Painswick Feast cancelled Clypping Service goes ahead indoors

A yellow weather warning for Sunday 22nd September sadly led the feast organisers to cancel the event the day before. A shower immediately before 3pm also resulted in the traditional 'Clypping', or embracing, of the Church around the outside being called off. The Clypping Service did go ahead though inside the Church with the congregation in a crowded St. Mary's forming a circle around the outer aisles. And the equally traditional 'Puppy Dog Pie', was still available from St. Michael's restaurant, prepared by chef Matt Black.



Painswick businesses changing hands

A significant upheaval in the ownership of key local businesses seems to be on the cards, as two key businesses go on the market, and the sale of a third nears completion. The most advanced of the transactions is the sale of the Painswick Pharmacy, which has been owned by the Powis family for nearly 35 years, and will remain as a pharmacy. Mike Powis, the pharmacist, is the current Painswickian of the Year.

Both the Painswick Pooch and the Cardynham House Guest House and Bistro have also been put on the market. Local estate agents, Murrays, are marketing the Painswick Pooch, while Cardynham house is being sold by Christie & Co, based in Bristol.

But Painswick's burgeoning reputation as an art village has been bolstered by the opening of the Red Dot Gallery on St. Mary's Street (see page 5) and by Anthony Lewis Churchill's new gallery and art space in the former Falcon's Nest premises at the back of the Falcon Hotel.

Friday Club flooded

Torrential rain for a short period on Friday 27th September, led to quite serious flooding at the Town Hall, interrupting a meeting of the Friday Club in full flow. The Town Hall had to be evacuated and the meeting abandoned. More next month.

County Councillor quits Conservatives

Painswick's County Councillor, Keith Rippington, has announced that he has resigned from the Conservative Party following the expulsion of 21 moderate Conservative MPs from the party. Cllr. Rippington will now sit as an independent on the Council. He says that the Conservative

Party has become very right wing and is not in touch with younger people, appealing only to the older generation.

Reporting to the Parish Council in September, Cllr. Rippington made clear his disillusionment with the direction the party has taken in recent months.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS from the meeting held on September 18th by Terry Parker

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear. The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office and on-line at the Parish Council's web site.

There were no public questions.

Apologies for absence had been received from Cllrs James Cross, Edd Crownshaw, Ian James, Rosie Nash, Roey Parker and Abigail Smith.

The minutes of the July 17th meeting were agreed as a true record.

Casual vacancy in Slad Ward

One application had been received, that from Mr Andy Cash. Mr Cash had been a member of the Parish Council previously when living in, and representing, Sheepscombe Ward. It was unanimously agreed to co-opt Mr Cash.

Monthly County Councillor's report

Cllr Rippington told the Council that he had resigned from the Conservative Party and now sat as an Independent Member of the County Council. In his report Cllr Rippington spoke of the recent resurfacing of Pullens Road. He updated the Council on the Pitchcombe Junction improvement scheme which was to start on 7th October and continue for a period of 16 weeks, excluding Christmas.

Monthly District Councillor's report No report had been received.

Recommendations of the Rural Environment Committee at its meeting on 4th September.

The Council approved the funding for the

creation of a conservation area on part of the Recreation Ground. It was agreed to allocate funding for up to £250 for the seeds, £100 for the fencing and £40 for the signage. The area lies between the tennis courts and the Cheltenham Road gardens.

Review of various policy documents

The Council reviewed and approved documents on Health & Safety, Complaints Policy, Equality Policy, and Community Engagement Policy. The Council also reviewed the Model Financial Regulations and approved them subject to several amendments that followed advice from the National Association of Local Councils.

Local climate and ecological ideas suggested by Members.

The Council agreed to make the subject an item on the next Land and Buildings Committee Meeting agenda.

Responsible Finance Officer reports

The Council agreed the payments in accordance with the budget as listed in the report which had been previously notified to members. The Council agreed the following funding requests:

- £250 for the Painswick Feast.
- Grant funding of £1,000 for Sheepscombe Village Hall.
- A £1,000 grant towards play equipment for Sheepscombe with the funding coming from the Community Infrastructure Levy. The amount to be released when all funding had been





secured.

