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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS from the Council meeting on March 21st by Mike Kerton

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear.

The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office and on-line at the Parish Council's web site.

PLANNING COMMITTEE

Chairman Cllr Rob Lewis opened the Meeting and as there were no public questions moved quickly on to the Agenda.

Apologies for absence

The Council accepted apologies for absence from Cllrs Roey Parker, James Cross and Rosie Nash.

Matters Arising not on this Agenda

Chairman, Cllr Rob Lewis, advised the Meeting that Stroud District Council had "called in" the Planning Application for 4 Court Orchard, ref S.18/0217/FUL.

Matters requiring a decision

There were eight matters requiring a decision:

- S.18/0083/HHOLD STEPPING STONE COTTAGE, Kings Mill Lane. Revised plans. Erection of extensions and replacement garage. The revised plans were received by the Council on the 5th March with only 10 days to respond. As there no Planning Meeting scheduled the Council had not discussed the revised Application. After the expiry of the 10 days Chairman Cllr Rob Lewis contacted the District Council seeking an extension of time but was told that the Council had granted permission despite no comment being received from Painswick. Prior to the introduction of the new Planning Portal copies of the Officers recommendations on planning applications were shown on the web site. Since the introduction of the new portal this is no longer the case. The council agreed that a letter be sent to the District Council requesting that copies of the Officers' recommendations are attached to all Planning Applications.
- S.18/0240/FUL DILLAY FARM. Erection of detached outbuilding to accommodate self contained staff accommodation, covered parking and storage and associated earthworks. Unanimous support.
- S.18/0471/HHOLD THE GABLES, Jacks Green, Sheepscombe. Addition of two timber framed gables and associated alterations. Unanimous Support.
- S.18/0459/CPE THE OLD STABLES. Bunnage Fields Farm, The Camp. Lawful Development Certificate for an existing dwelling at the Old Stables. Currently the Applicant is paying separate Council Tax on a Stable and a Farm House. They are to be combined into one unit. Unanimous support subject to the Application meeting any legal requirements.
- S.18/0213/FUL SEVENACRES, The Camp. Siting of six glamping cabins and new access track. The Council have previously supported a similar Application. Unanimous support subject to the necessary licensing requirements being met.
- S.18/0502/HHOLD THE WOOL BARN, Far End, Sheepscombe. Two storey extension to create a lower ground floor level store and a larger garage. Unanimous support.
- S.18/0516/LBC LOVEDAYS MILL, Beeches Lane. Proposal for a new Entrance porch to 19th century Mill extension, in addition to renewal of roof coverings, new external door opening to rear, replacement of existing Kitchen door and various repairs to building fabric. Unanimous support.
- S.18/0550/HHOLD EASTLEA, Back Lane, Edge. Single storey rear extension. Unanimous support.

PARISH COUNCIL

Chairman Cllr Martin Slinger opened the Meeting and asked if there were any public questions.

Public Questions

Jason Bullingham requested details of the number of accidents involving vehicles and pedestrians over the last 20 years in the proposed traffic calming area of New Street and Gloucester Street. He considered speed cameras had a greater impact on reducing speed levels, with a potential for speeding fines. He was also concerned that the proposed measures would increase air and noise pollution, possibly cause damage to listed buildings and devalue properties in the area involved. Councils in other areas of the UK were now removing similar schemes due to increased pollution levels. Speeding was an issue for the Police.

Francis Roden was not present at the Meeting but had submitted the following written question:

"The survey has been framed in a way to obtain views of residents many of whom will not be directly affected by any possible traffic calming measures, so are you proposing a second survey from residents along the A46 ad B4073 who will be directly and potentially affected by increased vibration, pollution and noise from potential measures?"

Cllr Abigail Smith, Chair of the Traffic Committee, replied stating that the erection of Speed Cameras was being explored but due to the "nil" accident rate it would seem that one of the basic criteria for installation would not be met. The survey is a way of finding out local opinions on traffic calming schemes. However, she confirmed that all residents along the A46 and B4073, who would be directly affected, have been or will be individually visited by a Cllr to seek their views. Also, if any scheme is to be considered further public consultation will be conducted.

David Allott then read out a lengthy draft letter he was proposing to send to the County Council and Ameys (Highways

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Contractors) relating to the A46. He was concerned about the poor signage for the recent road works adjacent to the A4173 junction, drainage and the number of pot holes - he had counted over 60 pot holes! The Meeting agreed that County Cllr Keith Rippington would respond to the points raised.

