Gateway "On a knife edge"

After more than two years of research and negotiations, the Painswick Gateway trustees say that a final decision on the project is still 'on a knife edge'. The project aims to secure the future of the Library premises in Stroud Road, a library service run by the community for at least four years, create a new pedestrian access-way for the centre of Painswick to and from Stamages Lane car park, and re-connect the library premises with the present Church Rooms to create an integrated community centre.



On Friday 23rd January, 83 members of the community who have pledged support to the project met to review the situation and a positive response was reflected in the confirmation of the nearly 200 pledges already made which, along with new pledges received at the meeting, results in a total of £73,000. To this (in most cases) a 28% Gift Aid tax break can be added, leading potentially to over £90,000 being available to the Gateway project.

The meeting heard that the County Council has agreed to reduce the price of the freehold of the library premises to £90,000 and that the Library Service have nearly concluded an agreement under which they will pay £15,000

a year for four years to enable the village, through the Gateway project, to operate a library service with (hopefully) longer opening hours than at present.

Gateway Project chairman, Edward Young said that by combining the money pledged with two £20,000 grants confirmed from Stroud District Council and another local trust, there are now sufficient funds to meet the purchase price, associated legal costs, and effect the most essential repairs and maintenance of the premises. "But," he said, "and it is a huge but, this is insufficient to ensure the short term essential development upon which to base a community association with some realistic prospect of long term success."

The Trustees met again on Monday 26th January and, after a lengthy discussion over the viability of the project, issued the following statement to the Beacon:

"We have not come to a conclusion as to whether to risk that sole step and the small sum then in hand to proceed. The meeting was adjourned so that stock can be calmly and objectively taken of further information and/or funding becoming available in the few days between meetings. We realise our decision is a crucial one; once taken there is no turning back. We cannot just place a single sum upon the difference to be bridged and regard that as conclusive; money is not the sole criterion when making judgements in such a matter as this. The flow of public comment, the expressions of support in ways other than funding, will be influencing the final decision."

After two years' work, and despite a degree of opposition or reservation from some Painswickians and organisations, the Gateway trustees say they are still keen for the project to proceed. As the Beacon went to press, it became apparent that a final go/no decision might well be made on Wednesday 4th February. If this were to be the case, we plan to include a 'STOP PRESS' insert in this edition setting out that decision.

In the meantime, we are reproducing the full text of a 'holding' press release from the Trustees on page. 4.

Future of the Pharmacy

Mike Powis of Painswick Pharmacy met David Drew on 6th January, along with Mrs Pam Holley (Chair) and Mr Les Yeates (Chief Officer) of the Local Pharmaceutical Committee for Gloucestershire, to discuss the implications of last year's White Paper on the future of the role of pharmacies in the community. The radical changes proposed in the Paper will have a dramatic impact on pharmacies, especially those which are independent such as ours in Painswick. The intention is that they will be seen as healthy living centres and the changes will involve additional services, both medical and advisory, and a clearer definition of their role in the community.

Whilst the vision is clear, the details are complex with difficult issues to tackle if implementation is to be successful. A full report of the issues and implications appears on page 6.

Thousands of dancing white snowdrops are putting on a dazzling spectacular display right on Painswick's doorstep, at the Rococo Garden, open every day from 11.00-5.00. This year the conditions have been good for the snowdrops and, provided the weather remains cold and reasonably dry, they should be flowering to the end of February.

Rococo's Paul Moir explains that there are about 30 varieties, scattered arbitrarily throughout the garden and covering about two acres. "They do seem to get everywhere," says Paul. Of particular interest to us locally is *Galanthus Atkinsii*, a splendid tall variety named after James Atkins, a botanist who lived in Rose Cottage, Butt Green in the 1860s.

Planning

Ramp into St. Mary's Churchyard

David Bishop, a Church Warden of St. Mary's, told the meeting how disappointed the Parochial Council was that planning permission had been refused for the ramp. In his opinion it was the lack of clarity in procedures which led to Painswick Parish Council objecting to its own proposal. However he was now keen to move forward and urged further discussion. He also thanked Richard Falconer for preparing the plans for the scheme free of charge.