Ward Reports

a. Cyclists. Cllr Ann Daniels advised that a local resident had expressed her concern that cyclists were using the Plantation footpaths. It was agreed that the Clerk would seek a legal opinion. b. Climbing Frame. Cllr Mike Fletcher reported a loose piece of equipment. It was agreed that the Handyman would inspect it.

Reports from Council representatives on other bodies

Cllr Martin Slinger reported his attendance at an Edge Village Hall meeting.

Other matters

a. Given the number of Members present, Cllr Rippington asked how many Councillors were necessary to authorise Council business at a Parish Council meeting. The Clerk said the number was four.

b. Community Basic Life Saving session and defibrillator awareness. The Clerk asked the Members to remind residents of this important event taking place in the Town Hall on 25th September.

Meeting closure

The meeting closed at 8.28pm. The next Parish Council meeting was scheduled for Wednesday 16th October 2019 in the Town Hall.

Throughout the war technological developments on both sides were impressive as were the vast numbers of aircraft produced and lost, but these accentuated the awful risks that the aircrews were facing in both defence and attack.

Robert condensed a broad subject into a thought provoking talk 80 years after the outbreak of WWII.

Probus Women Helping the homeless

Our talk on 9th September was by Pippa Medcalf, a Consultant responsible for Acute Medical Emergencies at Cheltenham Hospital. In this role she assessed patients once admitted, relocating them if required as well as diagnosing, stabilising and 'patching up' patients and sending them home with any appropriate medication. When patients were ready to 'go home', the plight of the homeless became all too evident - as revealing as any hospital

X-ray - highlighting their suffering. Once discharged they were back to the streets (whatever the weather), back to the drug dealers, back to the cold and their worst enemy - rain! Many turn to drugs and alcohol to survive freezing temperatures and demoralisation.

Since 2010 in our country, the 5th richest in the World, homelessness has increased by 169% and is getting worse. Relationship breakdowns are a major factor, as well as cuts in benefits. Homeless people are usually not registered with a GP and estimated life expectancy is 42. Five years ago, after Pippa negotiated a Government grant of £32,000, a dedicated Housing Officer was employed to liaise with the hospital acute physician and has transformed the care of homeless patients, with over 84% being housed on discharge. This is now a permanent position, working so well in Gloucestershire and there are already plans for National collaboration. Many of those helped to date have said if it wasn't for this help they would be either dead or in prison. How apt the phrase - "Before you judge anyone, walk a mile in their shoes".

Starting with a bang

Our season certainly started with a bang! An excellent presentation by Ann Williams - Delius his life. During the first half of the evening Ann showed the wonderful film "Song of Summer", made in 1968 for the BBC by Ken Russell. It told the



story of the last 5 years of the life of Delius. He was nearly blind and paralysed and living with his wife in Grez, France. They were joined by Eric Fenby who lived with them and took down new compositions from dictation. Superb acting and the final scene of rose petals being poured over his corpse was eye watering.

In the second half we learnt that Delius was born in Bradford in 1862. His father was a wealthy wool merchant and Delius's first job was managing the family factory in Stroud! He was sent to America to work as manager of an Orange Grove. Based on this he wrote his first composition - the "Florida Suite". We listened to excerpts from that suite which was followed by 3 songs he wrote for cello and piano. In 1889 he moved to Paris and the evening finished with "Paris - The Song of a Great City" which he composed to show how his life changed forever when he went to live there. A wonderful evening.

What's in store for October? On the 10th, Gordon Collins will be presenting "Two for the price of one", a talk on "great pianists" who were also great conductors. On the 24th October Dr David Lucas, a distinguished former teacher of music, will talk to us about "The World of Percy Grainger" who played a prominent role in the revival of interest in British Folk Music and also featured in Ken Russell's film "Song of Summer." Farm fires cause problems

Two separate incidents of fires at farms around Painswick on the same weekend, caused problems for rather different reasons.

