New Drive outline application refused Only a partial victory for campaigners

After six months of consideration, planners at Stroud District Council have refused the outline application for development of eight houses on the field below New Drive, between Stamages Lane and Kemps Lane. However only a single reason for refusal is given, that "Insufficient information has been submitted to demonstrate a viable and sustainable surface water drainage scheme".

This is a significant victory for campaigners, who have organised as 'The Friends of New Drive Field', but leaves open the possibility that the developers could return with a new application and a revised drainage scheme. Significantly the application has not been refused for reasons of landscape sensitivity, despite the site having been earlier rejected on these grounds by planners drawing up the new Local Plan. There is also no mention of the traffic issues that have been a major focus of the campaign against the development. David Allott, one of the principal organisers of the campaign has advised local residents to "leave the champagne on ice" for the moment.



The application relied on an existing drain, which is believed to run from the field across Woodborough Close and Kingsmill Lane down into the Painswick Stream. However the exact course of the drain is unknown and perhaps even more importantly, its size and condition is uncertain. Concerns over drainage have been heightened recently by the major sinkhole that appeared a little further across the slope at Richmond Village earlier this year. There have also been issues in the recent past at Randall's Field and it is known

Tibbiwell application withdrawn

the presence of Fuller's Earth that can be unstable.

In a parallel development, the application to build an uncompromisingly modern house in the Conservation Area at Prospect Terrace off Tibbiwell, has been withdrawn, despite being cleared by the Conservation Team. The archaeologist at Gloucestershire County Council, noting that the site is within Painswick's medieval settlement area, has asked for an initial 'desk-based' archaeological survey, while the Biodiversity Officer has requested a reptile survey. Withdrawal of the application may be temporary, in order to meet these requests, given the surprisingly positive assessment of the Conservation Officers. They say that "the proposed development would provide a contrast between the old and the new and would sit comfortably with the existing pattern of development". Even more encouragingly for the developer, they add that it would "preserve the character and appearance of the conservation area and cause no harm to the settings of the nearby listed buildings".

Local campaigners have reacted cautiously to news of the application being withdrawn. They too may be leaving the champagne on ice. Richard Lovell, who lives nearby, says it's a common tactic for developers to withdraw and then re-submit, putting the onus on objectors to renew their comments.

PLANNING COMMITTEE

Chairman Cllr Rob Lewis opened the Meeting in Edge Village Hall. One member of the public was present, Mr David Allott, who had submitted a question asking the Committee to commit some time to proactive planning as well as reactive consideration of people's applications. He suggested a working party to enable good data on the perceived wants/needs for "affordable" housing for beginners, low wage earners and downsizers.

The Chairman replied that the Committee and its officers already spend a considerable amount of time covering the points raised, including meeting with the District Council's Strategic Planning Committee. They have direct input into the Emerging Local Plan and have met, as a working party, with local residents on the Lower Washwell development. Monthly District Councillor's Report

The new Chief Executive of Stroud District Council, along with a team of experienced

Councillors and Senior Executives from other local authorities, have recently carried out an in-depth review of the Council's vision, leadership, organisation, and financial viability. In early July the Chief Executive presented her action plan together with a timetable to address all the recommendations to the Council's Strategy and Resources Committee who unanimously agreed the plan.

An outline Application has been submitted for 176 dwellings and the restoration of the old Brimscombe Port on the canal.

Traffic concerns in Edge

Correspondence had been received from Graham Lilley concerning the impact on Edge and surrounding areas of the proposal development at Whaddon of two to three thousand dwellings and an industrial/trading estate. Cllr Abigail Smith said that the letter raised important points, which needed to be considered by the County Highways Dept. She would ensure it was raised with them and with the County Councillor.

Proposed Footpath diversion MPA67 at Old Greenhouse Farm, Painswick

By a majority vote the Council agreed to support the application subject to the path being easily accessible from the roadside.

Mains water standpipe in New Drive

The Council agreed that a quote could be obtained subject to no costs to the Council.

To consider local climate and ecological ideas as suggested by Members


The Council agreed to take forward the following suggestions:

- 5) To explore "turn off engines signage" whilst stationary at the A46 traffic lights

payment. Cllr James Cross confirmed that he had undertaken an internal financial check and was satisfied that the accounts and associated documents were in order.

