meeting

A reminder that, following the agreement at the Annual Parish Meeting, a public meeting has been called to discuss the problem of very heavy goods vehicles which use the A46 through Painswick. County Council officers last week carried out a survey of the number and owners of such vehicles and have been looking at ways in which the problem might be addressed.

They will attend the meeting at 7.00pm in the Town Hall on Tuesday next week, 7th October. The Parish Council hopes that all those with an interest will be able to come.

Shared ownership taken up

Last month, on this page, we were pleased to 'run' an article which explained, for those seeking to get on the housing ladder, how shared ownership works and, in particular, its relevance to the three units currently alongside Stamages Lane. The article urged anyone local who was interested in getting their name on to the Housing Register to do so before Tuesday 16th September.

What we did not say was that the District Council's Housing Manager was previously unable to forward to the Fosseway Housing Association any names of people from around Painswick interested in shared ownership, this because there was no-one on the register with an interest in entering into such a scheme. However, following the publication of the article, the District Council's Rehousing Team received at least six expressions of interest before the closing date. The Council officers have told us how pleased they were with the response and have thanked the Beacon for the publicity we were able to give to the matter.

Over the many years of debate, representations, surveys and reports, all of which indicated to the Parish Council and others that there were needs to be met in the affordability market for rural housing, there has always been a nagging fear that when the time came to receive applications there might be few - if any - people needing such an opportunity. This was because they might well have been forced to find alternative accommodation away from Painswick even though they would have preferred to remain close to friends and family in the village. Well, that theory has been proved wrong, and the proof is there to see.

What we were unable to report last month was the answer to the question 'What happens when the occupier wants to sell and move on up the ladder? Might the property be lost to another aspiring ladder-climber?'

We now have part of the answer from Pippa Stroud of the SDC Housing Department who told the Beacon that "If the person wishes to move on, the Housing Association will look for a new local person who is in housing need".

Elsewhere in this issue a **new bus to Gloucester** (if we bother), **28 years of lunches**, a **lunch experience at the Rococo** and changes in opening, sighting **waterfowl**, the **grants to be claimed**, note **Christmas posting** dates, **Flora** visits, a **word-search** in the kitchen, the **bloom**ing results, replacement **Gloucester bus?**, the **Vodafone mast** for Edge, **Village Quiz** cancelled, some **wildlife** in the garden, **the Centre AGM**, Directory **2004**, **little and large** art classes, Town Hall **floor**.

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to draw attention to those of wider interest, but remind readers that the full minutes of Council meetings are available at the Council office on Wednesday and Friday mornings, as well as Painswick Library.

PLANNING COMMITTEE Mobile phone aerial - Jenkins Farm

The customary 30 minutes set aside for the regular Planning Committee, from 7.00pm prior to the monthly Council meeting, was far from adequate in September.

Although other business was discussed, the majority of the time was given to a single matter - the application submitted by Vodafone to erect a 20m communications mast with 6x antennas extending the height to 22.5m, (74ft.) plus two 300mm dishes; this together with equipment cabins at the base. These are requested for location on land close to the junction of Gloucester Road and Jenkins Lane.

During all discussion Cllr Martin Slinger, the land owner, was excluded from the meeting. Full details of the application were spread across four tables in the Town Hall and have (subsequently) been on display in the upper room of the Town Hall during normal opening hours.

Five Edge residents had been invited to speak at the meeting, John Cahill, John and Carolyn Luke, Stewart Ward and Paul Harris, and this they did. The residents concentrated their comments upon four points, starting with the inadequacy of time or opportunity to prepare local views upon the application, its havbeen publicly notified only in the previous week. Indeed, notice of this meeting of the Planning Committee had been 'posted' in Edge only on that day. It was asserted that the code of

practice urged by the Government requires that all such applications should involve preliminary consultations with the community affected - essentially a process which brings the intentions of operators

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into the public domain at the earliest of stages. The residents pointed out that the Parish Council had received information as far back as February, with further contact in July, and that the Council had written unambiguously to Vodafone's (then) planning agents on 4th August indicating that "The Parish Councillors have been consulted and the majority can accept the proposed Vodafone Base Station being built at/near Jenkins Farm. We hope as much of the pole as possible will be hidden by the trees".

(The actions of the Council before September were unknown to the Beacon, reporting attentively as it does on successive Council and committee meetings. The existence of the 4th August letter only came into the public domain as a consequence of scrutiny of the planning application itself after 4th August!)

Responding to this initial discussion the Chairman Malcolm Watts asserted that the consultation process with Vodafone was no more than that, consultation, and that the Council had "no objection at that time". The formal process began on 5th September, with a closing date for Parish

Council comments by 26th September, extended to 30th. Mr. Watts accepted that notice of the intention to discuss this item had only been posted that day.

