PARISH COUNCIL NEWS 17th July by Terry Parker

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear.

The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office.



PLANNING COMMITTEE

Catbrain Quarry

A site meeting had been arranged for the following Friday. There were a number of issues to be discussed with Meister Masonry, one of which was the requirement for hydroseeding to the quarry face.

Washbrook Mill, Edge Road

The Committee agreed to support the application for a 3 storey extension with double garage subject to several conditions.

Friends Meeting House, Vicarage Street

The Committee agreed to support the application to demolish the external toilet and replace it with a toilet for the disabled.

The Old Library Building, Stroud Road

Cllr Abigail Smith raised the issue of parking. Cllr Roey Parker queried the width of the pathway. She also asked about contractors' parking during the building works. Cllr Bullingham said that the path had to be a minimum width of 4 feet. He explained that the contractors could rent spaces for their use during the development. The Committee then agreed to support the revised application for the conversion to form 4 new dwellings and the provision of a new pedestrian route between Stamages Lane car park and the churchyard. It was also agreed to support the associated Listed Building application.

PARISH COUNCIL

Public questions

Several written questions had been submitted. Cllr Rob Lewis responded to the query about a faster Broadband delivery. He explained that this had been delayed but said that progress was being made. Speeding traffic through Edge. The Chairman, Cllr Martin Slinger, explained that a Speed Monitoring group was being set up. The group would be trained by the police. Its members would make a list of hot spots and report these to the police. This would be a parish-wide initiative. Authority had been given to purchase a Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS). This would be a mobile facility. It would need to have the capability of recording speeds. It was hoped to have the VAS shortly. The meeting was informed that the Edge Net would carry a request for volunteers.

Another question concerned the possible inclusion of Holcombe Parish within that of Painswick. The County Council had said that the number of electors in Holcombe (25) did not justify the necessary administration costs involved in effecting the change. That said the council was prepared to receive an application.

Main meeting

Apologies for absence had been received from Cllrs Ela Pathak-Sen and Anne Smith.

Matters of urgency. Chairman Cllr Martin Slinger told the meeting that he had been asked about camping on Common Land. He said that you could not park on Common Land without the permission of the owner. However this was a civil matter, not one for the police.

Painswick Youth Club project

A number of donations had been received. Consent for the planning application was awaited. There was optimism that the remaining £20,000 would be forthcoming.

Post Office

The Clerk reported that the provision of a post office facility within the village was still under consideration by Post Office Limited.

Canton Acre Turning Circle

It was reported that the District Council required the approval of the Highways Department before the reduction in the central area could be effected. It had been understood that this had been previously agreed. The Clerk would ask the District Council to speed up the action.

Parish Action Plan

Cllr Caroline White told the meeting that, having adopted the Parish Action Plan, the Council needed to agree how to progress and monitor the key actions. The Plan Working group recommended that Champions should be appointed for each section of the Plan. The Champions and relevant committees would review their Action Plan section in detail, identify actions and agree priorities. They would then agree completion targets and report these to the Council. It would be for the Champions to update the Council and maintain momentum on key actions. The proposal was that the Clerk would create an agenda item for the Action Plan updates at each full Council meeting. Cllr White said that the Action Plan was a living document which had to be reviewed regularly with quarterly updates. The Council endorsed the Working Group's proposals and went on to appoint individual Councillors as Champions of the various categories. Cllr White agreed to coordinate the actions as they were reported.

Tibbiwell Lane post box

A letter had been received from the Member of Parliament, Neil Carmichael, in which he expressed his concern at the Post Office's decision not to restore the post box. He was pursuing the matter.

County Councillor's report

Cllr Jason Bullingham had submitted a written report to the Parish Council. In the report he explained that, having lost overall control of the County Council at the election in May, the Conservative group had agreed to form a minority administration. Cllr Mark Hawthorne had been re-elected

as Council Leader with Conservative Councillors being appointed as Cabinet Members. Cllr Bullingham told the Parish Council that each County Councillor had been allocated £20,000 for road repairs. He was asked to consult with his parishes regarding priorities for pothole repairs. Because of the reduction in the number of County Councillors he had responsibility for 30 parishes. He said he believed that the priority should be for road repairs rather than potholes. Two extra gangs were being employed in the Southern Division.