Apologies for absence

The Council accepted apologies for absence from Cllrs James Cross, Roey Parker, Rosie Nash and Mike Fletcher.

County Councillors report

County Cllr Keith Rippington reminded the Meeting that any bids for money from his Highways Local Funding had to be submitted by the end of March. Similarly with the "Growing our Local Communities Fund" applications needed to be submitted by the end of April. He mentioned the proposed closing of the A4173 for resurfacing and the impact on Painswick - SEE ARTICLE ON PAGE 6.

District Councillors Report

District Cllr Nigel Cooper confirmed that he was investigating continuing complaints about the "bin lorry" allegedly driving over the grassed traffic island in Canton Acre. This primarily due to the combination of a narrow road and on road parking. The grassed area was now a "mud bath". He was discussing the matter with County Cllr Keith Rippington.

To consider asking Gloucestershire County Council/Stroud District Council to install Public Electric Vehicle Charging Points in the Parish

Chairman, Cllr Martin Slinger read out a letter that had been received from a local resident requesting that the Council consider erecting Electric Vehicle Charging Points around Painswick. This would encourage visitors with electric

cars to visit the area and recognise that increasing numbers of the public were purchasing electric vehicles. He drew the Councils attention to funding that was available from Central Government. After an interesting discussion it was agreed to refer this matter to the Traffic Committee with a recommendation that due to the narrow lanes and roads in the area that Stamages Lane Car Park seemed to be a suitable site. Also to seek advice from the County Council who are also considering this matter

To consider and approve a format for the Annual Parish Meeting to be held on Wednesday 16th May 2018 between 6 and 9pm

After a discussion the Council agreed to hold a "drop in" type session. Members of the Police, Fire Service, Neighbourhood Wardens, County and District Councillors and other key providers would be invited to "have a table".

Responsible Financial Officer Report

The Council agreed payments in accordance with the report circulated by the Clerk

Ward Reports

Cllr Abigail Smith warmly thanked the Speed Watch Team volunteers for their hard work during the past month. Speed checks had been carried out in both Painswick and Edge. She also expressed her appreciation to the Painswick Beacon Conservation Group for all their recent hard work clearing scrub.

Cllr Ann Daniels reported that the footpath along Pullens Road needs sweeping and the drains need clearing. Also, that despite the loose manhole cover in New Street being reported it had still not been repaired. Clerk, Roy Balgobin will action these points. In addition there was an increase in dog fouling around the village, particularly on the Recreation

Ground and Pullens road. Finally that she had notified the County Highways a leaning tree at the junction of Golf Course Road and the A46.

Cllr Ed Crownshaw reported that Steanbride Lane in Slad was crumbling in places probably caused by heavy works traffic. Clerk, Roy Balgobin to action.

Cllr Dawn Dart reported that she had met with Mr Ross Munro to discuss the Christmas Lights.

Cllr Rob Lewis reported that he was in the process of agreeing to move funds from Love Painswick to the Council to help funds and repairs to the Christmas Lights.

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Hambutts Field

Walkers using Hambutts Field will have noticed that the overgrown hedge alongside the Cotswold Way in the lower half of the field has been lowered, opening up views to the east. Walkers on the Cotswold Way entering the field from the south are now greeted with a panoramic view across to Painswick church, with Longridge Woods in the background and Bulls Cross and Juniper Hill to the south.



The field is managed by a charity, Hambutts Field Trust, which carries out annual maintenance such as hedge and grass cutting, and other work on an as-needed basis. The income to cover this work comes primarily from donations. 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News from the Surgery Patients' Group

Good news - changes are in progress to increase access times for appointments with a particular emphasis on Monday's - the peak day for the surgery. Make sure you have emailed painswickppg@gmail.com to hear news of this as it breaks. The new system will replace the current ChoicePlus scheme and is being led by the cluster of Stroud practices.

Volunteer drivers scheme

Your Patients' Group has been consulting with Minchinhampton PPG who have a well established scheme providing drivers to take people to surgery or hospital appointments. (From Painswick, hospital visits would cost around £10-12 - around a quarter of the cost of a taxi.) This supplements existing arrangements like the Non-Emergency Patient Transport Scheme. Many of their patients prefer this service to Arriva despite that being free of charge. As we consider setting up such a scheme locally, we need to hear from anyone who might be prepared to become a driver in the Painswick area without any commitment at this stage. Just drop an email to painswickppg@gmail.com. We will also need a fund of at least £500 to float the scheme (telephone line, liability insurance etc) and would like to invite local residents to consider a donation. Again, just email if you think you might donate.

