PLANNING COMMITTEE Housing land availability

That the District Council is undertaking a detailed survey of the whole of its area in its quest to identify land suitable for housing, irrespective of whether such is already identified or caught up in the planning process, was reported to the committee. As this exercise progresses during the next four months or so Parish and Town Councils will be consulted.

Slad

Jackie Woof drew attention to expressions of concern from some Slad residents that some changes were seemingly taking place on a farm but no planning application had been made. The sale of produce was apparently being promoted, and the impression created that two or three caravans on site were occupied.

It was agreed to invite the District Council's officers to look into the matter and advise this committee accordingly.

PARISH COUNCIL Visit to Richmond Painswick

The Council received an invitation from the Standing Liaison Group concerned with the relationship of Richmond Painswick and the community to visit and tour this now complete project in advance of two public Open Days (see page 5). The SLG had suggested that such is the range of services offered, and the significance of this major facility within the village, that Councillors should have the opportunity to familiarise themselves with what it represents. It was agreed to accept the invitation for 2nd November.

Commercial parking - Pullens Road

Roy Welbourn exercised his right to raise a question prior to the full meeting of the Council, being deeply concerned about the parking on or off the pavement in Pullens Road of large commercial vehicles. His main concern, arising from personal experience of the hazard arising, is that if any large vehicle is parked in this road any other heavy goods vehicle needing to pass has no option but to mount the pavement on the opposite side of the road. This thereby has the effect of being a real danger to pedestrians using that pavement, as well as anyone emerging from their private pathways. What was more, a section of pavement had recently needed resurfacing at the expense of the

The Council was reminded that an 'understanding' between the Police and one such vehicle owner (who now parks elsewhere overnight) was reported to a recent meeting, but this was seemingly being breached in particular during some late evenings. It was agreed to seek copy of the understanding, it being hoped that such had been in writing. It was also agreed that the Traffic Committee should reconsider its long-standing policy of supporting the parking of vehicles on pavements throughout the village, even if such still permits free passage of such as pushchairs between parked vehicles and any adjacent structures.

Emergency situations - Working Group Chairman Terry Parker reported that a meeting of the Working Group (page 2 last month) considering the implications of emergency situations affecting the community was to meet on 24th October.

It was reported that one matter remained to be resolved, the insurance of particularly heavy vehicles against any claim arising from contractors bringing the major equipment needed to work on the site of the fractured carriageway near Salmon

Springs should the adjacent roadway itself break up.

officers were
confident that this would
quickly be resolved and the contract let
shortly, for completion mid-February.

- permanent redirection of HGV Ann Burges Watson, Chairman of the Traffic Committee, reported her having made strong representation to the Highway officers to take advantage of this lengthy period in which HGV were becoming used to an alternative routing to avoid Painswick to make such permanent through redesignation of this section of the A46. She had been advised that such could take up to three years and would not be initiated at this time.

- traffic control Edge

Martin Slinger reported discussions between all parties concerning the implications of the introduction of traffic control signals at the church junction in Edge. This had been required to permit buses and HGV to turn on to the Whiteshill Road, that access being frustrated by overhanging mature trees in the one-way link road, Belle Vue, and the impracticality of negotiating that road without damage to the upper deck of buses.

Particular concern related to the long tailback caused in Whiteshill Road, and the serious possibility of emergency vehicles being unable to exit that road at speed was crucial towards Gloucester. Mr Slinger reported that an amicable understanding had been reached and that, after tree surgery within the following week, the traffic lights may be removed and Belle Vue opened to all vehicles.

Garden waste - recycling

The Council received a report from three Councillors who had visited the scheme initiated by Bisley Parish Council for the local community to recycle its garden waste on a dedicated site. Many aspects of this project were praised, not least the considerable effort applied to maintain the momentum required to ensure that the process of composting is continuous and thereby efficient; some remunerated staffing had proved to be necessary. The principal drawback had been the reluctance of the public to removed composted material, even though it was free for use on their gardens.

It was agreed to invite public views regarding such a scheme for Painswick, through these columns in due course.

