### Painswickians of the Year

The Bishops were somewhat taken aback when given the news that they had been voted Painswickians of the Year, but this characteristic modesty had been predicted by those who had nominated them. Conscientious to a fault in their respective roles in Painswick, David and Rita have done so much (and continue to do so) for the benefit of the community at large.

As churchwarden, a voluntary position, David works with both the vicar and the congregation, mostly involving the fabric of the church but with a spiritual element too. In this role David sees himself as a communicator and support - and those he deals with as such regard him as totally effective and utterly likeable.

He is very keen to move the church into greater involvement with the local social scene and wants it to be part of a wide range of community activities. To this end, David has tirelessly encouraged many groups and projects such



as Art Couture Painswick, the Diamond Jubilee celebrations, concerts and the Big Apple Day group to breathe new life into both the church building and the churchyard. It has under his gentle but positive guidance become the vibrant centre of the town.

David is always present, 'calmly and kindly overseeing all the events going on at St Mary's'. He is without exception reliable, patient and very kind, helpful and generous according to many. He works tirelessly across the community, believing that all the churches and the community should work together. He is also a stalwart of the Beacon conservation group, working in all conditions so that others may enjoy this beautiful piece of landscape.

Both David and Rita are volunteers at the Rococo Garden. Rita organises the community lunches at Ashwell from October to March. She is also the secretary of Churches Together, a movement dear to both her and David's hearts – they regard themselves as community Christians, always encouraging all the churches to interact. On a weekly basis on Wednesday mornings Rita is an enthusiastic participant in the Open Book Scheme at the Croft School. This national scheme, which began in Gloucestershire, brings Bible stories into schools through simple enactments. Rita considers this important now that schools no longer have regular Christian assemblies. Before coming to Painswick ten years ago David was a nuclear physicist with the Electricity Generating Board and Rita was a chemistry teacher. Most of their working lives were spent in Cheshire and Scotland. They have a son, a daughter and a very new granddaughter. David is a tower bell ringer and Rita a hand bell ringer. She is also in the church choir, belongs to the Thames Head Singers in Stroud, is in the NWR Stroud branch, exercises with the Puffins, walks with the Monday Morning Walkers and both have some involvement with the Scout and Guide movement. This very active couple touch the lives of many people in Painswick and are much appreciated for their kindness and caring support by all who encounter them. They certainly deserve the accolade – Painswickians of the Year.

### **Painswick Christmas Lights**

If you had fancied a midnight stroll through St Mary's Churchyard the night before the Goodwill Evening 2009, you would have come across two busy men rushing to install the anticipated Christmas yew tree lights in time for the following evening's festivities.

The concept was conceived by Chris Mercer of The Chairman Shop, who teamed up with Phil Ion, of local business Core Lighting Ltd., to design and build the lights. There were several requirements: firstly, that the lights should be portable and rechargeable due to lack of suitable mains power in the churchyard, and secondly that they were designed on a budget due to limited funding. Thankfully, several generous individuals and groups kindly donated to enable the scheme to proceed. Others giving significant support and aid are those who refurbished the

lights this year and significantly the untiring group of volunteers who, on a rota organised by Church Warden David Bishop, go out each day to remove and charge the lights then later reinstall them for evening use.

For this reason the power-packs must be removable. Several other design constraints are important, particularly that the brackets do not cause any damage to the trees. They must also turn on and off automatically at 4:30 and 11pm respectively, and be protected from vandalism, so each light is padlocked to its vandal resistant bracket. The lights did, however, in their first year fall prey to vandalism with wires cut, reducing the total number of units to nineteen. This pointless act of sabotage was sadly not in keeping with the Christmas spirit. There have also been problems caused by a traditional Christmas occurrence: temperatures as low as -20°c and heavy snow which reduced the battery life; however, they have been refurbished this year, with an improved design and robustness. On top of the improvements, many have expressed a wish to increase the number of units; one idea is to light the trees on the churchyard paths, creating a more magical setting for the whole churchyard. However, each unit costs £250, and those creating, maintaining and

refurbishing the lights are volunteers. Should any person feeling the spirit of Goodwill or just looking to gift the community, funding and donations to take the project further next autumn would be much appreciated. From the initial idea four years ago, the lights have become an annual tradition for our village and have each Christmas created an enchanting and sparkling churchyard for visitors and residents alike to enjoy.

### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS 11th December by Mike Kerton

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear.

The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office.

#### PLANNING COMMITTEE

After the meeting was opened by the Chairman, Cllr Rob Lewis, there was a presentation by Peter Wood, a resident of Slad. He and other local residents were concerned by the apparent encroachment by a Developer onto Common Land in Slad. In January 2008 a planning application to erect a cottage at the rear of an existing cottage in Slad was submitted to Stroud District Council. Access to the site was over Common Land. Planning permission, subject to conditions relating to access to the Common Land, was granted by the District Council. The petition which was signed by 45 residents reads:

#### "COMMON LAND SLAD

REGISTERED NUMBER CL153 We the undersigned as Parishioners of Painswick living in the village of Slad object strongly to the encroachment of our common land by the development behind Woodbine Cottage as approved by Stroud District Council Planning Department. We demand that the amenity value and topography of this land be restored to us. Then Stroud District Council Planning Department does not have the authority

to grant planning permission on Common Land. Applications and approvals must be made and given by The Secretary of State for Rural Affairs. This has not been done."

Cllr Rob Lewis confirmed that the Parish Council would arrange a site visit and that the matter would be discussed at the next full Planning meeting of the Council.

#### Matters requiring a decision

There were 8 matters requiring a decision. Four of the applications were supported, one was deferred until a report had been received from the local Cllr. The Council voted unanimously to object to the remaining three applications including revisions to a development application at Summer Street, Stroud. The Council were only being consulted on the development at Summer Street, Stroud as the land abutted the Council's Slad Ward. They agreed to maintain their original decision to object to the development.

#### PARISH COUNCIL

As there were no questions from the public Chairman Martin Slinger opened the meeting moving swiftly onto Council business.

#### Matters of urgency

Cllr Ann Daniels drew the Council's attention to the draft Woodland

Management Plan for the Plantation that had been produced by Mr Terry Fenton. Together with Chairman Martin Slinger and a member of Painswick Golf Club they had walked around the edge of the Plantation. Several of the trees had branches overhanging the wall along the edge of the golf course. This was preventing the grass growing and it was agreed that the trees would be lopped. Also Ash Trees were being cut down and removed from the site. The report will be forwarded to the Forestry Commission seeking a continuation of the grant. The grant is used to maintain the Plantation and is available for inspection in the Parish Council Office.

#### **Matters Arising**

Painswick Youth Club Project: Chairman Martin Slinger had attended a site meeting to discuss the paving slabs, the disabled toilet and replacing the "traps" that were to be fitted to the showers. Larger traps were required as the showers were to be used by footballers and the smaller traps could not cope with the "mud"! Cllr Jason Bullingham asked why the larger traps had not been included in the original quote as it was known that the showers would be used by football teams. Martin Slinger explained that there would be a saving as the planned Power Showers were no longer required.

The Post Office: Good News! A meeting of the Trustees of the Painswick Centre had unanimously agreed to apply to Post Office Services to run a Community Post Office from their premises. A store room would be converted into an office for the Centre's Manager and provide space for the Post Office. Although the venture would be a partnership between the Centre and Post Office Services the Parish Council would provide help and non-financial assistance in finding volunteers. Post Office Services would provide full training for the volunteers.

Cllr Rob Lewis expressed his and local residents frustration over the failure to provide a post box by the side of the telephone box. He requested that a strong letter of complaint be sent by the Council to the local MP, Neil Carmichael, who had promised that the post box would be in situ prior to Christmas. Residents who live in the centre of the village or in Tibbiwell Lane now have a considerable distance to walk to a post box.

Canton Acre Turning Circle: Agreement over matched funding had now been agreed between the County Council and Stroud District Council. It appears that the land in the circle is owned by the District Council and the roadway by the County Council! With the reduction in the size of the turning circle there is a need to delineate the land between both Councils. A row of different coloured bricks will be set into the new tarmac!

#### **Co-option of Councillors**

Three members of the public had applied to be Co-opted on to the Council. They had submitted their CV's but one had withdrawn their application on the evening of the meeting. After studying the CV's the Council unanimously voted to co-opt Mrs Emma Smith and Mr David Oxendale to fill the two vacancies on the Council.

The Council then unanimously voted to co-opt Ms Becca Eccles onto the Land and Buildings Committee.

