

## Local Plan for Stroud District rejected as Council faces abolition

A year after Stroud District Council asked for a pause in its Local Plan process, it has been told by planning inspectors to go back to the drawing The plan was submitted to the Planning Inspectorate more board. than three years ago, but the inspectors have now concluded that it is undeliverable in its present form and in the required timescale.

Their concerns relate to improvements that would be required to junctions 12 (south of Gloucester) and 14 (south of Dursley) on the M5, if major housing developments at Hardwicke and at Sharpness / Berkeley were to go ahead. In each case the junction improvements would require significant finance from National Highways, but are not yet in their forward programme.

Without a new plan (the current plan was adopted 10 years ago), Stroud is in a weak position to defend planning appeals on sites that have not

for development. With the Government committed to ambitious targets for housing, developers will no doubt be eyeing up sites in and around Stroud. On the new basis recently introduced by the Government, Stroud is considered to have just 3.24 years supply of housing land, compared to the 5 year requirement.

Another major complication for Stroud Council though is that its own existence is in doubt. The Government has called for the abolition of most District Councils and their replacement by unitary authorities. That is most likely to mean a single Gloucestershire Council, although a group of local MPs has suggested two Councils, covering East and West Gloucestershire (Stroud would be in the West). Some powers might also go to a new strategic authority for a wider regional grouping.

Sensing an opportunity, the County Council applied to the Government to delay elections due this year, until the new structure could be in place, but has been turned down. Other counties did get approval and will now form the first wave of new unitary authorities, with Gloucestershire probably consigned to a second group. That leaves Stroud District in limbo as it struggles to

re-start its planning process.

#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS - from the meeting held on Wednesday 19th February 2025 reported by David Allott

The Meeting had some animated discussions about the likely effect of the Local Plan rejection and about the prospects for the abolition of Stroud District Council. See page 1 article. The relevant Stroud District Councillors and Planners may now struggle to fend off unwelcome Planning Applications. Their best defence locally, may be reliance on the protection of 'protected landscapes'. The national position is that "Great weight should be given to conserving and enhancing landscape and scenic beauty in .. National Landscapes which have the highest status of protection". The former AONB is now renamed "Cotswolds National Landscape".

The future of Gloucestershire County Council, in one piece or two - will not be decided soon. Early comments on the proposals are due now but final submissions are not due before November.

The meeting quickly approved the January 15th meeting's minutes, and noted there have been no applications to date for cooption to the Parish Council. As a result there are still two vacancies, one in Slad ward and one in Painswick ward.

Sue Williams' County Councillor's Report highlighted that over 100,000 trees have been planted across 250 projects in the last year. The council remains on target to plant a million by 2030. Further to the County's aim to reach net zero by 2045, £50,000 worth of grants have been awarded, and £1 million is approved to be spent across the county on solar panels.



Other capital projects include a new 200-place special school for children and young people and three new adult care homes. A further £10 million will be put towards the council's £100 million four year plan on road improvements and £24.5 million has been identified as efficiencies, saving and extra income for next year. The Council's spending for 25/26 will rise by £32.7m to almost £65m with Band D properties paying £6.65 more a month

Digital Technology and tourism: The amazingly named RSPAWIR (River Severn Partnership Advanced Wireless Innovation Region) is funding two digital tourism conferences with advice on how 5G and wireless technologies can support businesses and boost the visitor economy. Both events are free to attend. For more information go to the Gloucestershire website.

District (and Parish) Councillor Gary Luff had a lot to report. A recent planning meeting had approved a speculative application for 17 dwellings at Coaley, despite it being outside the village's settlement boundary and despite concerns about sewerage infrastructure. As a result of the housing supply shortage a so called "tilted planning balance" now applies and it is harder to resist planning applications that have not been consulted on, identified and allocated by the District Council, as the most suitable places for new development. Stroud's target has been raised from 620 to 840 homes per year.

Local Government Reorganisation: SDC is working with the County Council and



the five other District Councils to explore options for one or two unitary councils for the county. GAPTC (Gloucestershire Association of Parish and Town Councils) will be part of the discussions.