Pressed to indicate why the Parish Council had ignored the consultation expected under government guidance PPG8 of 2001 Terry Parker said he understood that such applied to the planning authority itself, Stroud District Council, and not to Parish Councils. The Edge residents were emphatic that this was not the case.

The committee was requested to indicate what

guidelines were in operation where a Ward was represented by only one Parish Councillor, as is the case for Edge; a situation compounded by the fact that the application was for a structure on land owned by that Councillor. Mr. Watts was clear in his response, there are no guidelines in place.

When pressed to explain what led the Parish Council to support the application (their letter of 4th August) Malcolm Watts explained that while he and his colleagues are "not experts, they assume that the phone coverage from such a location would be the best for meeting the needs of Painswick and Edge".

The group proceeded to emphasise that

they considered all guidance concerning such applications as having been disregarded and that there is no evidence of genuine consultation, regard for the impact of the mast upon the Painswick valley, the proximity to the Cotswold Way, the mast dominating views from such as Edge common, the main road (see the photograph montage created on behalf of Vodafone, viewing from a point on the Cotswold Way in the field to the west, and reproduced with their permission) and its extending well above the tree line from most directions.

After this session of the committee concluded, and other business conducted when the residents had withdrawn, the committee returned to the subject of how it would proceed with the formal application. No more was agreed than that the Clerk should, after telephoning all Members, arrange for two or more cars of councillors to move to various locations to assess the impact of the aerial and its attachments from around the valley and within Edge itself. Walling - St.Mary's

The committee decided to take no action towards the developers regarding the stone walling which had given rise to much adverse public comment alongside the Stroud Road.

Reconstruction work - Clattergrove

The committee was reminded that construction work was in progress on land only accessible across Manorial common land at Clattergrove. Members asked the Committee Chairman to refer the matter to Amoury Blow and the SDC Planning Officer.

Conservation Area Management

The Painswick and District Conservation Society's offer to draft a Management Plan for the area was accepted, subject to the Council having the opportunity, in due course, to comment upon its content.

PARISH COUNCIL

The report this month has been abbreviated in order to deal with the extra meeting of the Planning Committee.

Tourism policy

The Council received information about taking out advertising space in the 60,000 circulation of copies of 'Undiscovered Cotswolds', a free publication promoted by the District Council.

Note was taken of the cost of differing spaces use and it was agreed to request a half-page full colour entry in the next issue. It was also agreed to firmly encourage the production of a local leaflet towards the cost of which local enterprises be invited to contribute.

Broadband in Painswick

The Chairman, Terry Parker, urged that it was becoming increasingly crucial that

access to Broadband high speed services be made available in Painswick, not least because home-based businesses and others were disadvantaged relative to businesses elsewhere. Some, he reported, were indicating serious intent in moving house to gain Broadband access, or not purchasing properties here because of its absence. The forecast was that with BT requiring 500 (of the 900) households to indicate interest there was little likelihood of its availability for several years. It was agreed to obtain explanations from BT about the unrealistic number of 500 and use that to notify local residents of the need for their cooperation to advance the

Rugby Club management committee

Martin Slinger reported that all local clubs and the Parish Council were now in full membership of this Broadham based committee.

Speeding traffic on A46

Arising from correspondence and observations it was agreed that overtures be made to such as the developer of the Care Centre asking whether they would sponsor a self-illuminating speed indicator sign, a method of warning drivers of their actual speed at that point.

Tenders: trees on the Rec

Tenders were received for attention to trees in Lower Washwell alongside the Recreation Field. During discussion the Chairman ruled deferment of their consideration while a review of comparability of specification is established.

Tenders: Town Hall floor

Tenders for sanding, sealing and repairs to the lower hall floor were considered and one accepted. The Clerk will seek to arrange works to be very early in the New Year in order to minimise the disruption of existing bookings, some of which will inevitably need to be cancelled.

Shared ownership

This was discussed, and the appreciation of SDC officers of the Beacon article reported. (See follow up on front page.)

Local Government Review

The Council received a report upon proposals of the Boundary Commission suggesting that the County Council Division within which Painswick lies be altered. Among other proposals Upton St.Leonards had be taken from that Division and placed within one which included Eastington, Hardwick and Standish. Painswick had been included in a Division which included Bisley and Over Stroud. Incomprehension was expressed, and discussion was deferred until the next meeting.

Stroud bus station

The absence of a strategic plan for a conveniently located bus station to immediately replace that at Merrywalks whilst a cinema is erected there was a matter of concern and the Chairman will be representing interests at meetings of the

Stroud Valleys Parish and Town Councils. Council web site

The Clerk reported his expectation that the information currently being gathered (comparable to that in the Beacon Directory) would be included in a new Council web site to be 'up' in late October.