#### **County Councillor's Report**

Although present at the meeting Cllr Jason Bullingham submitted a written report. Following a Department of Health inspection earlier this year the County Council has been rated as one of the top six local authorities in the UK for its ground breaking quality programme checking care services for vulnerable adults. The programme included a review of all adults with learning disabilities who were placed outside of the County. Plans have been put into place to bring as many back as possible to the County.

The County Council are now seeking to improve the way it buys care for the elderly and vulnerable people. No review had been undertaken for over a decade. The Council aims to provide residential services for people with higher needs while helping those who want to remain independent to stay in their own homes as long as possible.

#### **District Councillor's Report**

District Cllr Nigel Cooper advised the meeting that the District Council budget had been delayed and would be issued in January instead of December.

#### Painswick War Memorial

The Clerk, Roy Balgobin, had arranged for an expert to inspect the War Memorial, submit a report on its condition and advise on what action would be needed to improve the lettering on the Memorial. The report had been received. The Memorial is grade II listed with only a slight problem to the lettering. This was mainly caused by the depth of the engraving which allowed lichen to grow into the lettering on the dark side of the Memorial resulting in a colour contrast which caused difficulty in reading the names. The lichen could be easily removed and the stonework cleaned at a total cost of £650. Planning permission

would not be required. There followed a discussion over whether or not the Council's Caretaker could undertake the work. Finally the Council agreed to discuss the matter with the Vicar and the History Society before deciding on the appropriate course of action.

At the conclusion of the discussion it was confirmed that the names on the War Memorial are also recorded in the church. A plea was made by the Chairman for relatives to let the Council know the names of any local residents who had lost their lives in any of the conflicts since the Second World War.

#### **Responsible Financial Officers report**

After agreeing payment of the outstanding invoices the Council turned its attention to its Precept Setting Policy for 2014/15. The Clerk advised the meeting that Parish Councils had not been "capped" by the Government for the forthcoming year. Ian James, Chairman of the Finance and General Purposes Committee - FGPC - (the Committee responsible for drawing up the Precept) said that requests for funding had already been received from four local organisations plus three from Council Committees relating to renewing carpets in the Cemetery Lodge, alterations to the public toilets and providing alternative accommodation for the Tourist Information Centre (TIC). After a lengthy discussion the Council unanimously agreed to maintain the same policy as they set for 2013/14 with the addition of seeking a Public Works loan for the public toilets project and matched funding for the new TIC accommodation. Local organisations could be provided with non-financial help by way of assistance with road signs, free advertising and car parking. When setting the Precept the FGPC should endeavour not to increase the amount agreed for 2013/14.

#### Ward Reports

Cllr Rob Lewis queried the Council's decision not to allow a "target fund raising barometer" to be installed outside the Town Hall – see December Beacon. The request had not originated from the Mothers and Toddlers Group but from The Croft School who were seeking local support to help with raising £20k for the upgrading of their computer equipment. This would assist with the education of young children. He was responding to comments made by the school.

The meeting concluded at 9.30pm

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## Young Painswickian of the Year

Isabella Weatherall has been voted this year's young Painswickian. Not only has Isabella worked to raise money for good causes but she has also displayed an exemplary attitude towards the welfare and wellbeing of others. At only eleven years of age this level of highly developed caring is to be applauded.

Of the many fund-raising projects she has undertaken perhaps the greatest achievement was swimming the distance of the English Channel earlier this year in a swimming pool. It took Isabella five days, swimming approximately 200 lengths each day. She trained hard prior to doing it but, as she points out, it was still a big undertaking. "Sometimes I felt tired," she says "but I was able to carry on and do it because I knew it had a real purpose." As a result the sponsorship money raised enabled her to give £352.26 to the Hedgehog Hospital in Brimscombe for food and medical supplies and £370 to the Painswick Guides for their activity funds.

This was certainly not the first or only occasion on which Isabella has shown community spirit. Aged seven, she swam 99 lengths of the Croft School pool to raise sponsorship for one of the yew trees in St Mary's churchyard. She is often to be found in the hairdressing salon at Richmond Village where her mum, Jo, is a hairdresser. Here she likes engaging in conversation with her mum's customers and sometimes at their bequest will make greetings cards on their behalf. And this



summer with the Guides she helped raise money for Cotswold Care by standing all day behind their stall selling a range of goods. An ex-Croft School pupil Isabella is now in her first year at Millbrook Academy in Brockworth. She has already been acknowledged by the school as 'gifted and talented in art and design' and likes to work hard generally. The school's nominated charity is WaterAid and already Isabella is thinking of starting to organise a major fund-raising project via the school council of which she is a member. If she can convince the staff of its efficacy this would be another swimming event but involving other students and therefore on a much bigger scale than her previous endeavours.