David Hudson then summarised events starting with the proposal for a ramp first put forward in September 2008. This was followed by a site visit after which it was decided to go ahead with the scheme. Full and Listed Building Planning applications were then submitted by the Clerk to SDC. In October 2008 PPC first saw both planning applications and Painswick Ward members only were asked to vote. They approved the Full application but, Mr Hudson said, rejected the Listed Building application by 4 votes to 2, with two abstentions. This caused some embarrassment to the Council, the Chairman reported. The Council could have then withdrawn the application or proceed. It was decided to proceed as it was reported that Chris Bladon, Listed Building Planning Officer at SDC, had given his support and PPC felt the scheme would be approved. However at the Development Control meeting of the SDC in January 2009, District Councillors rejected their own officer's recommendation and the Listed Building Planning application was rejected. The scheme will be considered at the Parish Council February meeting or an extraordinary meeting may be held before then.

Mike Kerton said the Council had to learn from these events and the Council should approve applications before submitting to SDC. David Hudson said it was all a storm in a teacup.

Three Gables - Signage

David Hudson reported that he had had an amicable discussion with Dr. Robinson about the signage, especially the advertising sign, and that Dr. Robinson had stated that he was entitled to put up the sign and it had proved an effective way of attracting clients. He also stated that he was unwilling to remove it and might put up further advertising signs. David Hudson will consult SDC.

Cotswold Heights - Railings and Lighting

The owner was asked to submit a retrospective planning application.

Court House, Hale Lane - Lighting

David Hudson had been unable to contact the owner.

Catbrain Quarry - Lighting

David Hudson reported that the owners had agreed to turn down upward pointing lights during daylight.

Parish Council

PCSO Colin Drewett reported on police activity in Painswick. He said that speeding is being monitored through the village at different locations and on different days and times. The Police are particularly looking for trends and will increase monitoring activity next month. The Police are also concerned with anti-social behaviour in the churchyard and elsewhere and whilst they have instances of such activity they need names and are seeking the public's help.

Edward Young of the Painswick Gateway project told Councillors that a private meeting is being held on the 23rd January for persons who had given pledges of financial aid for the project. After the meeting the Trustees will decide whether the project should proceed. The Council was invited to send an observer to the meeting. After much discussion the Council agreed not to send a representative. It was noted that two Councillors are also trustees of the Gateway project and the meeting agreed that it would be more appropriate for the Gateway officers to report to the Council after the meeting of the 23rd January.

Signage

Jason Bullingham reported that the various signs and boards around the village near or outside commercial premises are untidy. He suggested that signage should be provided at Victoria Square and at the top of Bisley Street and that only A boards should be placed outside business premises as long as they did not cause an obstruction. All other boards should be removed. Painswick Matters would take charge and would also look at the question of insurance. He will also find out whether a general brown sign or signs could be installed pointing to 'Shops' and be fitted at appropriate locations. Ann Daniels said that wall mounted signs might be a better solution as they would not cause an obstruction though planning permission might be needed. At the next meeting, members will also consider erecting a Painswick Trail board also carrying advertising from businesses. Terry Parker made the general point that the Council was keen to encourage visitors to Painswick.

Coaches - Stamages Lane Car Park

Jason Bullingham reported that there is now unlimited waiting for two coaches free of charge in the car park, the relevant charge rates for coaches on the parking instructions sign having been taped over with SDCs approval. He will contact coach companies to point this out to them in order to encourage coaches to stop in Painswick. Unfortunately this would probably not have any effect until 2010.

Cotswold Way National Trail Interpretation Centre

Terry Parker reported that the result of

the application for funding to South West Tourism will not be known until the 27th January. The intention is to establish the Centre within the Gateway project. However if that project does not go ahead, the Interpretation Centre would be established elsewhere in Painswick.

Parish Council Logo

It was reported by Terry Parker that both the Local History Society and the College of Arms had been contacted and both confirmed that Painswick has never been granted a coat of arms. If the Parish Council wishes to apply for a coat of arms, it can do so at the reduced rate of £5200. The meeting agreed that this was too expensive for the moment and might be looked at again later. In the meantime the Parish Council invites interested individuals to submit designs for a logo to use on Council stationery etc.

Allotments

Martin Slinger reported that the Council expected the completion of legal technicalities by the Gyde trustees solicitor in February. Allotments would come in four plot sizes, Family, half Family and quarter Family. The Family plot would be 5 metres square. He confirmed that a mains water supply was available but arrangements would have to be made regarding parking and testing the suitability of the soil. No structures or buildings would be allowed but a store might be possible and a skip would be provided twice a year for the removal of compost waste. The Clerk confirmed that without any advertising 12 people had already applied for plots. Allotments must be self financing though a reserve may be established to cover shortfalls. All surplus income must be spent on the allotments. Finally the Clerk will enquire about change of use of the field from agricultural to horticultural.

