Parish Council news

from the meeting held on 22nd March, 1978

Village plan

THE STROUD DISTRICT COUNCIL has asked for an official comment from the PARISH COUNCIL on the Draft Village Plan.

The PARISH COUNCIL has no specific comment to make other than to express its "great concern about traffic and parking in Painswick."

New St. flats development

THE Council is seeking an agreement with the developer which would give the parish the responsibility for the maintenance of the car parking area. The residents in turn would collectively contribute half the maintenance costs to the Council.

A line will be drawn across the car park area to indicate the boundary between the residents' and the Council's parking zones.

To deter visitors from using the car park the Council is proposing that a chain be placed across the entrance.

Toilet facilities

THE Council has unanimously decided not to charge for the facility once the new ladies toilets have been completed. The present coin boxes will be removed and probably sold.

A supplementary estimate has been approved to cover the cost of toilet wall rails which will be fitted as an aid to the physically handicapped.

Recreation ground

WORK is being put in hand to renovate the play equipment in the recreation ground.

Plantation trees

THE extent of the beech bark disease is to be assessed and the affected trees cut down. It is thought that the value of the wood will cancel out the cost of felling and removal.

How many trees are affected is not known but it is thought to be a considerable number. A re-planting programme will be considered as soon as the extent of the disease is known.

Street lighting


THE Council believes that the Village street lighting should be improved. The General Purposes Committee is to look again at the results of the survey carried out three years ago and make recommendations to the full Council.

Painswick proposes not to support the Association of Parish Councils' Appeal against the decision whereby the responsibility for street lighting finance will pass from District to County Council level in April 1979.

Bledisloe cup

PAINSWICK as the holder is barred from this year's competition but the Council is to request that the Village should be allowed to enter. Although we cannot win, the belief is that we need the practice if the standard is to be maintained.

New Street flats—the facts

G & J Mann Ltd (the Developers) commissioned Douglas Gunn & Associates, Chartered Architects of Nailsworth, to produce a sensitive design for the run down Home's Garage site in the centre of Painswick.

Since the site was of the greatest importance, the Planing Officers and Architects consulted from the early stages. In an infill scheme of this kind there are two general solutions:-

- match the surrounding buildings.
- produce a very modern design and contrast with the surroundings.

Because the centre of Painswick is very traditional it was felt that a modern design would produce a jarring note, and option (1) was pursued. The final design is a two-storey building built in a special faced
stone which has been produced
to closely match adjacent buildings - this will weather in
time and fade into the street
scene. Although the windows
are modern, they are of sliding
sash type and of Georgian proportions - stone window surrounds and stone canopy echo
features of the buildings
around, and a flight of steps
leading up to the "piano nobile"
and Georgian door should ensure
a sense of belonging.

Local opinion and comment has been instrumental in shaping this project, and an invaluable contribution has been made by Painswick Parish Council who have agreed a scheme whereby the flats have greatly improved access to their garages, and access is given in turn to the rear of the Town Hall.

The builders are PMPD Builders Ltd of Stroud, who include skilled stonemasons in their team, and it is they who are building the ashlar stonework.

It is hoped to complete the building by the end of this year when the flats will be marketed by Messrs. Davis Champion & Payne, of Stroud.

Disease scars Painswick approach

THE FAMOUS "Road to Painswick", a local beauty spot illustrated in Eric R. Delderfield's book "The Cotswolds" has been lost to Painswick because of the ravages of Beech Bark Disease.

Over 40 Beech trees on Lord Dickinson's estate were found to be infected and in a dangerous condition and, after obtaining the necessary planning consent, this necessitated the complete felling of all trees in the narrow woodland lining the Gloucester Road.

Lord Dickinson explained that there was a high risk of the trees being blown on to the Gloucester Road, possibly causing a serious accident. He went on to say that all the trees had to be felled as the risk from high winds to the remaining trees would have been greatly increased following the thinning out of the infected ones.

Everyone will be delighted to know that Lord Dickinson plans to re-plant the woodland this Autumn though, unfortunately, it will be many years before this beauty spot returns to its former glory.

One unresolved matter, however, is the fate of "The Plantation" on the other side of the Gloucester Road which belongs to the people of Painswick. This woodland is also affected and plans will have to be made soon as to what must be done there.
