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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS 10th December by Terry Parker

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear.

The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office.

PLANNING C OMMITTEE

There were no public questions. Apologies for absence had been received from Cllrs Ian James and David Oxendale. Committee Chairman, Cllr Rob Lewis, welcomed Cllr Michael Fletcher to his first Parish Council meeting.

Seating arrangements.

The public seating was now opposite that of the Council members. A member of the public said that the new arrangements meant that the public had their backs to the west-facing wall on which the details of planning applications were projected which made it difficult to follow the proceedings.

Matters requiring a decision

a. The Bungalow Barn at Hill Farm planning application. The Chairman, Cllr Rob Lewis, reminded members that the Council had supported the Listed Building application. There were Horseshoe Bats living in the barn which were a protected species. There was the need to carry out a survey. The District Council was seeking the advice of an independent bat authority. The Committee agreed to support the application subject to the findings of the survey.

b. Little Fleece, Bisley Street. Proposed internal alterations to the existing kitchen and bathroom to provide improved facilities. Support.

c. Barn to South of Holcombe House. Single storey extension to Barn. Planning and Listed Building applications. Support. d. Land at Brownshill Court, Wick Street. Reinstatement of stable outbuildings. Planning and Listed Building applications. Support.

e. The Gables, Friday Street. Removal of early 20th C partitions at first floor to reveal decorative 16th C plasterwork ceilings. Repair plasterwork using traditional methods and materials. Erection of new partition walls corresponding with the limits of the plasterwork ceilings. Provision of new bathroom. Convert current stone garage to a bedroom for a dependant relative for whom the applicant is the registered carer. Erection of single storey extension adjacent to new bedroom on existing garden terrace to form library/ sitting room.

Planning and Listed Building applications. Support.

f. Ållways, Kingsmead. Single story extension. Support.

g. The Coach House, Sevenleaze Lane, Edge. Two storey side and single storey rear extensions. Support.

h. Land parcel west of Prospect Cottage, Bulls Cross, Sheepscombe. Application for two new dwellings. Support.

i. Gazebo and Blow Family memorials, Severnleaze Lane, Edge. Replace tiles on roof. Support.

j. Trees at Lower Washwell Lane.

Hornbeam (T1): Dismantle due to damage and decay of large branches overhanging road neighbour's property. The Committee agreed to support the removal of the damaged limbs if the tree is healthy. k. Woodsend, Butt Green. Whitebeam

x 1. Remove the leaning stem over the footpath. Norway Maple. Reduce 2m from tips. Support.

PARISH COUNCIL

Public questions.

There were two questions. One related to policing in Painswick and the other to the feasibility of the Parish Council purchasing a post box for community use. Policing in Painswick

Mr Michael Shute asked the Chairman whether the Council was satisfied with the level of policing in Painswick. He said that the limited police presence in Painswick was a matter of considerable concern, particularly in light of the amount of tax parishioners were paying to the Police Authority. He noted that Painswick's Police & Community Safety Officer (PCSO) had not attended recent Parish Council meetings. The Chairman, Cllr Martin Slinger, said he would seek a response from the Constabulary. Cllr Lewis said that he had received satisfactory responses on five occasions using the 101 system.

Beacon comment. Cllr Slinger has been informed by the Constabulary that they have limited resources. Painswick's PCSO has responsibility for eight parishes. Community post box.

In response to Mr Terry Parker's question concerning the possibility of a community owned post box, Cllr Slinger said the matter would be discussed later in the meeting when there was to be an update on the Painswick Post Office Service. Apologies.

Apologies had been received from Cllrs Ian James and David Oxendale, and from County Councillor Jason Bullingham and District Councillor Julie Job.

County Councillor's report.

In his written report Cllr Bullingham referred to the preparations being made by the County Council for the winter. This year Gloucestershire has just over 12,000 tonnes of salt in store, treble the amount held six years ago. Local snow plough operators are out in the communities to help clear snow off local roads so that the County Council can concentrate on keeping the main roads open. There are over 100 salt hand-spreaders out with the communities ready for the colder spells and the council has delivered over 1000 bags for salt to the local parish councils for this coming winter season.