Public meeting places - appraisal

The Council received a request, from the Manager of the Painswick Gateway project, arising from the open meeting convened by the Painswick Gateway shadow Trustees and held on 2nd October attended in the main by Trustees of Painswick Centre. All present at that meeting urged the Parish Council to earmark funding in their 2008-09 budget, for which the precept element was currently being formulated, to meet the cost of an independent feasibility study into the extent of 'community space' needs in Painswick, including usage and suitability for purpose' as commended in September 2006 by the (then) Core Group. It was increasingly apparent that any future submission for grant aid from any or all of the larger organisations in the village would be expected to provide evidence of such an appraisal, probably also with clarification of priority status within the village of such applications.

The cost could be up to £5000, but it was reported that Painswick Centre was willing to contribute £1000 and that matched funding had been offered by an anonymous local resident.

Much discussion ensued, it being agreed that such an exercise could not be effectively advanced until it was clear what might or might not be included in the Gateway project. Ann Daniels reminded the Council that history indicated that each



applicant for funding would have its own advocates; obtaining a consensus view was likely to be very difficult. Chairman Terry Parker tabled a resolution that the Parish Council support a feasibility study in principle and take a lead role to review the usage of public buildings in the civil parish, subject to the terms of reference being agreed by all parties, and that the Gloucestershire Rural Community Council be invited to conduct the study; this being carried with one abstention.

It was further agreed to include matched funding of a further £2000 in the budget for 2008-09 for this purpose. The specific study of meeting halls in this way would, it was agreed, update the Parish Plan in this regard.

Financial strategy

At the request of the Finance and General Purposes Committee, which adjourned its meeting the previous week, the Council was requested to clarify strategy to be used with regard to setting the precept upon the District Council with regard to the 2008-09 budget.

It was pointed out that a 'typical' increase of about 2.5% would enable the Council to maintain existing services but fall short of any improvement or catching up with arrears of maintenance or improvements, or any new ventures. The Clerk, Roy Balgobin, pointed out that an increase of 2.5% would lead to a precept of £65,700, last year's precept having been £64,250. He went on to explain that if the Council was minded to make an increase in excess of 2.5%, an additional £10,000 for example would result in a Band D property increase of £5.67 per annum or 11p per week. A one per cent increase brought an additional income of £642.50 per annum.

The Council agreed that the F&GP Committee should not be constrained to single figure percentage increases if they felt circumstances warranted more, but that the public should be made fully aware of the specific projects which would be funded as a consequence.

Public conveniences - St Mary's Street The Council noted, but took no immediate action upon a suggestion made by David Allott that any relocation of public conveniences in St Mary's Street might be within the grounds of Painswick Centre.



Walkers car park - vandalism

Ann Daniels reported vandalism at the car park adjacent to Painswick Plantation, on the Cotswold Way. Among other mindless actions one of the finger signs had been irreparably damaged.

Services of Remembrance

The annual Service of Remembrance will be held in St Mary's Church at 10.50am on Sunday 11th November.

The service will be preceded at 10.20am by a short period of recollection at the War Memorial during which wreaths will be laid.


All local organisations are invited to participate in the wreath laying ceremony. Everyone will be most welcome at the services.






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Music Annual



We soon contacted the fount of all knowledge on this subject, Nicola Hayward our Practice Manager, who was distressed to hear that there seem to be quite a few who remained unaware of this year's arrangements. Nicola had been endeavouring to avoid the shortcomings of this exercise in 2006. when readers will recall that insufficient vaccine was available on the appointed dates. She went on to say "I am very surprised and disappointed that patients have directed their queries your way when they should have come to me. I did put posters up at all the local post offices prior to letters going out and we have been putting notices on prescriptions but anyway.....".

Unfortunately, the date of the latest clinic was last Wednesday, 31st.

Nicola has asked us to pass on her regrets, saying "I am very sorry that some patients have not yet received notification about this year's flu vaccination campaign. Many invitations have been posted out, but I am aware that some will have been delayed by the postal strikes. Many patients have already had their vaccination, but if you haven't already booked your appointment, please contact the surgery on 812545 to book a time. Flu vaccinations are being offered to anyone who would like one, and unlike last year, we have plenty of vaccine".