Council Tax Support Funding

Stroud District Council (SDC) had written to all parish and town councils reminding them that the Government had abolished Council Tax Benefit from April this year and that the SDC had implemented a local Council Tax support scheme with 10% less Government funding. In January the SDC consulted with Painswick Parish Council whether it wished to receive its share of the funding in order to keep the Council Tax level stable. There was a rationale for not taking the funding because the amount for the Local Council Tax Support scheme in 2014/15 will be lower and councils will be forced to increase their precepts to maintain their spending levels or reduce services.

The SDC consultation with parish and town councils had resulted in a very split view and the councils were now asked to consider one of 5 options as a way forward. The Parish Council voted for Option 4 which would mean the Local Council Tax Support Funding for 2013/14 would be directed to funding projects that support the SDC's 'Jobs and Growth' agenda. A disadvantage of this option was that some smaller councils with no resources to put a bid together would miss out.

Sheepscombe Cricket Club

The cricket club had asked for a grant of £2,000 towards the purchase of the ground which they currently rented. Parish Councillors agreed that they could not afford this amount. They could not allocate Sheepscombe's Ward budget of £500 as this would leave no money for other needs. Cllr Bullingham said that £50,000 was available from County Council funds for such projects and he would follow this up. It was agreed to support the project in principle.

Sheepscombe Churchyard

A grant towards the maintenance of Sheep-scombe Churchyard had been requested. The Clerk reminded the members that a sum of £1,000 had been earmarked for the 3 Parish Churchyards. A third of that sum would therefore be allocated to Sheep-scombe.

Next Parish Council meeting

It was agreed that there should be no meeting in August unless a matter of urgency made a meeting necessary.

Stop Press

Excellent news and a challenge for Youth Club Appeal

The Appeal in last month's Beacon for £30, 000 from our local Community to be able to start the work on the Youth Club building and the very tight timescale may have looked like something of a mountain to climb. However, we have had notification from a large Trust, the Weston Foundation, that they are prepared to provide up to £20,000 of the target if the Painswick Community can raise just £10,000. This suddenly makes the project look extremely achievable if the Community really gets behind it over the next 4 weeks. At the time of going to press, we have already received cheques worth £3250 including recoverable Gift Aid, almost a third of what is now required to complete the £145,000 scheme. So we need just £5400 before Gift Aid during August, the equivalent of 54 households giving £100 or 108 families committing to £50. We are confident that the people of Painswick care enough about their young people to do this by supporting the Junior Football Club, Cricket Club and Youth Clubs to make this project a reality, having now got so close. Please consider whether you are in a position to help, and if so, drop a cheque into the Town Hall addressed to PSALMS, with your address on the back so that we can claim gift aid. And don't forget the Open Meeting at the Youth Club on August 5th if you want to see the full plans for both the building and the football pitches. Many thanks.


The Painswick Beacon at 35






speak of the team's sadness at the news of the death of his predecessor, Philip Oakley.

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Painswick - more places to eat

Cotswolds88

Afternoon tea at Cotswolds88 is certainly very special. From just home-made scones and cakes through to the full works complete with an impressive range of sandwiches, all with a selection of teas from which to choose, this is an experience to grace any occasion. The added pleasure is that tea can be taken in any of the public areas of the hotel – the lounge areas, bar, dining room, gardens, balcony.

Needless to say, all the fare on offer is special. It is not for nothing that the hotel earned three rosettes for its fine dining. Manager, Greshan Naidoo, seen in the picture with Jake Smith who is one of the four chefs, describes the food served as having French influence but with an English twist. There are set lunches of two or three courses plus a bar menu available from 12 noon to 9.30pm. The restaurant is open seven days a week until 9.30pm and afternoon teas are



served from 3.00-5.00pm. And just for Painswick residents – 2 for the price of 1 Sunday lunches are on offer until 31st October. The hotel, which has 17 bedrooms, has become very popular as a venue for events such as weddings and private dinners. It does, of course, enjoy the perfect setting with stunning views across the valley. Greshan, who hails from Johanesburg and has 16 years experience in hotel management, loves the style of the hotel and its location. It cleverly combines a great sense of tranquillity and beauty with vivacious decor to provide a lovely space in which to relax and enjoy truly excellent food.