A case of arson

At 10.40pm on Saturday, 31st August, Philip Berry of Highfold Farm received a phone call from his neighbour, Nick Hallard, to say that two fires were visible in one of Philip's partially combined fields. Philip immediately contacted the fire service and police, both arriving within 20 minutes, and meantime Nick and his partner did as much as they could to put the fires out by clearing straw away and stamping on as much as possible. Police officers discovered another fire and that some of the standing straw had also been set alight. So, four fires in total. It was certainly deliberate.

Fortunately the wind was quite gentle and as Nick points out, the base of the crop 'was not tinder dry' otherwise the fire would have flared up much more rapidly. For Philip this could have proved disastrous. As it was he lost about ten bales of straw. 'It could have been terrible, much worse,' he says, 'and apart from the straw we could have lost the combine had the wind been blowing in a different direction.'

Crimes such as this are a serious threat to our farmers' livelihoods and of course to their animals, their equipment, our countryside and possibly to local houses too. If you were aware of anything in connection with this particular crime you should contact Stroud Police station referring to incident number 0483. *Carol Maxwell*

Midge Leney



Margery Leney, known to almost everyone as Midge, has died at her home in Painswick, shortly after her 92nd birthday. She was born in Kent and aged 12 when war broke out, was evacuated to South Wales. Her mother, a teacher, had to move with her school to a different part of the country.

After the war, Midge herself trained as a teacher and as a young woman travelled around southern England teaching

home economics to rural housewives. As a life-long vegetarian she remembered teaching farmers' wives how to cut up and preserve a pig.

Her job eventually brought her to Gloucester and in the late 1960s to a cottage just opposite the church in Painswick. A round of redundancies offered an opportunity of early retirement for both Midge and her colleague Margaret Goodwin, who decided to pool their resources. Together they moved into Tabithas in Vicarage Street and threw themselves into community life in the village. Midge was for many years the local organiser for Meals on Wheels and was featured in a film for the BBC by Jonathan Stedall about some of the less traditional aspects of Christmas around Painswick. The film was re-shown in Stroud last Christmas.

Midge was a great animal-lover, an active volunteer for the RSPCA and for the Red Cross and she and Margaret ran countless coffee mornings, open gardens and other events at their home to raise money for these and other charities. Margaret died in 1997, but Midge continued to work tirelessly for a whole range of community organisations, including the Friday Club, the Bowls Club, the Tourist Information Office and the former Christ Church in Gloucester Road. She was one of the main movers in creating, and running for many years, what is now the Wednesday Ashwell Group. Little more than a year ago, by then past 90 herself, she was still offering lifts to bring 'old' people in to Ashwell for the day.

She was recognised in 2011 as Painswickian of the Year, and although not born here, she was a true Painswickian, contributing to the life of the village for over 50 years, and always ready to help other people. She briefly moved higher up the village to Berry Close, but ended up moving back to her beloved Vicarage Street and to Glendale Cottage, where she died in September.

Anne Kenber



Anne Kenber, who has died at the age of 92, came to Painswick only in 1992, when she was already well past retirement age. The fact that just 20 years later, at the start of 2013, she was named 'Painswickian of the Year', says everything about the extent of her involvement in the local community in the years that followed.

Anne had trained and worked as an occupational therapist in Exeter, Birmingham, Southern Rhodesia and Hackney before becoming a full-time mother. She and her husband Ralph, who died in January, moved to Kingsmead after their retirement and both of them were very active and well-known through a host of activities and societies in the village. Even in their 90s they were still paying Bridge together at Painswick Bridge Club, Ralph had retired from the local Tennis Club only at the age of 93, and only a few months ago Anne could have been found quietly helping in the background at the Wednesday Ashwell Group.