PLANNING COMMITTEE 29th September

On 24th September notice of another meting of the Planning Committee to be held on Monday 29th was posted by the Clerk, this solely to consider the minutes of the previous meeting and the "Application for a mobile phone mast to be sited on Jenkins Farm land at Edge". With the cooperation of our printers, and by burning a little midnight oil, we can report albeit briefly upon that meeting.

The Chairman of the Parish Council, Terry Parker, took the chair for the meeting as the Committee Chairman Malcolm Watts was not well enough to participate (sitting apart from all present). The Chairman indicated his intention to receive all representation which Edge residents who were attending wished to make, and firstly invited Vodafone and their (new) agents, FBPSavills, to explain their position.

Space does not permit an exhaustive report, but the essentials appeared to be that many options for locating the aerial had been examined by Vodafone and their advisers and that their consultations with SDC Planning officers consistently encouraged them back to the Jenkins Farm site. The types of aerial required in the immediate and near future were explained, as was the extent of the Painswick valley they hoped to 'cover' for mobile phones and potentially, in due course, wireless video conferencing and 3G coverage including fast access to the Internet. They affirmed that until a few days ago Vodafone were unaware of the number of objectors and apologised (twice) for any inadequacy in what they thought had been a comprehensive consultative process. Questions were put to the Vodafone representatives, including four raised with them in writing prior to the meeting. The height of the mast is determined by the height of the trees; since the location preferred by the planners is within a cluster of trees the mast needs to extend above them. David Hudson enquired as to

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whether two shorter masts within the valley, including one existing, would give the transmission coverage Vodafone required and was informed that such might be a real possibility but research into alternative sites and engineering considerations would require several days to complete.

The Chairman also apologised if there had been any misunderstanding of the actions of the Parish Council. Later in the evening Mr.Parker drew attention to an assumption, as is usual practice with all applications, that the Ward Councillor had informed Edge residents of the existence of the earlier enquiries by Vodafone agents; but it was now realised that this had not happened.

An exhaustive and planning-orientated presentation was made by Carolyn Luke on behalf of many Edge residents backed by copies and a display of photographs made available to all present. Mrs. Luke set out cogent reasons why, apart from erroneous information and addresses throughout the application, she regarded the application to have breached National Policy PPG notes 7&8, Local Plan policies B21, R6, N6 and N8; these included detailed reference to inadequacy of consultation, insensitivity of siting, an independent engineering report that there was no substantiation of the technical assertion, the impact upon views from numerous directions including the closeness to the Cotswold Way. (See also report of previous meeting.) She concluded to loud applause from the many residents present that, in addition to failing to meet the requirements of Code of Best Practice, the "application fails to meet the key elements of the National and Local Plan policies which apply. It must therefore be refused on this basis."

Other views were expressed, including the suggestion of using a position above and to the rear of the Town Hall, before the committee then went into its own formal session. A proposition from David Hudson 'That the Parish Council notify the SDC by the dateline of the following day of its objection to this application, and that this Council would be willing to look at future applications in due course' was seconded. There was discussion as to whether a decision would best be deferred still further pending receipt of the additional research Vodafone offered to undertake. An alternative proposition was put by Malcolm Watts that 'This committee delay its decision until later this week, by which time Vodafone will have provided further information'. The first motion was put, two voting in favour and three against, four abstaining*. The Malcolm Watts motion was carried 5 in favour and 4 abstaining*. (*John Stephenson-Oliver had indicated his intention to abstain, based upon legal advice.)

The meeting concluded with the Chairman thanking all who had taken part.

Rural and Community Scheme for Funding in 2004-05

The Parish Council has received the application pack for Rural & Community Funding in 2004/05 from Stroud District Council.

The Scheme is designed to encourage local communities within the District to bring forward projects that contribute toward achievement within any one of the three categories:

- Environment: To protect and improve the environment, with particular emphasis on the District's green spaces.
- Regeneration: Working in partnership to realize wealth creation, rural and market town regeneration and economic prosperity.
- Community Safety: To reduce crime and the fear of crime.

What Project the Scheme may Support?

At least £100,000 is available to the District Council for investment locally. The aim is to stimulate the development of permanent facilities, which can demonstrate a significant benefit for the local community. For example the development of existing or new community facilities such as village halls, sports grounds or youth shelters or the purchase of equipment for groups and clubs, including playgroups, youth clubs and older peoples clubs. The maximum grant awarded is unlikely to exceed £6000.