Lamp House - Front Garden

Terry Parker has spoken to the owner and works will be completed by the end of January.

Bledisloe cup

Terry Parker reported that the Bledisloe Cup competition will not carry on. The Campaign for the Protection of Rural England has initiated a new competition where anybody can nominate a community initiative and the cup may be used for that. Unfortunately Painswick will not be allowed to keep the cup as the last winners though it is uncertain what will happen to the Bledisloe notice board. The Calor Gas competition is still running and will take place in March.

Fairtrade Fortnight

The Fairtrade Fortnight is from the 23rd February to 8th March and the meeting approved the erection of a banner on the front of the Town Hall and fitting signs at the entrances to the village, preferably to existing poles.

New Member co-opted

The meeting agreed unanimously to co-opt a new member Ela Pathak-Sen.

Town Hall heating

There was a lengthy discussion about the repair or replacement of the faulty heaters in the Town Hall. The meeting agreed to seek specialist advice from engineers. In the meantime mobile radiant heaters have been installed which will ensure that the Town Hall is warm.

Other items

- Whitehorse Lane steps. Ann Daniels reported that a hedge obstructs light to part of the steps at night.
- Edge Road Slow Down sign. The sign obstructs the view of vehicles turning onto Edge Road.
- Car park. Mike Kerton reported a build up of leaves next to the kerb in the car park. Also several members reported a large puddle outside the Church Rooms in the upper car park.

All the above will be investigated,

Wanted by the Police!

Would you like to join a Gloucestershire Constabulary panel as a Key Individual? Colin Drewett, our Police Community Support Officer has asked the Beacon to carry the following appeal. We would be interested in readers' reactions to this initiative.

Gloucestershire Constabulary is committed to improving the influence local people have on our response to local problems.

We're looking for people to join our Key Individual Network (KIN). We want to know your thoughts and opinions on a range of issues that affect your neighbourhood.

Following Street consultations with local residents which take place up to four times per year, your local neighbourhood policing team ask residents their concerns. We then present the findings to our local panel at a meeting held shortly after our local research. The local panel then decide on up to three priorities, which they want their local team to address. This can be anything, but as an example residents have concerns regarding speeding or anti social behavior.

Being a panel member requires attendance [when available] to one of our meetings to express your views and help make a difference to your community. You also get regular updates on progress made. As a panel member you can review 'good or bad' how your local policing team have met your requirements. You have the opportunity to contribute towards the delivery of policing services in your neighbourhood.

In Summary - Benefits of the KIN:

- Improves the quality of life for you and your neighbourhood
 - Provides a medium for the resolution of issues that arise within your neighbourhood.
 - Provides an opportunity for the community to influence how their area is policed
- Your personal details will not be used for any other purpose, or passed on to anyone else.

We are always looking for people to join our panel either now or held on file until a place falls vacant. We welcome panel members from all sections of the community & would especially be pleased to welcome people in the 18-30 age range where we currently have a shortfall.


On a knife edge

The following is the full text of a Press Release issued by the Gateway Project Trustees on 26th January following the meeting of project supporters on Friday 23rd January:

After more than two years of research and negotiations the trustees of Painswick Gateway are close to a final decision.

The position was presented to 83 members of the community who have pledged support to the project, at a meeting on Friday 23rd January. This was well received, as reflected in the confirmation of pledges, with the overall amount from those present being increased by just over £3000

The County Council has acknowledged the current market conditions and agreed to reduce the price for purchase of the freehold of their library premises in Stroud Road still further to £90,000, subject to certain conditions. Their library service have nearly



concluded an agreement with us under which they will give PG a grant of £15,000 a year for four years in the first instance to enable the village, through these trustees, to operate a library (in due course for longer hours than at present) but with the full resources of the county service backing us up.

Combining the overall £73,000 or so of money pledged by nearly 200 residents, if most are Gift Aided (so adding 28% to their value to PG), plus £20,000 grants confirmed from each of the Stroud District Council and another local trust, there are sufficient funds to meet the purchase price, associated legal costs, and effect the most essential repairs and maintenance of the premises. But, and it is a huge BUT, this resource would be insufficient to ensure the short term essential development upon which to base a community association with some realistic prospect of long term success.