The Rococo Restaurant

The restaurant at the Rococo Garden must be one of very few that can proudly declare an almost complete local sourcing of the produce used in its fare. At present the kitchen garden is providing an abundance of salad and vegetables freshly brought up to the kitchen every day – and the range is really good with the result that the menu is always seasonal and interesting.

Paul Moir explains that a real emphasis is on making that part of the garden relate back to the original 18th century plan, including the vegetables grown there. As he points out, the Rococo garden is quintessentially an area for growing edible plants, not flowers, so the kitchen section is at the very core.

In the autumn the fruit will become the main crop and will be used to make pies, cakes, chutneys and so on. All the fruit trees are heritage varieties many of which are better for cooking purposes than more recent types. Any excess fruit goes to Days Cottage Fruit Juices and Kitchen Garden Foods, both local companies. Everything served in the restaurant is home-made and home-cooked and, as many of the ingredients are grown just yards away, it could not be fresher



Apart from what comes up from the garden itself, other local suppliers are Simon Weaver

Cotswold Organic Dairy, The Country Butcher, Day's Cottage Apple Juice and The Artisan Baker. The good wholesome food served in the Rococo restaurant is unsurpassed for freshness and genuine home cooking and as an example of how to provide a really excellent service based almost entirely on locally-sourced ingredients it is to be applauded.

The Rococo Garden

The garden of course is a joy, a haven of tranquillity and interest and also a space for all sorts of events from weddings to parties to meetings. On 14th and 15th August a production of Twelfth Night will be performed at 6.30pm. But this will be no ordinary produc-

tion. The company is The Handlebards, a four-strong, all-male troupe of travelling players, playing 40 characters. They are spending two months travelling from Glasgow to London by bicycle (926 miles) carrying with them all the necessary props, sets and costumes to give performances of two Shakespearean plays at 26 venues en route including Painswick Rococo. It promises to be lively, different, surprising and performed on eight rather sore legs!

You can buy a ticket which can be used for either performance as you wish. Now there's an event not to be missed!










Community Library welcomes HRH the Duke of Gloucester...."Creepy House"and Art Couture!

Both displays were put up the previous weekend and the library had been open from 11 to five pm on Sunday 14th July. During this time lots of children came in to make hats to display on the lunchtime

cat-walk and in the afternoon they put together a frieze for the library wall. CLIP is very grateful to Vicky Hendzel-Walker from "Crafty Kids" who gave her time to run these activities. Overall the library had 311 visitors and made £49 on book sales.

You can still enjoy the displays and there's plenty of time to get started on the Reading Challenge (don't forget to bring your library card). Cup Cakes for Carers Observed

What sort of image does Cup Cakes for Carers conjure up. Nothing very much; one must admit, no idea of its activity or happenings is conveyed. So I thought



I, as an observer of its short existence, would like to open it up, giving a wider appreciation of why and what makes it tick.

Folk who are caring for someone who is not fully able to look after themself, most often a lifelong partner, do not think themselves 'carers' under that word's formal usage. But they actually are and often find themselves willingly tied by their sense of duty or bond to that someone, to be on hand to help and serve that someone to such an extent they have few offduty moments to meet other folk or simply to have a chat about how others 'in the same boat' are managing. Opportunities to exchange knowledge of similar problems met and overcome can be a great help to someone meeting them for the first time. There are lots of devices and gadgets available for easing or solving everyday problems that one does not normally get to know about other than by hearing about them from someone else. So Cup Cakes for Carers was conceived to fill that gap as an afternoon drop-in-cup of-tea-time where such experiences might be found enjoying a cup of tea and a cake in a rare moment of care free time.

And does it fill that gap?. Well, yes it does. But only so far as folk use the opportunities on offer. In the near two years it has existed, Painswick's Cup Cakes for Carers has become a small group of experienced regulars and a few 'drop-ins' that clearly find themselves enjoying the teas and cakes, and benefiting from the information and experiences shared. This takes place once a month at Painswick Centre's Green Room, on the first Tuesday afternoon. There is no membership or set time. One just drops in at any time between 1.30pm and 4.30pm for as long as you like. Pat Burrows, its organiser, is there with the knowledgeable Andrea Linsell, a retired Occupational Therapist, with her portable shop window of discounted specialist aids to living. A battery operated shopping scooter is available, by arrangement, for trial driving purposes and using it for walker-accompanied trips in the open air.