Between April and October more than

58,000 tonnes of new material was laid to fix worn out roads across the county with 42km of new road surface, 66km of roads resurfaced with micro and surface dressing and further areas equivalent to 56 football pitches have been patched. As well as planned resurfacing, surface dressing and patching over the summer, more than 15,000 potholes have been filled since April, and more than 4350 miles of grass verges have been cut to make sure drivers can see safely at junctions and roundabouts. In addition, highway crews emptied more than 20,000 gullies so that water can freely drain away from roads and footpaths, helping to prevent future flooding.

Cllr Martin Slinger said that he had not yet been given authority by the County Council to use his snow plough.

Beacon comment. Cllr Slinger told the Beacon that he had contacted Cllr Bullingham and authority has now been given.

District Councillor's report.

Cllr Nigel Cooper told the members that the draft Local Plan had been finalised and was being forwarded to the Planning Inspectorate for ratification. Cllr Cooper said that an overall flood management plan had been proposed. It would be taken to the Local Environment Partnership.

Painswick Post Office Service.

Cllr Slinger updated the members on the proposed "Outreach" Post Office Service, the details of which were reported in the December Beacon.

Concerning the wide-mouthed post box, Cllr Slinger said that a letter had been received from the Member of Parliament, Neil Carmichael, in which he reported on a meeting he had had with Royal Mail officials. Mr Carmichael was optimistic that the matter would be resolved shortly. Martin Slinger then turned to the public question which had been submitted to the Parish Council in writing and circulated to the members in advance of the meeting. The questioner asked, "Given the continuing absence of a wide-mouthed post box in the centre of the village, has the Parish Council considered purchasing its own box for the use of the community and if so, whether the council would be responsible for taking the deposited mail to a Royal Mail collection point". The Clerk to the Parish Council, Mr Roy Balgobin, told the members that the cost of the post box was £119 and, if approved, the intention was to have a daily collection at 1.30pm throughout the working week. The

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collection would be effected by the Parish Council staff and taken to the Stroud Royal Mail Office.

Opening the debate, the Slad representative and Parish Council Vice-Chairman Cllr Caroline White, said that she was opposed to the proposal. Her reasons were that the community had coped without the post box for some time and she thought it reasonable to expect parishioners to wait until February when the "Outreach" Post Office service would commence. She was also concerned about the council's liability in handling the mail. On this point Mr Balgobin commented that the council would issue a disclaimer. No-one spoke in favour of the proposal. On being put to the vote the proposition was unanimously defeated.

Cllr Abigail Smith asked that the Parish Council's thanks to Cllrs Oxendale and Slinger for their part in achieving the "Outreach" Post Office service be recorded in the minutes of the meeting. This was agreed. A brief discussion then took place about how the Parish Council could best publicise the continuing absence of the post box, possibly involving Radio Gloucestershire.

The Love Painswick Business Group.

Cllr Abigail Smith gave the Council a report on the group's recent meetings. Cllr Smith reported that, following the Brand Painswick workshop held on 4th November, the results were presented to a wider group of interested businesses and other parties on 27th November. The colours, typography and logo had drawn on the expertise of international specialists with local connections and were welcomed by all in attendance. To continue moving forward, Cllr Smith said that the group recognised the need to formalise terms of reference and a working group had been formed to do this, supported by Barbara Pond from the Gloucestershire Rural Community Council. She said the aim was to finalise this work by the end of January for presentation at a public meeting which would also be used to present the proposed new brand to the

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 www.leighyoung.co.uk 01453 762114 community. The agreement of the Terms of Reference and the new brand underpin the subsequent activity to develop a website for launch before Easter to better promote Painswick to a global and local audience.

St Mary's Street public conveniences.

The Clerk provided details of the estimates for the improvements to the Ladies and Gentlemen's conveniences. There had been several enquiries about the rental of the former Ladies and Gentlemen's toilet buildings. The subject was to be an agenda item at the January Parish Council meeting.

Induction Loop System in the Lower Town Hall. The members agreed to accept the quote of $\pounds 1,295$ for the installation of the system. Cllr Morris was to continue to give consideration to the provision of a suitable microphone system.

Open Spaces Society.

It was agreed to join the Society. The joining fee was £45.

Ward reports.

Concern about the phasing of the A46 traffic lights had been expressed by members of the public. The Clerk would refer the concerns to the County Council.

Meeting closure. The meeting closed at 9.20pm.

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Community Activities Grant Scheme

The Community Activities Grant Scheme is a grant fund to support small grass roots charities and community groups in Gloucestershire to create new social and physical activities.