Second and Empty homes: At the full Council meeting on 13th February the premiums were confirmed. Second homes will be subject to 100% premium (=Council Tax x 2) and empty properties will, after one year, pay the 100% premium. There are a number of exemptions. There are currently 70 second homes in Painswick.

#### Croft School Council

The meeting received the many notes from the meeting with The Croft School Council. The children are brilliant at coming forward with ideas and requests!

1. Recreation Ground: There were several suggestions to add new equipment. The Council asked for their top three options and committed to seek funding for at least one before the next meeting. No Smoking, No Littering and Dogs on Leads signs were suggested for the area near the play equipment. It was agreed that if the children design the signs, the Council will have them made and installed.

2. Community Gardens: The proposal was considered. The School confirmed that they do have their own vegetable garden and need more volunteers to assist.

3. Speeding in the villages: The children raised concerns about Edge Lane in particular. Many of them have to cross the A46 by the Lychgate and use Edge Lane on their way to school. Also when going to Richmond for swimming. The Council will ask the PCSO if they could increase their presence at appropriate times.

4. Litter Picking: The children are keen to carry out some litter picking in problem areas, such as hedges, under seats in the Recreation Ground and places where drivers throw litter. Councillor Gary Luff will arrange a weekend Litter Pick through the Stroud District Council's Litter Champion.



### **One General on another** The life of General Ismay

On Thursday 6th Feb. 2025 Lieutenant General Sir John Kiszely gave a fine outline of his biography on the life and work of General Lord Hastings (Pug) Ismay (1887-1965).



Ismay was born in Nainital, India, and educated in the UK at Charterhouse School and the Royal Military College, Sandhurst. He then served in the Indian Army as an officer of the 21st Prince Albert Victor's Own Cavalry. During WWI, he served with the Camel Corps in British Somaliland, in the British fight against the "Mad Mullah", Mohammed Abdullah Hassan. After some 6 years Ismay felt his future was stuck in a backwater and entered a period of "war-weariness" (depression), the first of several such episodes in his lifetime. In 1922 he attended the Indian Army Staff College Quetta, followed in 1924 by staff training at the RAF Staff College Andover, each paving the way for promotion to the highest Army echelons.

Appointed to assist government with handling the consequences of the General Strike in 1926, Ismay soon made his mark with politicians, including Winston Churchill. When preparations were being made for WWII he became Churchill's closest military adviser, gaining a reputation as "the man with the oil can" while resolving differences between superiors including the military Service chiefs. Throughout the war he participated in most major policy decisions by the Allied powers. Ismay also assisted Churchill with writing his memoires.

After retirement from the Army in 1946, Ismay briefly became a minister before serving as NATO Secretary General, 1952-1957. His time in office saw many challenges - the Soviet invasion of Hungary, Suez, the Cyprus Crisis of 1963-64, and the death of Stalin. Steering NATO through these crises required judgement, patience and humility. His legacy is that of NATO with a strong central headquarters connecting its political and military dimensions, and an organisation with a global security perspective.

### Painswick Gardening Club

On February 12th Chloe from 'Wildstroud' came to talk to us about gardening for wildlife: The total area of land occupied by private gardens is much more than that of wildlife reserves, so leaving the reserves isolated from each other. She, and a friend, started the group "Wildlife Project" in 2019 with the aim of providing nature corridors and reserves around Stroud. Our gardens might not support everything



but could allow plants to spread through to different areas and animals follow, so joining up the reserves. Gardens can offer a refuge for plants and animals excluded by disruption and development of their habitat. If conditions improve, plants and animals may re-establish back. So Chloe's message was "Share your garden".

On 12th March we have Andy Jeanes returning to talk about Clematis. He came last year and enthused us with climbing plants in general, but is actually a clematis specialist. He works with the Guernsey Clematis Nursery and has a lifetime of knowledge and experience, so we look forward to suggestions as to how to manage clematis.

We meet in the Town Hall at 7 pm for tea/coffee and perhaps a glass of wine, ready to start the talk at 7.30pm. Come and join us.