Painswick is fortunate to have several young people who have worked selflessly for the good of others. Isabella is a shining example of this altruism. She is highly motivated and articulate when talking about her fund-raising efforts, enjoying both the sense of achievement and the knowledge that her efforts benefit many others across the community. She is an inspiration and we are sure you will agree that she is a worthy winner of the award – Young Painswickian of the Year.

### ZERO SIX PAPA TWO (Painswick fire engine's call sign)

Welcome to a new column bringing you news and information from Painswick Community Fire Station. We will keep you informed about incidents we respond to, our training and community safety.

Painswick were recently mobilised to a major fire at a recycling plant in Chipping Campden where we spent 6 hours damping down rubbish and monitoring the structural stability of the severely fire damaged buildings. At the time of writing, we have just returned from a call to a fallen tree that brought down overhead lines following strong winds.

In November, Andrew Robinson, Chris Garbett and Mark Hancock spent a week attending a 'First person on scene' (FPOS) training course and achieved the qualification endorsed by the Faculty of Pre-Hospital Care which enables us to provide immediate life support before the arrival of the ambulance service.

January tends to be a busy month training wise, with most of us attending an annual Breathing Apparatus (BA) requalifier training course. This course tests our abilities to safely rescue casualties from buildings which are on fire and smoke filled.

January is also the coldest month of the year when people tend to ask more from their heating. Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service attend around 300 chimney fires a year some of which cause serious damage to property.

#### **Important changes to Patient Transport:**

From 1st December 2013, patients are asked to book their own hospital transport without the need to pass on the information to the surgery.

Non-emergency patient transport across Gloucestershire will be undertaken by Arriva Transport Solutions. This is for patients who have a medical condition which means they cannot make their own way to hospital, or get into an ordinary car to be taken by a relative or carer. The criteria that determine patient eligibility for hospital transport is determined by the Dept of Health and is based upon your medical condition. Please ask for a patient leaflet at reception.

If you need hospital transport and think you may meet the relevant medical criteria, you should telephone Arriva Non-Emergency Patient Transport 0845 600 6068

We are very sorry but we are no longer able to deal with hospital transport requests.

#### The work of the Community Dementia Nurse

A new service is being launched to support GP surgeries in the diagnosis, management and treatment of dementia. The Community Dementia Nurse Service has been set up by the <sup>2</sup>gether NHS Foundation Trust as an addition to the very successful Managing Memory Service.

This is the first of its kind in the country providing specialist and direct support to GPs. It also has links to the new Dementia Adviser Service delivered via the Alzheimer's Society.

Each surgery in Gloucestershire is going to be allocated a Community Dementia Nurse and their work will focus around 3 key areas:-

- \* Advice and support with diagnosis
- \* Advice and support in the management and treatment of patients with dementia
- \* Short term intensive treatment plans to address immediate care needs.

Dementia care in Gloucestershire is a key priority for our Clinical Commissioning Group and with an ageing population set to increase even further, we are expecting as a county to treat more people with dementia.

People with dementia and their families who may need extra support, can access the Community Dementia Service through the GP, the Dementia Adviser or the Managing Memory Service. Our 'named' Community Dementia Nurse is Sophie Blakeman and she will be based at Weaver's Croft in Stroud. Access will be via a referral from the GP.

Painswick Centre will have another busy year in 2014. In addition to all the regular uses, outlined last month, there will be some specials for 2014. These include three anniversaries: D-Day landings on 6th June; Laurie Lee's birth on 26th June and the start of the First World War.



#### Negotiations have begun with The Post Office

for a "Post Office Local" to be sited at Painswick Centre, probably beside the skittle alley at the far end of the Car Park. The Parish Council are fully supportive of the proposal and the Post Office representative who steers such projects was clearly keen that it should succeed when he met a number of the Trustees in early December. However, it is not yet a "done deal"; there are many hurdles to clear, such as adaptation of building, public consultation, and the training of staff and their leader team. Most critical will probably be the recruiting of a sufficient number of volunteers to make it work. Initially, the new Post Office, offering most of the services previously provided by the New Street building, would be open on two or three days a week, with the ambition to open more often and for longer hours, as increasing support allows. There are many, many 'mights' and maybes'; what finally emerges is dependent on the hands-on help of you Painswickians. Much like the Library, only we locals can ensure that we have the service we want.