Grants are available for community, voluntary or self-help groups to run projects to deliver positive social impact. Examples of this could be:

The purchase of equipment such as bowling mats and other sports equipment

The payment of hall hire fees so that activities such as Pilates, T'ai Chi and dancing can take place.

Grants to luncheon clubs to provide afterlunch activities.

Grants are available from $\pm 300 - \pm 1,000$. No match funding is needed. The overall project cost should not exceed $\pm 1,000$ (as a rule of thumb). Grant applications for projects which involve older people (aged 50+) will have priority, however activities which target any age group will also be considered. Grants will not be given to enable an activity to be continued unless it can be demonstrated that numbers enjoying the activity will be increased.

Grant applications will need to come from the community group planning on setting up an activity. Barbara Pond

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Young Painswickian of the Year

Alicia Barnett is Young Painswickian for 2014. Truly a Painswick girl, her achievements have almost single-handedly raised the profile of Painswick Tennis Club to recognition at a national level, though she would be the first to say that it has been a team effort.

Alicia started to play tennis aged seven. A pupil at the Croft School, she liked the game from the beginning, always persisted and definitely aspired to be as good as her older brother. She feels she was lucky to have first-rate coaching at the club and later, when a student at Stroud High School, had the added bonus of an excellent PE teacher who gave her great encouragement. The school in fact reached national level competitively, the only state school to do so. And last year Alicia had a world ranking – a real accomplishment.

Painswick has benefited enormously from Alicia's achievement. It certainly played a key role in bringing about much improved facilities at the club including two extra floodlit courts. The standard of

play locally has unquestionably been elevated to a much higher level recently and much of this is due to Alicia being seen by young players as a role model. Regardless of commitments elsewhere she always plays in the Summer League in Painswick and is to be found practising on the courts in all weathers. She truly appreciates the facilities at the club.

Commenting on the strong community spirit in Painswick, Alicia points out that this is also very evident at the club. "A lot of people have worked hard there with the result that there is a really good atmosphere. It's like a family," she says. She is also keen to explain that "... the coaches are great, really passionate."

Alicia has just completed her first term at Northwestern University, Illinois where she is studying political science. She recognises that, despite her provess in the world of tennis, education is very important. Studying in the United States does enable her to study and train in tandem without complications. As for the future ... it's something of an open book at present with several possible options. However, she does regard Painswick as home and definitely wants to find a way to inspire children here to achieve as she herself has done. This articulate and personable young woman is a worthy winner of the title Young Painswickian of the Year.

Your Citizens Advice Bureau

As we start the New Year, can I remind you of the work of the Stroud and District Citizens Advice Bureau. It is our local Bureau, with offices in Stroud and throughout the District. Its aim is to advise people on their rights and responsibilities in the problems they face, and help get them resolved.

One situation stays in my mind. A man came to the Bureau and was extremely stressed and not able to think clearly because he faced several inter-related problems. As his problems were structured in discussion with an advisor, he slowly became less agitated and better able to consider options for a way forward – and even to help himself on some issues. I feel the Bureau is the real fourth emergency service.

Last year the Bureau helped some 4,000 people across the District (including about 60 from Painswick parish). Each person has an initial interview, either over the phone or at one of our offices. Those who can help themselves are encouraged to do so, as resources are limited. Sometimes people are redirected to other organisations that can help. For others more help is offered. Typically people have 2 or 3 issues to address and will require two or more contacts with advisors. To advise people effectively requires expertise and knowledge as well as people and investigative skills to get to the bottom of a problem.

None of this comes without cost. The Bureau is a local charity and grateful for the support it receives – not least from Stroud District Council. I am proud to report that Painswick has a relatively generous record – both in terms of volunteers and in donations – and for that the Bureau is very grateful. But increasingly it has to turn to the generosity of local people to help maintain the service. So I ask if you would consider supporting the Bureau. If you would, please ask for standing order/donation and gift aid forms. Painswickians of the Year

David and Andrea Linsell have been quietly and consistently working away for the benefit of others in Painswick and beyond for over 30 years. It is therefore fitting and timely that they should be voted this 2014's Painswickians.