Anne had helped at Ashwell in various roles over many years, but her range of activities was wide and varied. She organised the coffee rota at St. Mary's and the teas at Music Society Concerts, where she was also for a time the Secretary. Anne played tennis and golf to a good standard, hosted Austerity lunches and she and Ralph welcomed foreign students into their home for weekends and for Christmas under the HOST Scheme. They also opened their wonderful garden under the Red Cross gardens scheme, and were both involved with the Music Appreciation Group.

But one of Anne's most important and fulfilling roles during her time in Painswick was undertaken outside the village. She trained and worked as a Victim Support volunteer at the Stroud Magistrates Court and later as part of the Witness Support Team supporting prosecution witnesses, often frightened and bewildered by their experience and the court procedures. She was much admired in this role both for her knowledge and skill and for her caring approach.

Anne and Ralph celebrated their Golden Wedding in 2014 and are survived by their two sons, Mark and Jeremy, and granddaughter Natasha.

A posh lad at school in Sheepscombe

Our opening talk of the 2019-2020 Season on the 17th September, was a talk by Elisabeth Skinner of Sheepscombe Local History Society entitled The Diary of a Posh Lad 1838-1841.



The 'posh lad' was Chichester Fortesque who was born in Ireland, near Carlingford. He became the Liberal MP for Louth and served in various roles under Palmerstone, Russell and Gladstone. When elevated to the Peerage, he became the First Baron Carlingford.

He kept a diary throughout his life with a section dealing with the 3 years he attended school at Sheepscombe run by the Vicar, the Reverend Ostrehan. The school ran for two halves (terms) a year for an annual fee of $\pounds 120$

The question which Elisabeth couldn't answer is why did he go to school at Sheepscombe when just getting there was arduous. She felt it must have been something to do with the Reverend Ostrehan himself and indeed Fortesque went on to get a First in Classics at Christ Church, Oxford.

The diary for the three years gives a great deal of local information about what teenage boys got up to, with examples of the problems that arose between the boys at The Vicarage school and the boys at the local school. His ill health is well documented as are his many trips to Cheltenham, shopping, walking around, just simply enjoying himself.

It was a fascinating talk and set a high standard for the rest of the 2019-20 season. Our next meeting on 15th October, 7.30 at the Croft School, will be a talk on the Gloucestershire VAD Hospitals 1914-1919.

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The Ancient Youths need you Follow in a long Painswick tradition

The bells of St Mary's Church Painswick are not only beautiful, they are also internationally famous. Now with 14 bells, not only unique for a small town but more than in some cathedrals, St Mary's has for many years attracted ringers from far and wide.

The Ancient Society of Painswick Youths, Painswick's ringers, was formed in 1686 when the bells were already well established. At this time the number was increased by two to make eight and this is the first reference we have to the bells. Two more were added in 1731 with another two in 1821 – probably to compete with St Lawrence's, Stroud which had recently increased its number to ten! Another was added in 1986 to mark the tercentenary and another from a re-casting in 1993.

Over the years Painswick Youths have won many competitions with record peals and the town has been rightly proud of them. Highly competitive, especially with Stroud and Bristol, they have consistently set new records. On special occasions our bells create a wonderful atmosphere and this has been the case for over 300 years. It is a little sad therefore to report that currently the bells cannot often be rung in all their glory on such occasions and competitions are definitely not possible. The reason - there is a shortage of ringers.

At present only three of the ringers are Painswick residents. This means there is a dependence on ringers from elsewhere. Deborah Foreman, Janet Crispin and Rachel Bolt are local, Alan Hodges (steeplekeeper) and Jacqui Pillinger from Leonard Stanley, both long-standing members, and Angela and Peter Newing from Stroud - all regular stalwarts. Usually only six to eight people are regularly in attendance on practice night. Nonetheless great camaraderie and teamwork are certainly conspicuous. 'We love it. It can be a real passion' they say.