Care Centre news

The latest information upon progress towards starting work on the care centre and its associated dwellings has been sought by the Beacon and we discovered that contracts have been agreed and a timetable has emerged. Keith Cockell, Managing Director of Richmond Care, informed us that (as we go to press) letters are on their way to the many local people who have long-term health reasons to be interested in the properties.

Almost all of the design, funding and operating problems have, we were told, been resolved and the first four-month stage involving site access and highway improvements should be well under way before the end of this year. The A46 is to be widened to permit a north-bound right turn 'refuge' as required by the highways experts, and the existing hedgerow and lighting realigned.

During this period contractors will be moving in to commence work on the independent living units, with these becoming available for occupancy between December 2004 and the spring of 2005.

Before the middle of 2004 work will commence on the care centre itself, a significantly more complex, longer and separate contract; the latest estimate for its services coming into full use is late in 2005. Keith Cockell told us that "As further geotechnical and engineering information has been developed in these past months we have realised that we can make greater use



of the basement. A very sophisticated air handling system is to be installed. This needs space, but we will still be able to retain our Wellness Suite including the 15 metre pool". Small changes are inevitable as detailed design progresses but there is to be no alteration in the footprint or the 'above ground envelope' of the care centre as originially approved. The planners require that these changes go through the planning process as additional usable internal space will accrue, and this will be processed soon.

"There will be sixty seven units of graduated nursing care within the centre itself, ranging from one-bedroom units to close care accommodation", Keith Cockell told us, "and all associated services for dining, recreation, and so on." He went on to say "These are exciting times for us, and we are very much looking forward to getting this project under way, on the ground, and its completion and operation. We have had a lot of enquiries from residents in the area and hope to be able to meet those with concerns about how we can meet their care needs before the end of this year, and have an even more accurate timetable of completion dates to share with them."

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Architectural Detectives

We hope that those who enjoyed the first House History Workshop in May held by the Stroudend Tithing Educational Trust are now eager to find out more about more about their houses. Anyone who missed it is encouraged to attend the second workshop. One of the objectives of the Trust is to foster enthusiasm and interest in our local historic buildings.

At the first workshop Dr. Philip Dixon gave us a slide presentation of buildings he had studied and made discoveries about by observation of architectural features. "I don't understand this" is a particularly useful approach to discovering the history of old buildings. He showed examples of many interesting finds including medieval buildings which had been converted to other uses, but which in their roof spaces, or by observation of changes in stonework, revealed their true age. We had opportunity to ask questions of Dr. Dixon assisted by Dr. Beryl Lott, a buildings conservation specialist. Dr. Graham Lott explained the origins of different types of limestone and their appropriate uses in buildings together with problems arising from misuse of cement mortars. In the afternoon we were generously given access to two local houses where we had a practical observation of some of the features we had learned about in the morning.

We are running another workshop on 11th October at Pitchcombe Village Hall 10.00am to 4.00pm cost £10.00 (bring lunch, but coffee and tea provided). 'a surprisingly rich story' from little old Elcombe

Two valleys away from the fine houses of Painswick stands a tiny rural cluster of cottages which quite a few people living in the area, unless they are old-timers or keen walkers, may not even know by name. If they've read Laurie Lee, they might think they know of a place called Ashcomb on the far slopes of the Slad Valley, for that's the name he gave it in Cider with Rosie, but its real name is Elcombe.

With a current population of barely 25, outsiders might be forgiven for thinking that Elcombe could scarcely rate one page of history, let alone 150. Not so, however, says the author of a new book, All about Elcombe: The intimate history of a Cotswold hamlet. Writer and editor Robin Sharp, who had a home in the hamlet for over 20 years, has done a lot of research into its history and the lives of people who have lived there. "In fact," he says, "Elcombe has a surprisingly rich story to tell – and one reason for putting it all in a book is to preserve the many stories and anecdotes about people now gone. A lot of these have been handed down by word of mouth, but if not recorded they would soon be lost to future generations."

Sharp started off with the modest ambition of putting together a small booklet of historical notes just for his neighbours. But one bit of research led to another and in the end, he says, the book stands in some respects as a microcosm of the history of the Cotswolds – not least in the process of 'gentrification' that has taken place over the last 50 years.

After a survey of the hamlet's first 600 years upto 1900, most

of the book's 12 chapters are devoted to modern times. They chart the dramatic social and economic changes that have transformed this community from one of impoverished farm labourers, firstly to skilled tradesmen and then to prosperous middle-class professionals and artists.

It was only in 1958 that a re-drawing of boundaries detached Elcombe from Bisley-with-Lypiatt, which it had been part of since its founding in the 1300s, and placed it in Painswick Parish. The 1950s also saw the hamlet getting mains electricity and water for the first time.