Scam advice - from the Police

The Trading Standards Office are making people aware of the following scam especially with the run up to Christmas:

A card is posted through your door from a company called PDS (Parcel Delivery Service) suggesting that they were unable to deliver a parcel and that you need to contact them on 0906 6611911 (a premium rate number).

DO NOT call this number, as this is a mail scam originating from Belize.

If you call the number and you start to hear a recorded message you will already have been billed £15 for the phone call.

Street Lighting

The County Council has been piloting a change in street light operation, switching some lights off during the early hours of the morning. The benefits include reduced energy usage and light pollution, though there are often safety and other needs that outweigh the benefits. In many cases the situation requires a judgement to be made, balancing the different factors.

The first pilots started in June, and involved switching off some individual streetlights between 12.00pm and 5.30am GMT. Painswick is not involved in initial pilots but the County Council is now seeking to extend it to other areas. The Parish Council has established a sub-group to look into the matter, and it would welcome your views. The first stage of the exercise is to draw up a list of streetlights that should be considered.

The purpose of this article is to seek your views. In particular, the sub-group would welcome your views on which if any streetlights could be switched off between midnight and 5.30am. The views will obviously carry greater weight if they are the collective views of those living close to or making use of the relevant streetlight. Please send your comments, preferably in writing, to "The Street Lighting Sub-group" at the Parish Council, Town Hall, Victoria Street, Painswick by the end of November. Or contact one of the councillors below.

The County Council has indicated that "fine tuning" may be required following any conversion work, and requests for reinstatement of individual streetlights to all-night operation will be given urgent attention.

Men behaving badly

Ian Mackintosh opened this year's program of the Painswick Local History Society, telling us about examples of criminal behaviour back in the 17th and 18th century. In those early days, women were rarely recorded, as the prime interest was the availability of men for military service. It would appear that at that time violence and intimidation was commonplace and rioting in protest at bread prices or the theft

of wool (slingeing) could result in transportation to the Colonies, if lucky enough not to be hanged. Sometimes the poor were assisted by Parish Relief and given subsidised bread, but the 19th century saw the introduction of the dreaded workhouse system, coinciding with unemployment of outworking weavers, as factory production became the mainstay of production.

New team

At its AGM on Monday 15th October, the Painswick Centre said farewell to four Trustees; the Chairman, Russ Herbert, Treasurer, Trevor Smith, and Alan Shearer and Tony Gibson who had been trustees for many years. They have toiled to achieve the financial revival that has allowed nearly £90,000 to be spent in recent years on emergency repairs, redecorations, high quality toilets etc. There is also a modest bank balance that is earmarked for contributing to a number of improvements to lighting, switchgear, mechanical curtains, insulation, wider bar, small balcony and perhaps, ambitiously, a new entrance foyer. The sequencing of spending will depend largely on the availability of grants, and their percent rates. The best rates are now given for virtuous purposes such as, energy saving and access for the disabled.

Since two other Trustees, Johnny Johnson and John Holmes resigned during the year, the 2007 elected Trustees – Sue Lendon, Ralph Drew, Jacek Wolowiec ('Wol' to many) and me David Allott, plus newcomer Simon Graesser, reckon they have both a 'class act' to follow and lots of changes to manage. All offers of help – without necessarily becoming a trustee – will be very, very welcome!

Russ Herbert, in his Chairman's Report, emphasised the

time freely given by his fellow trustees for maintenance, management, organising events and long hours behind the bar. And how much dogged determination had been shown by Alan Shearer in somehow getting the money in to pay the many bills. He also paid tribute especially to the two crucially important ladies, his wife, Jackie and to Rose Smith. These two, often

behind the scenes, made huge contributions to the smooth running of bookings, bookkeeping, minutes and paperwork of all kind.

Former trustee, Paul Sparks, paid special tribute to Russ Herbert. Russ has steered the Centre away from risk of drowning in insolvency to

the current calmer waters where it has five main streams of income so that the business he has unashamedly made it into can 'wash its face' financially, and develop serious plans for a future that includes major improvements as well as increases in its uses and users.

At the first meeting of the 'new' Trustees, later that evening, it was agreed that I, David Allott would be Chairman. Ralph Drew has been confirmed as Treasurer.