While one team will work-up an agreed specification for the building and electrical alterations, obtain quotes and seek offers of grants and donations, another will develop the volunteer proposals, and arrange a public meeting as well as other ways of recruiting support. This is where you come in. If you are keen to support the project and especially if you are willing to be one of those who work behind the counter, please register your interest with the Trustee below or the Parish Council Clerk, Roy Balgobin. Painswick Centre Trustees will organise a public meeting at the Centre, where we can learn more and gauge support. Meanwhile to paraphrase (painfully) John F. Kennedy "Ask not what Painswick Post Office can do for you, ask rather what you can do for the Post Office".

## Yew Trees Women's Institute

Brimscombe Hedgehog Hospital – John Crowther



At the last talk of the year we met John Crowther. John and his wife

started the Hedgehog Hospital in Brimscombe five years ago to care for these creatures if they become sick or injured. Hedgehog numbers are currently declining and it is becoming increasingly important that we save as many as possible. The organisation relies entirely on donations and the sale of hedgehog-related items such as T-towels and cards and is run by trained volunteers – last year they treated around 160 individual animals.

Few of us realised that baby hedgehogs are born blind, deaf and totally dependent on their mother. Their prickles do not appear until a few hours after birth which must mean that giving birth is less painful than one might have predicted. The male hedgehog disappears soon after mating, so the female is the archetypal single mother, and she looks after her litter on her own until they are weaned at eight weeks of age. Unfortunately hedgehogs are at risk from innumerable hazards including those in our own gardens. These include pesticides and insecticides, strimmers , plastic netting such as those that may be used to support peas and beans and even having a tidy garden may be hazardous to 'Mrs Tiggywinkle'. Hedgerows provide nesting areas and wildlife corridors allowing hedgehogs to travel around an area so their increasing loss could be another reason for the declining numbers. More recently the badger has also been blamed and it is certainly true that a badger will eat a hedgehog especially if it is injured but there is little research to indicate the size of the problem.

John finished his talk by saying that any hedgehog weighing under 500g should be prevented from hibernating and he encouraged all of us to ring him if we found such an individual. The Hedgehog Hospital will be only too glad to take the animal in and get it through the winter.

The Yew Trees WI will finish their programme for the year with a Christmas meal and entertainment provided by Gilly Padbury among others. The next season of talks and visits starts on Tuesday January 28th. We meet on the fourth Tuesday of every month at 7.30 in the Church Rooms and we would all be so pleased if you would join us – keep your eyes on the Village Diary

## Beware The Scammers and that's being very polite

I don't know if it is just the time of year, or whether it's just me, but I have been receiving bogus phone calls and emails at an incredible rate over the last month. There are currently two very active scams, one over the phone (to start with) and the other by email.

Let me paint you a picture – you get a phone call telling you that your computer is causing errors on the network or to your ISP (Internet Service Provider) and you must do something immediately, the person who has called you uses words like Microsoft, Windows, errors, problems and they are just the ones to fix it for you, well there's a coincidence, all you have to do is let them logon remotely to your computer and it will all be fine - if you do that it is just the beginning of your problems! Firstly they will try and charge



you for this 'service', I have heard of figures from £50 to £200, secondly they will install software on your computer ranging from absolutely useless and worthless to sophisticated and highly dangerous. They are after your details and will leave remote monitoring and sometimes key-loggers (again to steal your details and transmit them to a remote site). What details do they want? Well the obvious ones are bank details, user accounts and passwords, but also more subtle actions, so that whenever you use the internet you are redirected to the sites they want you to visit, bogus sites offering you great deals, free offers and usually lots of 'free' software (speed up your computer, system cleaners, free anti-virus, registry cleaners) – again these sites will install more malware, trojans and possibly viruses. Suddenly your system is in fact running slowly, erratically, browsing is difficult and the stupid computer is just not doing what you want it to! Better get some more of this software that is going to fix it and all for free – and so it continues!