Identifying encouraging signs that there may other sources of funds yet to be committed, the trustees adjourned their deliberations until Wednesday 4th February to give every opportunity to explore any possibilities to enable this project to become reality. They are acutely conscious of the duty they owe the village to try to secure and run a community library, to create a new safe access-way to Painswick for residents and visitors, and play their part in regenerating the village – possibly including taking advantage of the expressions of interest from potential business partners for premises close to the “Gateway”. These opportunities, coupled with re-connecting the library premises to the present Church Rooms (on a long lease), are considerable indeed, as are applications for various grants if the freehold is taken up.

After 2 years’ work since the original testing of community support in asking for financial pledges, the trustees are keen to ensure that Gateway, which has such great potential, is established on a strong footing with broad community support before they commit to the first irrevocable step.

Feedback will be welcome from any quarter upon any aspect of this project through our web site www.painswickgateway.org.uk where the original Prospectus, publicly approved last January, can also be viewed and contact details are shown. Observations or further pledges of support will be appreciated. The future of this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity will be decided on 4th February

On Saturday 17th January, as they settled down for an evening in front of the fire at home in Cotswold Mead, Mike and Sharla Dandy heard a bang from their wood burning stove and then found their chimney had caught alight. Fortunately, they had a fire extinguisher and were able to put out the wood burner but the chimney fire had firmly taken hold. They dialled 999.

Sharla picks up the story: “Within five minutes the Painswick fire service had turned up. This is in itself was amazing seeing as they had to stop whatever they were doing at home and come to our rescue.”

As she and her two children - Austin (2) and Emily (4), not to mention Timmy the dog, huddled in the car watching the big flashing lights, the firemen set to work. “They even put plastic sheeting down to minimise the mess I had to clear up,” she commented, “When I went in to see how they were doing I recognised most of them as dads from school, members of the PTA



and local businessmen. And I realised how many people there are in the village working tirelessly to keep us safe and happy.” She thinks our volunteer fire fighters are superb particularly as they stayed for a good couple of hours to make sure the fire was out.

Best of all, however, maybe with an eye to a future recruit, they let two year old Austin get on board the fire engine and look around.

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Future of the Pharmacy

On 6th January David Drew met with Mike Powis of Painswick Pharmacy, Pam Holley and Les Yeates respectively Chairperson and Chief Officer of the Local Pharmaceutical Committee for Gloucestershire, in order to discuss the future of pharmacies and their role in the community.

We have in Painswick one of the few independent pharmacies, most being part of large business groups, and its future in the heart of our community is of vital interest. In April 2008 a White Paper, entitled Building on Strengths – Delivering the Future, was issued. It proposes changes to the services provided by pharmacies by adding new services and making them mandatory. They would be paid for by the Primary Care Trusts and this is an important factor as pharmacies currently have to meet all business overheads from their income.

The main thrust of the White Paper is that the role of pharmacies should be enhanced. In effect, they will become healthy living centres and there will be a much clearer definition of their role in the community health system. In essence pharmacists will play a greater role and in the process will, by taking on some of the procedures undertaken at present by GPs, free up GPs to concentrate more on specialist issues.

However, the Paper is complex and one of the more thorny issues is the question of GPs providing dispensing services themselves. In some areas this is causing a conflict of interests between pharmacists and doctors. We are fortunate in Painswick inasmuch as at present our surgery and the pharmacy work well together and that appears to be the situation for the foreseeable future as the White Paper makes no allowances for GPs to apply forthwith to dispense.

David Drew supported the principles of the White Paper, in particular that pharmacies in the heart of communities are well-placed to provide a range of services many of which are currently provided by doctors' surgeries. He hoped that the professions would recognise the opportunities of working together for the benefit of patients and the potential for improving patient care.

Mike Powis expressed concern about funding and especially how pharmacists would be assisted in meeting the increased costs of the staffing needed. The vision is that pharmacists will be providing greater patient care through medicines management. More than one person will be involved in the dispensing and checking of prescriptions and monitoring the interactions with other medicines the patient may be taking. At Painswick Pharmacy two people are currently being trained in dispensing.

Pharmacists are legally required to undergo continuous professional development. They are the most highly skilled in medicine knowledge and should not be regarded simply as dispensers. They have their own clearly defined specialist skills and training and are highly professional. Our own Mike Powis, acknowledged by many as conscientious, caring and very well qualified, is without doubt already a key person at the heart of our community health system. He already provides a range of excellent services, though these are not NHS funded at present, and is enthusiastic about developing these and additional ones further. There is the potential for a truly beneficial pharmacy provision in Painswick.