### News from St. Mary's Enjoy the silence this Lent

"In repentance and rest is your salvation, in quietness and trust is your strength" - these prophetic words found in the Old Testament book of Isaiah are calling to many of us today who, in an increasingly fast-paced, troubled and 'noisy' world, are simply searching for peace. Is more peace and quiet something you could do with?



Our 'Big Ask' survey last year showed that many churchgoers in our area would appreciate more times of rest and silence. So, during Lent (which begins on March 5th on a day called Ash Wednesday and continues up until Saturday 19th April, 'Holy Saturday'), we are encouraging our churches to lean into times of stillness and silence as we seek to encounter Christ and experience the peace of the Lord more fully.

What will this look like? Well, in our times of gathered worship on Sundays, service leaders will ensure that a couple of minutes of quiet will be held after the Word has been expounded in the sermon or talk, and other periods of quiet and pauses may also be introduced.

In addition, on Mondays during Lent (with the final session on Monday 7th April) there will be a short service of silent meditation held in Painswick Church between 6-6.30pm. Everyone is welcome. On the final service there will be the opportunity to share in a simple Eucharist, too.

If you have any other ideas about how to enjoy silence collectively - such as joining others on a silent prayer walk - please let us know and our weekly church family newsletter 'Beacon Light' will gladly help you to shape and share your plans so that others might join you. Of course, not everyone enjoys silence, so please note that our regular church worship and activities will continue as usual. As we draw closer to Easter itself (particularly in Holy Week), this will include a number of choral events and extra worship services that are rich with music and participation.




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# Music for the innocent ear and Antonio Vivaldi

The intriguing title of Jenny Buckland's talk encompassed a number of composers who ought to be better known and a very pleasant and informative afternoon demonstrated this



with well chosen musical examples. The list, diverse and international, comprising solo piano, art song, chamber and orchestral ensemble was mainly drawn from the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Gloucester was represented by Ivor Gurney and we heard the Clarinet Concerto composed by his tutor Charles Villiers Stanford whose fame as a composer declined at his death.

The second presentation in the month brought a return visit from Dr Timothy Brain who gave an absorbing summary of the rise, fall and re-rise of "Mr Four Seasons" Antonio Vivaldi. With a brief excerpt from "Spring", the ubiquitous phone jingle, he went beyond with excerpts from the Gloria, Concerto for two trumpets and Ottone. Vivaldi had travelled extensively throughout Europe, his fame fading on his death in Vienna and has revived in comparatively recent times on discovery of his many unpublished manuscripts in Northern Europe. Always absorbing and thoroughly researched, the group can hopefully look forward to further presentations from Dr Brain.

We hear the saddest news concerning the death of Lynn Steer, a long standing contributor and member of PMAG. We send sincere condolences to Sylvia and the family. For a fuller celebration of his long and varied life see page 11.

# **16,000 mile trip ends in Bali** Joe's amazing achievement

You may recall reading in the December Beacon about Joseph Worsley's amazing challenge – to cycle from Painswick across countless countries for a very worthwhile cause. Well, he's made it, and what an achievement.

Joe's original aim was to cycle across Europe to Istanbul but, spurred on by a desire to both challenge himself and raise money for his chosen cause, he decided to go further. This meant cycling on across great swathes of land from Kazakhastan through central Asia and China, then on through Laos, Thailand, Malaysia and Indonesia with a final destination of Bali. Since our last report he has ridden an additional 6,000 miles to reach a total of 16,000 miles for the entire journey.

I asked Joe if there had been new problems and challenges since the last report to which he responded: '... tackling the mountains of Vietnam and Laos (including the infamous Ha Giang Loop), riding



some of my biggest days to make it to Bangkok for a New Year's Eve reunion with some friends I'd made in central Asia (including one 200 mile day), a couple of bouts of food poisoning in Indonesia and also riding through much of south east Asia's rainy season. Luckily I've faced no real mechanical issues recently and have had the company of a Canadian guy that I met on the road for much of this stint which has made things much easier, and being able to share these experiences with others is part of what has made this trip so special. Of course, that extends to the locals who have been so kind, friendly and hospitable beyond all reasonable expectations.'