The obvious answer is when you receive a cold call like this (remember they have called you – you have not been looking for help) is to hang up, don't even bother wasting your time talking to them. If you have unfortunately allowed them to access your computer, remove your computer from the internet, stop any payments, direct debits and inform your bank that you have compromised your details immediately, then contact a computer professional of your choice (not a cold caller, or some too-good-to-be true outfit on the internet) to remove all malware and clean your computer.

The second frequent problem is the humble email. You receive an email from your ISP (BT, Talk-Talk, Plusnet, etc.) or it could be your bank and at the moment they are trying with many service organisations, RoyalMail, UPS, Fedex, and recently Vodafone, Facebook and other messaging companies. They will address you as 'Customer', 'User' and other non-specific terms and invite you to open an attachment supposedly containing an invoice, a returns form, a message or a picture – DO NOT OPEN THE ATTACHMENT – this will install at the minimum a Trojan, opening your computer, bypassing your antivirus and system protection, usually stealing your address book and any other data they can get to (as above, bank details etc.).

The old rule still applies, if you don't recognise the sender, if you are not addressed personally or if the email contains strange attachments, includes strange links or asks you to provide or confirm your details – DELETE IT IMMEDIATELY. If you have inadvertently opened one of these emails – and they do look very convincing, usually correct logos, fonts and company officials), contact a computer professional and seek advice, it may be as simple as changing your passwords or it may mean that you need to have your computer cleaned and any malware removed.

These are just two of the current scams that seem to be particularly prevalent at the moment, but as always there are many more ways that 'They' are trying to attack you, this BBC website shows a few more and highlights things you should be wary of http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/technology-25200338.

# Fewer busy bees on The Beacon?

Painswick Beacon Conservation Group finished 2013 with a final push to complete the scrub clearance in several areas. The

most impressive area was Long Quarry where nearly 100 pines were felled and about 30 tonnes of logs sent to the Tocknells Court biomass boiler. On December 17th a team of 17 volunteers, including 12 Cotswold Wardens, and two chainsaw professionals, cleared up and burnt a mountain of pine treetops and raked the quarry banks on the sunny side. Many deciduous hardwoods were then felled on the south side so that their stems and leaves will no longer shade the sunny side! The loyal band also enjoyed mince pies and warm spiced fruit juice.

Last month I offered firewood logs, and/or chainsaw training to any who would do a little work with us in exchange. So far the response has been disappointing; the chainsaw course option will end this month and the "free" firewood will be sold elsewhere. Act now if interested.

## What is happening on Painswick Beacon

The Painswick Beacon Conservation Group is carrying out the removal of pines and scrub in Long Quarry to open up the grassland and to create a "scrape" for juniper seedlings as part of the Higher Level Stewardship agreement. Various other scrub clearance work is being carried out by the Conservation Group and the Golf Club as part of the Higher Level Stewardship agreement, again with the aim of rescuing areas that are being lost to scrub

The felling of ash trees at the southern end of the Common is again to reclaim areas of grassland and to prevent the ash trees from seeding over the speciesrich grassland areas adjacent. The spindles have been noted and will be left. Mike Hoey (from the Golf Club) is organising these works. As recorded in the Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting (p2), there will also be some removal of beech limbs overhanging the Plantation wall along the edge of the Golf Course. The shade currently there is preventing

the grass growing and it was agreed that the trees would be lopped.

Paul Hackman of Natural England has explained that the clearance work next to the houses on Golf Course Road is outside the SSSI and not related to work under Natural England jurisdiction. Work on Common Land, such as this, is overseen by the Planning Inspectorate and subject to their regulations Joyce Barrus





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### **Badgers on our Farm**

Nearly five years ago, Defra asked if they could find a group of farmers locally to test a badger vaccine and came to assess the number of badger sets we had. They installed night cameras around our farm buildings. These stayed for nearly two years with some very good photos of badgers, and other animals, around the buildings at night. Defra fed the badgers red and blue pills mixed with peanuts and syrup to find out where their latrines were.

They came up with two mother sets and fourteen single holes within five hundred metres of our buildings and found that their latrines were all on our property.

They then vaccinated the badgers: Cages were laid out on badger runs for a few days, baited with peanuts and syrup. Then the cages were set. Defra returned early in the mornings to the cages, snipping a piece of hair as to mark, then spot spraying and vaccinating the badgers before letting them go. The spot spray and hair was to identify the badgers which had been vaccinated, so they were not vaccinated again if they came back for more over the next couple of nights. Then the cages were removed.