The White Paper sets out a vision for the future of pharmacy, but while the issues of funding and who will be dispensing medicines are still in question, the future is far from clear.

Local History Teaser

Now here's a gathering of rather redoubtable looking ladies, but do you know who they were as a group? Where do you think this meeting was being held and have you any idea when it might have taken place? For us it would be an added bonus if you are able to identify any of the ladies individually. Answers, as far as we are able, in next month's Beacon.

Last month's photograph was something of a mystery and it is gratifying, therefore, that we received an interesting response from Mr Graham Gyde in Aylesbury who recognised his father, Frank Colin Gyde (known as Colin), the young man sitting on the far right of the front row. He was born in 1918, spent all his life in Painswick apart from service abroad during the War and lived in Tangier Cottage, Vicarage Street. This seems to fit well with our own deductions, drawn after scrutinising a magnified viewing of the picture. We feel certain that the wording on the caps is HM KING GEORGE V and surmise, cautiously, that the photograph may have been taken on the occasion of the celebration of his 25 years on the throne, ie 6 May 1935. Many thanks to Graham Gyde for his information.

... and boozing with the Local History Society

There was a really splendid turnout for the History Society's January meeting. Now whether that was due to the need for a New Year's outing or lively interest in the subject remains a moot point. Mr Geoff Sandles gave a presentation on pubs and breweries in the Stroud valleys, starting with the opening of Stroud Brewery in 1760. This was accompanied by a wealth of fascinating photographic illustrations of Stroud Brewery premises across the county. The malting process and the fact that the brewery also bottled spring water and other beers such as Guinness was also explained.

During the 19th century other companies started in the brewing business including Godsells at Salmon Springs in 1850. They eventually sold out to Stroud Brewery in 1928 but whilst in business had a major effect on Painswick, buying and owning considerable amounts of land and property. Apparently, their sign at the Adam and Eve public house in Paradise read 'Adam and Eve Inn at Paradise - God sells Ales'. Other local companies included Carpenter & Co., Cainscross, Alan Neame, Bowbridge, Cordwell & Son, Cainscross and the Nailsworth Brewery Company.

The many Painswick public houses - and there were many - were owned by a wide range of small breweries. In 1958 Stroud Brewery and Cheltenham Brewery amalgamated, eventually coming to a close a few years later itself. Regeneration occurred in 2006 with a new Stroud Brewery starting up again. Its ales are available in Painswick's local pub. Today's independent breweries are tiny compared with those of former times but with the dramatic decline in the number of public houses since World War 2 this is not surprising.

It is noteworthy that there were many valuable contributions of extra information from the audience, some of whom had fond memories of working in the industry.

The next meeting of the Society will take place at the Croft School on Tuesday, 17 February when David Archard and Helen Briggs will give another of their inspiring and entertaining presentations on themes from Painswick's history. The meeting starts at 7.30pm and everyone is welcome.



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Springtime Melodies...

It is time to think of the joys of Spring again and with Spring comes Music. The Music Society's 64th Season's programme is full of musical delights. On Saturday 21st March we start with the Schubert Ensemble - one of the world's leading exponents of chamber music for piano and strings - playing Quartet Op. 47 that Schumann, the great romantic, wrote thinking of his beloved Clara performing the piano part. This will be followed by a piece the Ensemble commissioned from Cheltenham composer Piers Hellawell, called The Building of Curves. Piers has intrigued audiences with his use of unconventional techniques. Their programme ends with the not often heard Fauré Quartet No. 1.

The second concert on 4 April has the remarkable and charming 20 year old violinist Chloë Hanslip (pictured right) partnered by Ashley Wass, one of this country's most sought-after accompanists. Those who heard Chloë play the Schumann violin concerto at Cheltenham recently will have experienced what The Times said about her: 'Hanslip's passion and technical bravura are palpable and exciting. Fiery glissandi, tremulous multi-stopping: the fireworks never stop.' She is an extraordinarily busy person as well as being a fantastic violinist. Her programme includes Beethoven's joyously playful 'Kreutzer' Sonata, the fiendishly difficult Prokofiev Sonata No.1 and Szymanowski's 3 Paganini Caprices.