Although involved in different projects and causes they are very supportive of each other's activities. Andrea is currently chairman of Stroud and District Mencap. Her involvement began with fund-raising in 1979 and has developed continuously since then. As she points out, it has always been a cooperative venture started by parents of children with mental disabilities. Over the years it has gone from strength to strength and Stroud Mencap now owns five homes locally which are managed by Stroud Homes Foundation of which Andrea is a trustee and vice-chair. This puts considerable responsibilities on Andrea's shoulders - legal, financial and administrative – thus requiring 100% commitment.

Throughout much of this time Andrea was also pursuing her career as



an occupational therapist at Standish and Cashes Green hospitals and bringing up her two children. She explains that Painswick has always been very supportive, so much of the fund-raising activity has been centred here. For many years she organised the Christmas fairs in Stroud Subscription Rooms with David as Father Christmas!

For most of us this would be more than enough but for Andrea a further cause to be embraced is Cupcakes for Carers. She feels this is very important and emphasises that it is a very dedicated support group for people who truly benefit from it. With her specialist career knowledge she is able to make a valuable and essential contribution regarding technical equipment and paperwork and she makes the coffee and cakes for the monthly meetings. Andrea loves painting and cooking and does the catering for Painswick Bowling Club. Andrea's efforts have been unstinting for 35 years and despite a bout of serious ill health in recent years she has persevered with true magnanimity to work for causes close to her heart.

David's commitment has been equally generous in his work for the Painswick Centre. Characteristically, he insists that it is the team of trustees who should be commended but "...he does a huge amount of work quietly" says Andrea. As Chairman of the Trustees he has overseen a tremendous programme of updating to the building during the last few years. His responsibilities are wide-ranging including finance, general management, repairs and maintenance. There are very few complaints because he is so efficient. David, though, considers himself merely a sort of dog's body!

Never missing a function and working tirelessly with the team of trustees, he is certainly very dedicated. He runs the table tennis club pointing out that all monies raised go to the Centre. A firm believer in the original and continuing purpose as a community resource, he is proud of the Centre and the way it has developed. He is completely and enthusiastically involved.

David is also heavily involved, as treasurer, in the Community Lunches at Ashwell. Together with the organiser he decides to which good causes or charities, always at least one in Painswick, the money raised will go. The lunches take place on 20 Mondays throughout the winter. "I like the thought when I write the cheques that it will benefit a needy cause. It's good to know." he says. For some years David was a voluntary advanced driving instructor and he was also a minibus driver trainer for Mencap and care home drivers. (He explains that he does have a passion for cars.) He also enjoys playing tennis and he and Andrea were cub and guide leaders in the past.

This is an extraordinary husband and wife team, dedicated and committed and often working together, always on a voluntary basis, for the good of others. They wish to thank those who nominated them but verily they are worthy of the accolade – Painswickians of the Year.

Treasures, Trinkets and Crystals

- With the Field Club

The Field Club's first illustrated lecture of 2015 will be given by Kurt Adams, Finds Liaison Officer for Avon & Gloucestershire who will talk about 'Archaeological Treasures and Trinkets'. The meeting starts at 2.30 pm on Wednesday 7th January, at our regular venue, the Beacon Hall in the Painswick Centre.

Kurt will describe how the finds reported by the public under the Portable Antiquities Scheme since 1997 and Treasure Act 1996 are rewriting this country's archaeology and history. There have been some astonishing new discoveries in Gloucestershire, including three beautiful Bronze Age children's pure gold bracelets discovered in a field near Lydney using metal detectors.

At the following meeting, on Wednesday 4th February at 2.30 pm, we welcome Dr Roy Starkey. In his talk 'Crystal Mountains' based on the book of the same name, Roy will tell the story of the early crystal hunters who roamed the Cairngorm mountains in search of Scotland's most famous gem – the smoky quartz or 'cairngorm'. With stunning visuals, Roy will describe the history of the hunters' arduous and uncertain quest for the uncut crystals (example pictured) and the geological events that led to the gems' occurrence.

Painswick Beacon has been a busy place this year, 2015 will be similar but different. You have probably seen the cattle grazing from March to December. They have done a lot of good eating. They have also cut up the surface, - quite a lot on their preferred routes, - where we hope flower seeds may have a better chance to become established before

the grass grows back thickly. From September to April you may have seen Saturday morning Painswick Beacon Conservation Group work parties. You are always welcome to join in!

You probably didn't see 350 Wild Thyme being planted on the Hill Fort Ramparts. These are to encourage Large Blue butterflies. Last year it was 1,000 cowslips for the Duke of Burgundy butterfly. This work is the Beacon's contribution to the Painswick Valleys Butterfly project, financed by Biffa from the Landfill Tax they collect when your builder empties a skip.