After the formal part of the AGM was concluded, Russ Herbert introduced me and Barbara Pond, the Village Halls specialist from GRCC (Gloucestershire Rural Community Council) to talk to the title "Possible impact of 'Gateway Project' on operation of Painswick Centre."

I focussed on three propositions:

Centre

- · Owning a building without the income to sustain it is bound to end in unhappiness.
- · Most of Painswick's lettable premises have space unused between 50 and 70% of the time.
- · Painswick Centre will feel unable to proceed with major investments until it is clear what Gateway and other key players, such as the Parish Council, intend to do.

These considerations lead to the Centre's keen support for a Painswick-wide Feasibility Study.

Barbara Pond explained the key features of a feasibility study, how decision makers would welcome its guidance and in what ways a village can expect to benefit. Her talk was supported with displays of a similar exercise in a smaller village, - Ashleworth (which is near Tewkesbury). When questions began she outlined the possible scope in Painswick, and the expert help that can be used, and paid for. She guessed, depending on scope, detail etc., that a time scale of 6 months and cost of up to £5,000 might be expected.

A jury trial this month


An Evening with John Stalker

Time, being slightly slower. It is, of course, also very decorative.


Harriet James undertook the task of restoration which was funded jointly by the British Sundial Society, Painswick and District Conservation Society, the late

It is tempting to include all the information given on the plaque in this account but you should stop and look next time you are passing. You will be fascinated and it takes only a minute or two.







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Heritage Protection for the 21st Century

Amanda Hooper (from English Heritage) gave an enjoyable and informative talk to Painswick Local History Society on the proposed new Heritage Protection legislation. It aims to protect the historical environment in a more holistic way, making use of experience gained from previous legislation which it will supersede. My impression is that much will stay the same – particularly for listed buildings in Painswick – and hope that the new Act will encourage a more practical application and allow minor changes and repairs to be handled in a less bureaucratic way. A single register of historic buildings and sites is planned, which will be accessible electronically. Many existing listings are of limited usefulness, and it is planned to update them – though I can see this taking a very long time to complete.



The "White Paper" was published in March 2007 and draft legislation has been prepared. It is currently planned to introduce legislation in 2008/09 with implementation in 2010.

In response to a question, Amanda advised that English Heritage had recently issued new guidance about the balance between protecting buildings and the need to conserve energy. The document is available from English Heritage and on their website.

Remember, Remember, the 5th November - Park Legally!

District councils will enforce on-street parking in most of Gloucestershire from 5th November. Five district councils will be taking over from the police traffic wardens in a partnership project led by Gloucestershire County Council and the sixth, the Forest of Dean, is likely to follow next May.

Introducing Civil Parking Enforcement (CPE) will help us to manage congestion, improve turnover of parking spaces outside shops, prevent abuse of disabled bays, and release police resources to tackle crime and disorder.

No doubt you've heard, or even experienced, the horror stories about parking in London. We don't want this happening in Gloucestershire! The district councils enforcing on-street parking on behalf of the County Council will be working under Agency Agreements, which emphasise the quality of service. Procedures are based on best practice and all staff are being trained to a national qualification.

So, from 5th November, who does what?

- Stroud District Council will be responsible for both on and off street parking enforcement, with a team of parking attendants on patrol. Cotswold District Council will be carrying out back office functions including payments and penalty charge notice processing on behalf of Stroud District Council.
- · The County Council will not be involved in these matters, dealing instead with parking strategy and new parking schemes.
- The police will still be responsible for enforcing cases of 'obstruction', for example cars blocking a private driveway or a road without road markings.

If you remember one thing from this, just remember to 'PARK LEGALLY'. If you do get a ticket, read it carefully - paying late could mean missing your chance to pay at a 50% discount, or even your right to appeal.


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Local music

We heard a 1923 recording of Mercury, from the Planets by Holst, and powerful renderings of Sampson Blinded, by Handel, and The Pleiades from Tannhauser, and finally a song from Peter Grimes, about the Great Bear and The Pleiades.

As we all know a home information pack became a legal requirement for properties being placed on the market for sale from the 1st August for properties with four or more bedrooms and is now also a requirement for three bedroomed properties too.