Ward Reports

Cllr Abigail Smith, Chair of the Traffic Committee reported that police had recently commenced speed checks in Painswick's 20mph zones, with one penalty ticket issued. See report page 16.

Cllr Ann Daniels reported that some of the Streetlights in the Pullens Road vicinity had not been converted to LED. She will provide details to the Clerk.

Cllr Roey Parker said that despite repairs the spring is still affecting the road surface by Sheepscombe Village Hall. The matter will be referred to County Highways Dept.

Date of next Meeting

The Council agreed that unless urgent matters arise it will not hold a Meeting in August. The next scheduled Meeting will be on Wednesday 18th September 2019. The Meeting closed at 8.20pm.




Could you get involved?

Our Speaker described herself as an historian and medievalist with a passion for researching pub signs. They date back to Roman times and usually symbolise the history of the time, mainly covering three areas - Nature, Religion and Royalty. Earlier signs in Gloucestershire related to the wool trade and emphasised the importance of sheep and wool.


one pothole large enough for a chap to bathe in, and a road sign that warned of potholes for the next 9600 kilometres!

A hundred years ago the Great War was of course over, but discontent and disruption abounded in Painswick for much of 1919. The fighting men had returned to what they had thought would be a welcome fit for heroes but they were quickly disillusioned.

Not only was work hard to come by but there had also been several occasions and events which were nothing less than blatant snubs. Regimental reunion dinners were organised to which only officers and civilian notables were invited and to top it all a so-called Victory Ball was held at the Institute in May to which none of the rank and file men were invited. On that occasion they had marched in furiously and totally disrupted the proceedings, giving vent to their indignant feelings. Many had even refused to join in the Peace Day celebrations in June bitter about the money being lavished on the occasion when so many of them were out of work. At last and to try to go some way to make amends, in August a grand dinner was held at the Institute for about 150 ex-servicemen, with speeches and entertainment 'fit for our heroes'.

On 5th July we held our President's Tea Party when the "Gloucester Film Makers" showed a series of films about our local area including the annual Clypping Ceremony with



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News from Painswick Surgery

Primary Care Networks

Painswick Surgery has become a member of Stroud Cotswold Primary Care Network (PCN), together with Beeches Green, Rowcroft, Frithwood and Minchinhampton Surgeries. All surgeries in England have been obliged to join a PCN, and we are very pleased to be working with these other four surgeries. We remain independent, but are able to employ more staff through the PCN. The first people to be employed will be Clinical pharmacists, who are increasingly working as part of general practice teams. They are highly qualified experts in medicines and can help people in a range of ways, including carrying out structured medication reviews for patients with ongoing health problems.

Carers' Meetings

Our last carers' meeting in March was a great success. Since then, our colleague Samantha Lloyd, who arranged these meetings, has left the practice to work at a surgery closer to her home. However we are very pleased that two other members of our administration team will be organising these meetings in the future. If you are a carer, please ensure that the surgery knows that you are, and we will contact you with the date of the next meeting. A carer is anyone, including children and adults who looks after a family member, partner or friend who needs help because of their illness, frailty, disability, a mental health problem or an addiction and cannot cope without their support. The care they give is unpaid.

Patient Access

We now have nearly 1,200 patients who have registered for online access through Patient Access. This system enables patients to order repeat medication, book appointments and view aspects of their medical records online. We have finally switched off the old system (reached through the practice website), and we hope all users have now registered on Patient Access.

Flu vaccinations

It's still the middle of summer, but please remember that our annual immunisation programme to protect vulnerable patients from the influenza virus will begin at the beginning of October this year.

All the doctors at Painswick Surgery strongly recommend that everyone over the age of 65 is vaccinated against influenza. We would also suggest that anyone who suffers from diabetes, asthma/lung disease, kidney/liver/heart disease and patients who are immunocompromised are also vaccinated as they are especially at risk. Anyone who is a carer is also eligible for the vaccination. As usual, we will be doing clinics on Saturday mornings. The first two clinics will be on Saturday 5th October (over 65s only) and Saturday 12th October (all eligible patients). Call the surgery to book your appointment, or book online through Patient Access.