Defra followed this up with trials to see if badgers could be fed on oral vaccine (when the time comes) by placing the peanuts and syrup under slabs of big stones to stop other animals from getting to it. The badgers soon had the slabs and stones off to get to the food.

Over the last two years of trapping, Defra caught and vaccinated twenty eight badgers in the first year, a three way split of old, middle aged and youngsters. This last time they caught seventeen badgers, which they believe had been babies still underground the previous time.

# **Canals in the Landscape**

#### With the Field Club

The Field Club's first illustrated lecture of 2014 will be given by Tony Conder on Wednesday 8th January at 2.30 pm, in the Beacon Hall, Painswick Centre.



For many years, Tony was Curator with British Waterways, the body established to care for 2,000 miles of historic waterways and now superseded by the Canals and Rivers Trust. As Curator, he scoured the country for artefacts from the canal age. In the 1980's, he moved to Gloucester to open the National Waterways Museum and helped to develop Gloucester Docks. His talk 'Canals in the Landscape' will reveal the impact of building canals through Britain. Some canals follow a quiet, rural course, along river corridors; others, however, demand magnificent feats of engineering to cross-challenging topography.

### "Feathers and Flight" & Winter Wandering :



Painswick Town Hall for a scientific evaluation of "Feathers and Flight" by Dr Tim Sellers. Species feather counts are amazingly uniform, density highest on head and neck to mitigate heat loss. Linear tracts of feather attachment to wing and body, the narrower, stiffer leading edge of wing feathers (outer vane) and the wider inner vane for overlap confer streamlining, also repelling wind and wet. Distally angled barbs branch to barbules that can hook and unhook, creating a strong mesh and trapping much air for insulation and buoyancy (ergo 'light as a feather!')

So, excitingly emergent, came a vision of the wonder of bird form – flight design clues in Filton's past, even future? Then the demo - lateral airflow over a suspended paper that then rose to the horizontal. Would we find Berneville bewildering (density/ pressure/ velocity theorem) or recognise that greater wing angles of attack confer a much greater lift/drag ratio?

What a fascinating analysis of bird design and flight! Extra wing length enables predators to carry prey, while tail feathers are vital for flight direction and stability and contribute to control in safely alighting from immense momentum. And could peregrine falcons in the Gorge ever get g-force blackout? Going back to school can be good!

The first Bird Club meeting of 2014 will be a Field Trip on the 27th January at the Cotswold Water Park where Philip Williams, bird ringer, will point out some of the area's winter visitors. ### New Year greetings from your Village Agent

I would like to start 2014 with giving details of some very positive and helpful schemes available in our country. First port of call is The Red Cross. Most of us are aware of the incredible humanitarian work they do for people in other countries. Recently they have entered a scheme called "Positive Steps" along with "Mears Safe at Home Service". If you have had, or are at risk of falling, are feeling socially isolated, worried that your house is cold or have relatives living with you who are at risk of falling, they can provide help. They (or Mears) will come and do a free home safety check and can arrange with your consent, the necessary adaptations. Additionally they can provide up to 6 visits to support you. That might be doing some shopping, helping you to access local activities, put you in contact with other agencies, or perhaps collect your prescriptions. This could be a really helpful service if you've had an illness or spell in hospital and are no longer eligible for support through The Enablement team (Social Services), and Age UK's "Home from Hospital" service.

More good news is the "Surviving Winter" grant. 300 elderly people in Gloucestershire are at risk of dying as a result of fuel poverty this winter. A number of our elderly are struggling to keep warm, with many choosing between eating and heating. Winter can be a long, cold and miserable season for some. If you don't really need your winter fuel payment and would like to make a donation, please donate now to the "Surviving Winter" appeal

Are you an older person living in fuel poverty\* and need additional support to heat your home and eat properly in the cold weather? A Surviving Winter grant may help. You must live in Gloucestershire to apply. A grant of £125 could assist you with:

Paying your fuel bill, purchasing oil, or an oil heater, or go towards your fuel bills, or even buying a warm blanket.

Depending on your circumstances you may be able to apply for additional support and Age UK may also consider applications from other individuals in need who are disabled or suffering extreme hardship.

I look forward to spending 2014 as your Village Agent, so please call me if you are over 50 and requiring help to access information and support. I am also one of the Specialist Agents in this area providing help and support to anyone over 18 affected by cancer (that would include carers, family and friends)