Setting off from Painswick in May last year this has of course been a lifetime experience for this young man and one from which he has gained some incredibly valuable wider knowledge and understanding. Apart from the challenge which the trip presented, Joe's real motivating factor was to raise funds for the Alzheimer's Society, a cause close to his heart as his beloved grandmother has dementia. He feels passionately that this is a cause worthy of great support and his original aim was to raise £1000. By November this had been exceeded and Joe raised the target to a possible £2500. Amazingly he has now raised just over £3500 and is naturally overjoyed. On his return, (he will be home by the time you read this), having previously worked in the NHS and with this current amazing experience, Joe sees his future working for a charity or organisation involved with a cause about which he feels strongly. This is a young Painswick man who quite evidently has so much to offer for the benefit of society.

So many families are affected by Alzheimers and other forms of dementia which makes his charitable cause a really important one. His cycling journey across so many lands is an amazing undertaking resulting in a stunning achievement. His cause is certainly worth supporting. # Anthony Lynn Steer 1940 - 2025

Lynn was born in Neath, South Wales and later attended Birmingham University from where he graduated in electrical engineering.

When Lynn moved to Painswick in 1975 with his wife and 3 children, he had recently completed a 3½ year contract near Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia as a Colombo Plan Adviser/Senior Lecturer at MIT. This contract was part of the British Government aid scheme at that time to fund the development of technology in Commonwealth countries. In 1974 he left Malaysia and soon after his return was fortunate to obtain a Senior Lecturer post at Gloscat.

He quickly became absorbed in village life and played cricket and rugby for the local teams and tennis informally. In later years he held a season ticket at Gloucester Rugby Club. In the late 70s he was invited to join Painswick Tennis Club to encourage a group of young men who wanted to play tennis more competitively. He went on to enter a men's team in the Gloucester League, and soon after a mixed team was entered in the Winter League.

In 1980 he obtained a tennis coaching qualification which enabled him to coach local youngsters. He did this for several years and briefly at Stroud High School. The proceeds of his coaching fees were donated to build a practice wall at Broadham for the Club. Lynn was President of the Tennis Club from 1984-87 and was later made a Life Member for services rendered over the years.

His interests were not only limited to sport as he was a beekeeper and held an allotment for several years. He was also on the original Painswick Beacon Committee for over 2 years, which worked hard to produce the first issue of the Beacon in April 1978 when the copy layout had to be done manually before printing.

Always interested in education, he worked as a School Governor for both the Croft School and then Stroud High School. He loved Mathematics and obtained a Maths degree in 1991. After retiring from the post of Head of School at Gloscat he taught Maths part time at Stroud College and coached GCSE and 'A' level Maths to several children in Painswick. He was also a part time external examiner for Edexcel for many years which involved travel to the Middle East and Southeast Asia in addition to UK colleges, before finally retiring at the age of 74.

In recent years he belonged to the Falcon Bowling Club and loved to spend time there, even when ill health prevented him from playing. Lynn had a positive attitude, great sense of humour and lived his life to the full. He died on 11th February peacefully at home surrounded by his family.

# **Gardenlink - a Citizen Science Project**

This spring a project called Gardenlink is starting which will monitor the distribution of reptiles in gardens and land around the Sites of Special Scientific Interest of the Painswick and Slad

e Interest of the Painswick and Slad valleys. The need for connectivity corridors between these sites is

regarded as an essential component of a wider landscape recovery.

Many people are now starting to manage their gardens in a more nature friendly way, leaving messy corners, planting pollinator friendly plants, creating deadwood piles, creating hay meadows, using less chemicals and so on. All of this will encourage insects, fungi, birds, amphibians, reptiles and mammals to recolonize your gardens.