Pneumonia vaccinations

The doctors strongly recommend all those eligible for the flu vaccination also have the pneumonia vaccination. For most patients, only one vaccination is needed. This vaccination can be given at any time in the year, although you will be offered it at the same time as the annual flu vaccination.

GP Patient Survey

The results of the 2019 GP Patient Survey have now been published at www.gp-patient.co.uk. The GP Patient Survey is an independent survey run by Ipsos MORI on behalf of NHS England. The survey is sent out to over two million people across the UK. The results show how people feel about their GP practice. 242 surveys were sent out to Painswick Surgery patients, of which 134 were sent back. We have studied and discussed the results. Although pleased with some of the responses, there are some aspects that we are looking at, to see if there is anything we can do to improve our patients' experience. We do encourage feedback and all patients can do this either at the surgery through the Friends and Family survey, or online at www.nhs.uk.

The Bigger Picture.

Whilst the conservation effort on the Beacon in recent years is showing results, the global picture seems bleak indeed; climate warming, plastic pollution, habitat destruction and species extinctions, all on an unprecedented scale.


A privileged preview for Painswick

While you're looking at the vineyard... any children you may have with you could be searching out clues for our summer holiday trail. The "Rococo Time Traveller Trail" runs until 8th September and is a fantastic way to explore the Garden together and find out more about the history of this intriguing place. News from Yew Trees WI



At our June meeting, Joanne Lock taught us some amazing things about our canine friends. Yes, they have waggy tails and a fluffy coat but they are also sophisticated biosensors that are capable of detecting odours down

to parts per trillion i.e. the equivalent of a teaspoon of sugar diluted in two Olympic-size swimming pools of water. Bio Detection Dogs are being trained to carry out ground breaking research to improve early diagnosis of Cancer and other diseases such as Parkinson's and Malaria; while Medical Alert Assistance Dogs are trained to support people with life threatening health conditions. We listened to heart-warming stories of dogs supporting children and adults with complex health conditions, who often have no awareness of an impending life-threatening event. The dogs are trained to identify minute odour changes emitted prior to an emergency and alert the person to take preventative action. It was a fascinating evening learning how much the charity has achieved since its founding in 2008, and its ambitious plans for the future.








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Gardening Club AGM and Gardeners' Question Time

People have been asking do you want any more grass for hay or silage, just to get the grass off the fields. This year's hot weather means we have got it all in without any rain. Having no rain means a lot of the smaller springs in our valleys have nearly dried up, so we need the rain.

A lovely Kestrel seems to think that standing proud on top of our bird table is a way to catch small birds leaving it, but the many small birds stay out of sight inside the bird table and in the bushes nearby, so the Kestrel does not have much success here and flies off.

Going are the days when you grew a crop or raised an animal and then found a buyer for it. These days it is wise to find a buyer before you even start to plant or take on an animal. In a lot of things these days you need to set up a contract in some way with a buyer. 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Myth busting! Speeding ticket issued within Painswick's 20mph zone

Speeding has been a long-standing concern for the residents of Painswick, with narrow pavements and roads putting pedestrians in close proximity to traffic. In 2009, the 20mph zone was introduced and brought hope that the dangers might subside. But the initiative to introduce such zones across the County relied on existing infrastructure to keep speeds low and was never enforced. Over the years this led to a myth that it wasn't actually mandatory.

Having actively pursued the speeding agenda through community initiatives and ongoing dialogue with both the County Council and police, a number of measures have been implemented but the missing piece was enforcement by the police. Whilst the will was there, the resources weren't, but this lack of visible enforcement perpetuated the myth that the 20mph was only advisory and saw flagrant ignoring of the speed limit.

Well it isn't advisory and finally police resourcing has allowed it to be enforced. At the beginning of July our local Police Officer and PCSO carried out enforcement within the 20mph zone. Highly visible on the A46 well within the 20mph zone, they stopped and spoke to numerous vehicles exceeding 20mph and issued a ticket to a motorist doing 35mph. This

is a huge milestone and we could not be more delighted and grateful to our local police representatives. Finally, this proves the 20mph zones are mandatory and legally enforceable, so watch your speed for your own sake, as well as those around you.