See the light?!

In the surgery, lighting improvements are in hand using LEDs for economy and brighter light levels. Unfortunately, the provision of a lift between floors is proving much harder to achieve. The carpets in treatment rooms are another problem as they must be removed for hygiene reasons. It's surprising quite how out of date such a recent building has become.

Stephen Aiano writes

We have been invited to answer yes / no to the question: "Would you support the installation of physical traffic calming measures (e.g. speed cushions, speed tables, pedestrian islands) in the 20mph zone along the A46 and B4073?"

These additional "traffic calming" measures should be rejected as currently proposed because: they will add to air pollution; they will add to noise pollution; they will decrease the heritage townscape value of Painswick; and there is no history of RTA injuries or fatalities that has to be addressed.

What Painswick does need is an integrated management plan for all aspects of vehicles, including the installation of on-street residential chargepoints and responding to the parking needs of the increasing number of both local and visitor cars, in parallel with townscape-sensitive traffic calming measures.

So, for me, the answer to the poll is "no". Instead, I am happy to contribute to the creation of a comprehensive Vehicle Management Plan for Painswick.

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A4173 Resurfacing scheme – A46 to Whaddon

The County Council is preparing to resurface more than 5 miles of carriageway on the A4173, between the A46 and Whaddon. The Council will be using hard-wearing surfacing material with high skid resistance, to future-proof this essential route and make it safer for all who use it. The work will be carried out between Tuesday 10th April and Wednesday 23rd May.


The road will be closed from 7.30am to 17.30pm daily for the duration of the scheme (excluding weekends)

The work will be carried out in six sections. Access to property along the route will be available from one direction or the other for most of the scheme

A guide for local residents (see plan on right)

- Section 1 - A46 to Jenkins Lane.
10th-11th April & 24th -27th April
- Section 2 - Jenkins Lane to St John the Baptist Church
11th-12th April & 30th April- 2nd May
- Section 3 - St John the Baptist Church to Wynstones Dr.
13th-17th April & 24th April & 3rd-11th May
- Section 4 - Wynstones Dr. to St Swithen’s Church
18th April & 14th-15th May
- Section 5 - St Swithen’s Church to Wynstones School
19th-23rd April & 16th-22nd May
- Section 6 - Wynstones School to Whaddon (Grange Rd)
23rd April & 23rd May

I don't know about you, but I'm starting to feel distinctly spring like! Gone (hopefully!) are the snows of winter, the days are lengthening and the trees in the garden have a green sheen as their leaves appear. The school holidays are upon us

This would have been the horticultural high point of the Garden back in the 1740s: a place where the Hyetts would likely have entertained guests with a view to impress. Having taken advice from conservation experts, our team are recreating how this area looked back then. As part of the work, the Exedra will be repainted - all ready for the height of summer warmth in June.

Up in our Café, our spring menu is proving popular. It's the perfect place for coffee with cake, a delicious lunch or tea and freshly-baked scones. There's easy free parking which makes it a popular meeting place - and don't forget you can visit without paying to go into the Garden.

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Probus Club Report



On 28th Feb 2018 we were privileged to welcome Dame Janet Trotter who is the Lord-Lieutenant of Gloucestershire. Supported by 30 deputy lieutenants distributed evenly throughout the region, Dame Janet summed up her role as "to uphold the dignity of the crown".

Dame Janet reflected on her activities in 4 main areas during her 8 year term of office:

- Royal Visits – assisting event organisers with planning and with Palace and Police liaison
- Supporting Excellence – recommending Queens Awards for voluntary service, export etc
- Armed Forces – currently gearing up for the commemoration of the end of WW1
- Building up Civil Society – special interest in foster carers, Age UK, and the Nelson Trust which is a centre of excellence for the treatment of addiction

Mike Bottomley, an admirer of Katherine Parr, came to talk to Painswick Probus on March 14th about her life, achievements and her connection to Gloucestershire. Dressed as Miles Coverdale who, for a time, served as her almoner and spiritual guide at Sudeley Castle, Mike presented a portrait of the most interesting of Henry's queens. He also enlivened his talk with videos he had created using costumed actors at Sudeley castle. Mike summarised Katherine Parr's legacy as being:

- Henry VIII's favourite wife
- The first published female author
- Responsible for the first church service in English
- Involved in the formative years of one of our greatest monarchs
- The only queen buried in Gloucestershire.