Reptiles often seem to be forgotten about. Britain does not have many species and they are all under threat from habitat loss and predation. Domestic cats and introduced pheasants kill many every year. There are six species found in the UK; common lizards, slow worms, grass snakes, adders (or vipers), sand lizards and smooth snakes. The last two are not found in our locality. Unfortunately, many people have a fear of them, especially the ones that look like snakes. Only the adder has a venomous bite but will only use it if severely provoked, they are very secretive and will usually slither away before you see them. Making the venom uses

a lot of energy, so the adder will initially use a dry strike as a warning before resorting to the real thing. People are often fearful of snakes, but their presence is to be celebrated as it is an indication of a healthy ecosystem and they help keep down the slug population.

The project will require volunteers to attend a short training tutorial and then install a corrugated sheet in a suitable location on their land. Reptiles use this to shelter under and warm up in the sun. Regular monitoring of what may be hiding underneath will create a distribution database. This is an example of citizen science, where many amateurs can produce meaningful results.

# Jottings

There is mixed opinion as to whether to keep cows inside or outside in the winter: The new way of thinking by some people is to keep their animals out all the year round. If the ground is stony like our Commons, it can be ok. There is plenty of space and the soil drains well, so the animals do not compact the ground too much. Here, the combination of grazing the grass down and puddling, opens up bare earth enabling other species of plants to germinate. But if you keep too many cows in a field the ground becomes waterlogged as the soil structure is broken down, reducing drainage and the grass cannot grow so well the next year.

If cattle stay out all winter, this is called "outwintering" which can be cheaper and better for the animals and soil. Cows prefer being cooler. You, of course, have to give them extra feed in cold spells, especially snow. At these times, ice on the water troughs needs breaking up every day. The ridge and furrow effect you see in some fields was caused by ploughing in the old days and was found to offer better drainage in a wet climate: moisture drained into the furrows. Cows can lie on the dryer top or shelter in the dips. According to the way the wind was blowing you knew where the cattle and sheep were and you knew over the



years where you could find them sheltering. They could be by walls and hedges. Being well fed, outside and having a dry place to lie on, there is less likelihood of infection spreading. One problem of being outside is that prolonged standing in mud can cause foot rot. Farmers have to go out to check and count their stock every day to ensure none have got caught in a hedge or river, or stolen.

It can be easier to keep cows inside during the winter but they need regular feeding with hay and dry concentrates. So they need to drink a lot of water. They are comfortable and warm and the farmer does not have to go out in the dark bitter cold and rain. And it is easier to keep a close watch that they do not get infections or injured.

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

# Wooden Castles

At the meeting on 18th February the Local History Society welcomed back a former chairman Mark Bowden, to talk on Timber Castles. Mark worked for many years for what is now known as Historic England and has become a leading expert on castles from around the 11th / 12th century, often in the form of 'Motte and Bailey' castles that many of us remember from school.



Surprisingly little is known about such castles as they have not survived in the way that stone buildings have. Even the mottes, or mounds, are often difficult to identify and relatively few have been excavated. The largest motte, at Thetford, Norfolk is 95 metres across, but others measure only 20 metres by 1/2 meter high! There is a small motte at Taynton Parva near Gloucester and another near the Frome at Miserden Park. They are particular concentrated around the Welsh border regions, but spread all over the country.

Mark speculated on whether there might once have been a timber castle in Painswick in the area around Castle Hale, although on balance the answer seemed to be probably not. Interestingly though there was one at Pain Fitzjohn's 'other' manor at Painscastle in Powys, Wales - an area that was probably then more dangerous than Painswick.

**Property Report** A house in Painswick for under £200,000 doesn't come up that often these days. Admittedly 4 Prospect Terrace, off Tibbiwell (Murrays, £195,000), has just one bedroom and is described as in need of modernisation, but it is end-of-terrace, has good sized gardens and lovely views - and for that price you can't have everything.

For an upgrade to the next level you might consider May Cottage in Butt Green (Hamptons, £450,000), also end-of-terrace, but with two bedrooms, private off-road parking and described as in excellent order. Or 15 Gyde House (Hamptons, £375,000) is a second floor two bedroom apartment as part of this listed building set in maintained gardens.