The Da Vinci Trio - violin, cello, piano - is in great demand across the UK, well known for their relaxed, witty and informative introductions and their expressive playing. In addition to the established repertoire, the trio attract many new commissions including, incidentally, the work of Piers Hellawell. Their programme on 18th April comprises Mozart's Piano Trio in C, Ravel's Piano Trio in B flat with its wealth of brilliant effects, and Schubert's Piano Trio that is also in B flat.

The Barbirolli Quartet bring the season to a close on 2nd May with string quartets by Mozart, No. 22 in B flat, Beethoven, No. 11 in F min, and Ravel in F. The Barbirolli is known for its diverse, prolific repertoire and dynamic approach to performance. The Times describes them as "forthright, full-blooded musicians, afraid of nothing" and The Strad comments on their "superbly realised performance and precision of ensemble at formidable rates of energy".

Barbara Thorley and Alan Price are again bringing to Painswick a scintillating assembly of highly talented musicians who grace the international concert circuit. They will be performing wonderful music; do not miss any of it.

Earful of Contrasts for PMAG

"After all, I may not be a first rate composer, but I am a first class second rate composer" said Richard Strauss when conducting the Philharmonia Orchestra in London in 1947. He was a prodigiously talented composer and conductor, the most famous living one in the first years of the twentieth century, and after hearing a selection of his music, well presented by Howard Allen on 8th January, we rated him first class all round!

Rightly concentrating on his symphonic poems, we had "Don Juan", great orchestral showpiece; "Till Eulenspiegel" - brilliant and hilarious; "Don Quixote", tone poem for cello and orchestra, probably his masterpiece, and the introduction to "Also sprach Zarathustra" - quite spectacular. After the interval came excerpts from the autobiographical "Ein Heldenleben" and from the enthralling mountain climb the "Alpensinfonie". Elisabeth Schwarzkopf singing "Beim Schlafengehen" - one of his famous "Four Last Songs" - was a fitting encore.

"First Richard Strauss, then Berlioz: quite a contrast for followers of traditional classical music" said one of our members. And the contrast didn't end there - while we had heard many Strauss recordings, Ian Cooper - it was a pleasure to have him back again - concentrated on longer extracts from only a few of Berlioz' greatest works on 22nd January. On hearing this superlative music it is hard to believe that until the 1950s this composer was considered second rate here until Colin Davis pioneered "The Trojans" and it became better understood than in France because of its unconventionality.

Berlioz wrote works of great delicacy and of overwhelming simple power. We heard some of each: the Love Duet from The Trojans at the end, and before that the scherzo from the dramatic symphony, "Romeo and Juliet", the last movement of his most famous work "the Symphonie Fantastique", the first movement of "Te Deum" and an excerpt from the concert opera "Damnation of Faust".



PROPERTY REPORT for February from Hamptons

What hope lies in store for buyers and sellers in 2009?

Firstly, we may have turned a corner as we have experienced a very busy start to the year with a marked increase in enquiries which is backed up by the right move website statistics (2008 1st – 10th Jan 199,762 emails sent to customers, Same period 2009 429,560) and even a property selling for over asking price!

We have identified some of the key reasons to remain optimistic this year.. The bank base rate is only 1.5% compared with 5.5% last January. As a result, the cost of borrowing is gradually reducing and affordability for many is enhanced. Added to this interest on savings is so low that people are now thinking about investing their money back into property. Prices have already dropped by 20-25% since the peak in 2007. Lower prices also enhance affordability. The Pound has lost around 35% of its value against the Euro and 30% against the Dollar in the past 12 months. This makes the UK property market far more attractive to overseas buyers. Vendors are far more acceptant of the need for price realism in order to achieve a sale. This was not the case at the beginning of last year and we had an uphill battle to close the expectation gap between buyers and sellers. Banks are under extreme pressure to increase liquidity and it is widely expected, with Government pressure that mortgage finance will increase during the course of the year. Pent-up demand; research indicates that plenty of people have a desire to move but had delayed their plans until this year due to falling house prices. However, Stock of available property is down 25% since May last year. A reduction in supply will take some downward pressure off prices which also suggests the bottom of the market is not far away.

Increased buyer and seller confidence will not happen overnight. However, we believe that the sharp correction in house prices that took place throughout 2008 will positively impact the 2009 housing market, as people begin to realize that the worst of the house price falls have already happened; boosting optimism and market confidence and encouraging growing numbers of prospective buyers to start their search for a new home. Therefore if you held off from selling last year, now is the time to think about it as a large number of our potential buyers are sitting in rented accommodation waiting for the right property to come onto the market.