The Golden Fleece of the Cotswolds with the Cotteswold Naturalists'



On Wednesday 4th April, we welcome Richard Martin, owner of Filkins, the Cotswold Woollen Weavers. He will describe the importance to England's economy of the 'Golden Fleece' produced by Cotswold sheep, for example, by providing uniforms for Roman legions, bankrolling the Crusades and clothing 18th century Europe with English broadcloth. Today it is still made into splendid block-weave rugs. We meet at 2.30 pm in the Painswick Centre, and visitors are welcome, £4 including tea and biscuits.

Our AGM is fast-approaching and we have an earlier start at 2pm for just 30 minutes of business on Wednesday 2nd May in the Painswick Centre. Then our speaker Bjorn Watson will give us a taste of maritime archaeology when he describes the 'First & last voyage of the Vasa'. The secrets of this Swedish warship were unravelled when it was re-discovered and salvaged, virtually intact, in the 1950's.

We have some last-minute places, single and double/twin rooms (£413 and £393 per head), on our 3-night, 4-day coach excursion with DB&B at the Palace Hotel Buxton visiting some of Derbyshire's finest country houses, gardens and sights. Contact me for further details.

Finally, we have two local guided walks, the first at Crickley Hill Country Park for geology and landscape on Friday 13th April, at 10 am. The second will be an afternoon 'May Day' walk on Tuesday 1st May, looking at the natural history of Woodchester Valley. This will be a 3-mile linear walk, catching the bus one-way.

Talks on "High Street Histories" and "Being a Magistrate"

Although many shopkeepers were content to service their local area there were two early entrepreneurs whose businesses today are household names. In 1792 Henry Walton Smith opened a news vendor business in London and in 1849 John Boot opened a "Herbal Medicine" shop in Nottingham although both men developed successful businesses it was the second generation that recognised the need to expand and open shops in neighbouring towns. The rest is history - Boots the Chemist and W H Smith (name of HW Smith's son) are now household names. A great example of "mighty oaks from acorns grow!"

Then on the 9th March Celia Hargrave spoke to us about "Being a Magistrate". She clearly explained the important role of Magistrates - all criminal cases originate in the Magistrates Court - the necessary training they undertake and that they always sit as a panel of three. She pointed to various members of the Club, requested that they stand and then, to the amusement of Club members, asked them to account for various "crimes" they were alleged to have been involved in. A serious but entertaining afternoon.

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Workshop/Concert at Croft School - At Painswick on 20th February 2018

Another year has passed and once again the annual visit of the Carducci Quartet has provided a musical experience for the pupils of the Croft School.

The morning started with a short extract from a Haydn Quartet. Then the children were involved in an exercise introducing them to the necessity of good timing and coordination in music. First a simple clapping rhythm, then a more complicated sequence that all the quartet and those present joined in. It was enjoyed by everyone and by the end the complicated clapping sequence was pretty well together. A short piece of music for the dance was then played to show how these rhythms were incorporated into music.

The additional instrument for the day was introduced, the French horn played by Jocelyn Lightfoot. She then explained that the sound from this instrument came in quite a different way from the stringed instruments of the quartet.

She then demonstrated how you get sound of this quite different instrument by blowing into the mouthpiece. Nothing happened! Why was that she asked. You did not blow hard enough said one pupil. So she blew harder. Still nothing happened. Then it was all made clear, you have to blow in a special way with pursed lips. A series of sounds then came from the instrument some musical, and some just loud to amuse the pupils.

At this point she joined the quartet to play a movement from a Mozart horn quartet, which was beautifully done.

When this part of the workshop was over a selection of pupils was assembled together with their musical instruments, comprising violins, guitars, recorders, and a piano, probably about twenty all together, all to form an impromptu orchestra. The object was to play a short piece of music under the direction of members of the quartet. Everyone then joined in to make music with considerable enthusiasm, under the skilled and sympathetic direction of all the members of the quartet, as well as the horn player Jocelyn Lightfoot. All applauded at the end of this session which was thoroughly enjoyed by every body present.

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The Croft School meeting with the Parish Council

The Parish Council has written to The Croft School with the answers to a number of questions raised by the children at their meeting with the Parish Councillors earlier this year. Also in attendance at the meeting were Josie Oaks, Stroud District Council Dog Warden and Andy Beamish, Stroud District Council Neighbourhood Warden. In her letter to the school, the Deputy Clerk Mrs Irena Litton said that those attending the meeting had remarked how well behaved the children were. They had been impressed with the agenda put forward by the children and the manner in which they expressed their points of view and their understanding of the complexity of the issues.