Another Biffa funded project was the installation by Pipeline Logistics of permanent mains water to all four paddocks. Mike Hoey, President of the Golf Club, generously gave many days for management and dealing with the slow moving bureaucracies. It all takes time! At a rough estimate, including work parties, fencing, watering and cattle checking the Beacon has benefited from 660 hours of volunteer time in the last year. About the equivalent of nearly 19 weeks of a full time employee, well done everybody. *David Bishop, Chairman and David Allott, Vice Chairman*

Painswick surgery news

Out of Hours Emergency GP Service:

Just a reminder that emergency cover is provided by local doctors and nurses in conjunction with the Ambulance Trust. Patients are still able to contact a doctor in an emergency out of normal surgery hours and if you do need a doctor in an emergency after 6 pm in the evening and before 8.30 am in the morning, please telephone the emergency out of hours service directly on NHS111. You may still telephone the surgery line out of hours - 01452 812545 - and you will automatically be diverted to the emergency call centre.

Out of Area Registrations

Painswick Surgery will not be signing up to the Out of Area Registration system which comes into effect on 5th January 2015. We can only accept new patients who are resident within our Practice boundary. If you are moving outside of our boundary you will need to register with a GP more local to you as soon as you can.

Our practice boundary edge goes in a sort of oval shape covering Haresfield, Brookthorpe (to where it meets the motorway bridge), Upton St Leonards, Birdlip, Miserden, Bisley, Slad, - with Painswick, Edge, Sheepscombe, Cranham, The Camp and Paradise in the 'middle' of the oval! We do have a boundary map in the reception fover, but if you're unsure, please ask and we can confirm for you. **Extended hours**.

We are pleased to confirm that we do offer an 'extended hours' surgery on a Monday morning from 7 am to 8 am when you can see either a GP or a Practice Nurse. Although we are not allowed to embargo these slots for patients who work as such, we hope that our patients who are retired would prefer to have a bit of a lie in and not want to take up these appointments!

Home Visit Requests:

We know it is often very difficult to get through to the surgery some mornings at 8.30 when we take the calls back from the Out of Hours Service. We have increased the number of incoming telephone lines to accommodate more calls, but we try to deal with emergency calls first thing and patients who need to be seen that morning.

We would be grateful, if you do need a home visit, if you could call in by 10.30 am if at all possible. This way, the doctors can allocate visits as soon as they finish their morning surgery.

The Bells

Painswick is fortunate in having one of the best rings of bells in the country and the current ringers have a difficult task living up to the achievements of their predecessors. Even today few towers have beaten the most notable record which was the ringing of 17,187 changes in 11 hrs and 32 mins in November 1930.

There are believed to have been bells at Painswick in the 1600's soon after the tower was built but details of these are not known. The current bells are based around a set of 10 that were cast by Abraham Rudhall in his foundry at Gloucester in 1731. This family of bell founders considered them to be amongst their best work. Over the years there have been various additions to our bells and there are now a total of 14 bells in the tower including the original 10 bells. The heaviest, tenor, bell weighs nearly 26 cwt. The bells are now hung in a metal frame. Visitors can admire the timbers from the original wooden bell frame which was used in the construction of the Lychgate at the west entrance to the churchyard.

The ringers are known collectively as the "Ancient Society of Painswick Youths". This society was formed in 1686 and thus can claim to be the oldest society in Painswick. Bell-ringing used to be an all-male preserve and ringers were paid. Nowadays it is a volunteer activity for young and old, male and female.

The bells are rung regularly for the main Sunday services (starting at 9.00 am for the 9.30 am service) and for weddings and other special occasions such as Art Couture. We



practice on Tuesday nights starting at 7.30 pm. Ringing visitors and potential ringers are welcome. The ringing chamber entrance is up the steps on the north face of the tower (underneath the clock face).

Hedge laying in Painswick.

We had our hedge laid using the traditional method of pleachers, stakes and heathering (bindings), in 1992, two years after we moved into our house. For about 15 years, we lightly trimmed the hedge every late winter. It was allowed to grow naturally for another 5 years, when it had then reached a height of some 4 metres.