Encouragingly, three local young people aged 13-14, Thomas, Daniel and Sophie, have recently expressed an interest in learning. It is of course an activity which is open to all ages, both men and women. (It is an interesting fact that historically many of our bellringers have lived to very great ages!). It is a skill which involves coordination, rhythm and patience, is undoubtedly challenging but immensely satisfying. Learning to handle the bell usually takes about six practice sessions and from then on more skills and coordination will be developed. Interest never wanes as there is always something new to learn.

Our ringers need more people to join them. If our special occasions such as weddings, Clypping, Sunday services and celebrations are to be lively and joyous as of before it is essential that a full team is ready and willing. This is a very proud Painswick feature, a veritable piece of our heritage, and it would be sad if it disappeared. If you are a 'lapsed' ringer or indeed a complete beginner you would be made very welcome. Why not have a go? Practice is on Tuesday evenings at 7.00pm in the wonderfully historic church tower. Creativity unbounded

After the success of her art installation in Gloucester Cathedral in June, Robin Watkins-Davis will present her Shift project in St Laurence's Church in Stroud from 12th-18th October. This combines some wonderful visual and aural presentations with a serious purpose.

Ju jutsu - a new community activity



Quentin Ball moved to Painswick about five years ago and more recently to Longridge. In January this year he started rehearsing his part in Sheepscombe's pantomime and this was the moment his martial arts identity was revealed. His part involved teaching the arts to the child characters. In fact, Quentin has a long and distinguished background in the teaching of and participation in ju jutsu. He started learning as a hobby at the age of 16 and by the age of 26 his interest was very serious and he decided to move to Japan to learn authentic techniques. Japan of course is where martial arts have their origins dating back for many centuries. He stayed there for four years, teaching English whilst learning and also acquiring his qualifications as a martial arts instructor.

On returning to England Quentin taught ju jutsu semi-professionally for a number of years in Gloucester whilst also running a business selling martial arts equipment. Gradually the teaching became somewhat minimal but the business, based in Gloucester Business Park, is thriving. However, the practice of ju jutsu is Quentin's real passion. Encouraged by many, he ran a taster course early in the summer. This proved to be very successful and now he is offering two introductory four-week courses, one for children and one for adults, commencing in October.

Ju jutsu is a particular style, very much defensive, not aggressive and so particularly suitable for children. It is essentially a set of learned techniques within a structured environment and requiring mental focus as well as physical control. As Quentin points out, it is not competitively aggressive and it is very fulfilling both physically and mentally.

Married with a daughter, Quentin is very much a community-minded person and is hopeful

that ju jutsu will become a valued community activity. The classes will take place in Sheepscombe Village Hall on Fridays starting 18th October:- children 6.30-7.45, adults 8.00-9.30 in the first week and one hour later in the ensuing weeks. Quentin is highly qualified and very experienced and will be assisted by his ju jutsu partner, Dave, also highly qualified. Why not give it a try? Jottings. Food Waste of all kinds

Most city dwellers and others as well, want produce which is perfect in shape and size and with no blemishes. This is not possible in a lot of cases. A vegetable may be bent, have a blemish or be too big or small, for what is wanted. With vegetable seeds and other seeds like potatoes, by choosing the right seed with the right characteristics you require, you can now go a long way to getting what the retailers want. But which ever way you grow your vegetables and fruit, you will always get blemishes, cracks and trimmings, and as it's grown outdoors, the weather and bugs may attack it.

The growers need to be in constant contact with the buyers and growing the product to a specification, but with the retailers demanding better produce each year to keep the public happy, then the lower grade of fruit and veg need somehow to be sold. The most waste comes from the sugar beet industry. After the sugar is extracted you are left with a large amount of pulp which could be turned into another product like ethyl. Then there are potatoes. The tubers need to be free from everything harmful, and not knobbly. A lot of the waste goes to animal feed. The same applies to carrots and other fruit and veg.

Whilst that is good news, the overall trend is still downward for most species and that is cause for concern.

This summer Joyce Barrus has worked hard to do butterfly surveys on the Beacon by redoing the transect surveys originally started by our founder, Cedric Neilson. She will give a short resume of her findings at the AGM.