In her letter the Deputy Clerk reported that in the Recreation Ground, "the slide has been fixed with a rubber strip which will hopefully 'earth' the slide. We have found issues with the base of the Zip Wire, so we are investigating the best way to repair and improve the experience. The swings have been untwisted, oiled and we have ordered some fittings to prevent the swings being thrown over the bars. Our apprentice, Lucas, has carried out a litter pick. Elsewhere, Andy Beamish carried out a litter pick on the road to Sheepscombe and with regard to dog mess we have ordered a stencil so we can mark the pavement with the 'pick up or pay' motif". Among other issues raised were speeding traffic within the 20mph zone, potholes, traffic light sequence failure and the need for better signage that dogs were required to be kept on leads in the Recreation Ground.

Mrs Litton concluded her letter with thanks to the school for arranging this productive meeting with the Parish Council which is held each year.

Childhood Memories – a wonderful display

It was impossible not to be moved by each and every piece of art work on display at Richmond Retirement Village on Friday, 16th March. This was the finale of the Richmond Inter-Art Competition, Painswick Richmond being this year's host.

Of the Richmond Villages nationwide, six – Painswick, Witney, Northampton, Aston, Letcombe Regis and Bede - were represented in the competition. Residents and staff were invited to submit pieces of art and craft work based on a theme and then each community selected two pieces from each of the five categories to go forward for the final judging in Painswick. This year the theme chosen was Childhood Memories and the categories were drawing, textile art, 3-D art/collage, painting and creative art.

What might have been a fairly pedestrian exercise, that is the judging, in fact turned out to be exceedingly difficult not least because every single entry was a masterpiece of evocation. It was obvious that many hours of thought and work had gone into each one and indeed each one was a worthy winner. Judging ultimately was not based on technical skill, although all were cleverly and carefully produced. The real value came across in abundance in the very personal feelings and fond memories evoked.

Each piece was unique despite the common theme which made judging even more difficult as they were not comparable. The criteria ultimately used focussed mainly on evocation of childhood through representative details – holidays, wartime, play, flowers, gardening, television programmes etc. There was a painting depicting an attic containing various childhood toys, another showing the backs of a grandfather and child looking across a gate, a very realistic clay model of an allotment plot with many tiny vegetables growing, a model of a maypole, a cushion cube with a different memory pictured in coloured cloth on each of its six sides, and so many more of course.

A winner was eventually chosen from each category. There was also an overall winner and this year it was a truly entrancing small book of 26 pages, one for each letter of the alphabet. On each page was a simple picture representing a memory; under W, for example, was a picture of wasps. Named Alphabet of Memories this little book was beautifully thought out and beautifully executed.

This competition was open to all residents. Such projects are, says Kay the Painswick activities manager, extremely beneficial in so many ways: socially through discussion, mentally through focused thinking, imaginatively and of course manually through the production of the works. The result was a stunning set of clear memories beautifully presented, evocative, picturesque and with truly sensitive detail. All involved should definitely be congratulated.

Amazing Yews



I have always liked yews, but only recently realised just what amazing trees they are. They thrive on very low light conditions and can photosynthesise down to -8 deg. C. All parts are toxic apart from the red fruit which is highly nutritious and a valuable food for birds. The toxic seed passes through the bird and is dispersed. Yew is deadly to cattle and horses, but native deer browse young shoots which act as a natural worming agent. Hence for yew saplings to survive they need to grow amongst dense vegetation to be protected from deer.

Yew wood made the best longbows and in Medieval times a thriving import business of bow blanks decimated the European stock of trees. The shortage forced Elizabeth I to convert the army to muskets but it was a hundred years before the superior rate of fire, distance and accuracy of long bows was surpassed.

Britain has some of the best ancient yews in the world, often more than a thousand years old. They can regenerate by coppicing, suckering and layering. Plants can be male or female or both and can even change from one to the other! In Britain yews are often associated with church yards (St Marys is well blessed with them) and across the world wide they have a deep cultural significance. The Beacon has plenty of yews and although they have to be removed from the grazing some will be kept to become ancient trees in the future.

Work parties have continued to be well attended despite some awful wet and cold weather. We will soon stop cutting mainly not to disturb nesting birds and sprouting flora, but it is also much easier to deal with felled trees if they are not in leaf. However there are plenty of pines which need felling and I plan to continue doing this through the summer where it is safe to do so.