After much searching, we were fortunate to find Robert Price and his son Ben, who are trained in this very ancient of country crafts. The results of their work are astonishingly pleasing to the eye and their work deserves encouragement. We have now ensured that this stretch of hedge will continue to thrive and nurture the many colonies of local wildlife. *Craig Dunn*

Rural Jottings

Christmas around the farm

We have been bringing the cattle into the sheds for the winter: As we were walking out across four fields, one of our young farm cats followed, including crossing a stream. This cat stayed with us as we rounded the cattle up and headed for home, not a bit frightened.

It is busy organizing Christmas on the farm, working out the amount of feed needed to be delivered to keep the livestock fed till at least the end of the first week of January. Also, diesel, to keep the tractors and other main farm vehicles going. We still have to feed our livestock over Christmas and the New Year, with our homegrown silage and hay, clean out and bed them down with straw.

We have to ensure our hedges are stockproof. Hedge laying is very expensive to do; and labour intensive, using hand tools. So now, we find it cheaper to use stakes and barbed wire. We tend to buy three or four inch, round stakes, each five foot six long - in the thousands! So thousands of trees are being cut down.

PROPERTY REPORT for January from Murrays

Firstly Murrays Estate Agents would like to wish everyone a very Happy New Year and hope that you have all had a lovely Christmas and enjoyed the festivities!

Stamp duty will therefore be calculated as follows: $\pounds 0-\pounds 125,000 - no$ stamp duty, $\pounds 125,000-\pounds 250,000$ is 2%, $\pounds 250,001 - \pounds 925,000$ is 5%, $\pounds 925,001 - \pounds 1.5$ million is 10% and more than $\pounds 1.5$ million is 12%. Thus meaning that 98% of home buyers will now be paying less than before. For example for a property bought at $\pounds 510,000$, the total stamp duty would have been $\pounds 20,4000$ (a flat rate of 4%). Now that home would attract a stamp duty of only $\pounds 15,500$, and you'll be saving $\pounds 4,900$. This can only be a good thing for the property market and it looks as though this will boost the market in the New Year. In our opinion, the Chancellor's reform of stamp duty will prove a major boost to the property market in the New Year. The old 'slab system' only distorted the market while on present prices the vast majority of purchasers will see significant savings which should boost demand. Looking further ahead however there is the prospect of the General Election in May 2015, the result of which is currently more difficult to predict than ever.

Unfortunately the one thing the property market hates is uncertainty. So our advice to anyone thinking of selling next year is seek professional advice and plan ahead now. Take advantage of the impetus this reform to stamp duty will provide, before the inevitable hiatus in April/May when prospective purchasers will almost inevitably hold back to see who is in power thereafter. Most of us spend a lot of time indoors in winter, so it's important that you are comfortable and safe there. And it's essential that you keep your home warm. Low temperatures increase the risk of flu and other respiratory problems and can raise blood pressure. Blood pressure takes longer to return



to normal in older people after being out in the cold, increasing the risk of heart attacks and strokes. The colder your home, the higher the risk to your health. Keep your main living room around 70°F/21°C, and the rest of the house should be heated to at least 64°F/18°C.

Many of us worry about rising fuel costs, so it's important to make sure you're not missing out on any benefits or discounts you're entitled to that will help you keep your home warm.

Most people born before 5th July 1952 are entitled to the Winter Fuel Payment in 2014–15 to help with heating costs. This is a tax-free payment of between £100 and £300 paid to you between November and December. Previous recipients should have been paid automatically, but if this is the first year that you are eligible, contact the Winter Fuel Payment helpline to ensure that you don't miss out.

If you receive Pension Credit, or certain other benefits, you're automatically paid a Cold Weather Payment when the temperature is at 0°C (32°F) or below for seven days in a row. You may be entitled to a Warm Home Discount on your electricity bill if you receive Pension Credit or if you're on a low income. It's a one-off discount usually made between October and March. Check with your energy supplier or ask an advice agency such as Age UK. Find out more at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme. Contact your energy supplier if you're having trouble paying your bills. Companies should not disconnect all pensioner households during the winter months. I am aware of some help available at

the moment for grants for "surviving winter". If you would like to know more, give me a ring. Check your current energy tariff and shop around to see if you can get a better deal. Age UK have a fact sheet called "switching Energy Supplier". If you are unable to get it from them, I can get

you a copy. The Age UK Group has an association with E.ON which offers an Age UK energy tariff. For more information, call E.ON on 0800 015 6784.