Obviously more carers might participate in these gatherings once it is realised what they provide, that there is helpful information to be gained there and to pass on. Not only that, there are cups of tea and cakes to be had as well (at no charge). The chatting cannot be categorised. It covers pretty well most things that are happening in Painswick which otherwise might be missed. Whilst this is explicitly for the benefit of 'carers', caring charges may be brought when no one is available to 'hold the fort'; it has been a revelation to find these enjoying a chat on occasion when an interest is sparked off.

A reluctance to drop in for tea, a chat, a cake and what have you is understandable because the natural reaction 'I'm not a carer', 'it's not for me' or 'it's not my scene' may come to mind as the first thought. But it is what you can add or may take away that counts. The next meeting is on September 3rd. See you there?

The Singers' Tale

Painswick Singers' next Autumn Concert, falling close upon Halloween, brought conductor Andrew Hopwood under Halloween's spell, inspiring him to mount a programme of Witches, of Crime and Dastardly Deeds enough to scare the living daylights of our audience. There will be a Witches' chorus from Verdi's Macbeth and the Priest's chorus from Mozart's Magic Flute leading the counterattack, whilst younger members will enjoy a selection of numbers to Defy Gravity from Wicked, the hit West End musical. There will also be a selection from Gilbert's & Sullivan's "Ruddigore" (or "The Witch's Curse,") with its story of the Murgatroyd ancestral portraits coming to life to torture the hapless incumbent, Sir Ruthven, for failing to commit a decent crime a day, told by John Dickenson in his accustomed witty way. We will be offering free entry for children if they come with green painted faces.

Now, La pièce de résistance of the Concert programme and hereby hangs the Singers' Tale. Our Hon. Treas. with his ear to the ground for a replacement rehearsal accompanist for the Singers, was chatting to the man sitting next to him at a local musical event. Yes, you guessed it, this person just happened to be a pianist and yes, he became our accompanist as of last January. Only later did it emerge that the new accompanist, one Geoffrey Poole, is a well established British composer with some eighty broadcasts, fifty published works and representation on several top CD labels: and, what is more, a recently retired professor and head of Music at Bristol University.

When Andrew mentioned the idea of a new piece for the next Halloween concert, Geoffrey began to search for poems. After two unsuccessful attempts he discovered The Hag by the Devonshire pastor-poet Robert Herrick, dating back to the Civil War in 1648. Geoffrey has written "in costume" as he puts it - in a traditional tonal language with an ongoing witch's gallop, and dramatic twists and turns. So, The Ballad of Halloween Hag was born and has now been published, though we have yet to give it voice (Geoff. tells me it is not too hard for the singers but the keyboard part is quite tricky – look who is complaining!). The Autumn Concert will be its World Premiere Performance that promises to be a highlight of the autumn season and is happening right here in The Painswick Centre on Saturday October 26th at 7.30pm. Letter from El Contador

May I introduce another player onto the Contador stage; our electrician, Angel - pronounced An-hel, the "h" is formed and delivered from the back of the throat, so be careful not to spit onto your Beacon. I don't know about you, but electrics have always been - pardon the inverted pun - a "dark art" to me. Changing a light bulb and fitting a plug are about the limits of my knowledge. We first met this polite and friendly man after we had been in the house for a couple of months when he turned up to offer a quotation for the complete rewiring of our property. No sooner had he stepped over the threshold, he said in a shocked voice, "touch nothing until I make your house safe." Many rural village properties had no electricity even up to the 1960's, in fact our neighbours' elderly parents by their own choice still have none. As time went by houses were wired up piecemeal and even connected into the national grid by their owners, with little or no reference to safety. After Angel and his apprentice David (accent on "a" as in cat) had made the place temporarily safe we were thankful that we had not been electrocuted. The rewiring job took weeks of dust and rubble involving channeling through stone in all four walls in every room. Happily, after Council inspection, we were returned to the 21st. Century. Angel has done more work for us over the years, is always on time, refuses tea, coffee and even vino. His prices are very reasonable. The Magic of Bird Migration.

Bird migration covers a number of seasonal happenings and involves some overlapping of bird activity. The arrival of Summer visitors from March onwards coincides with departures of Winter visitors to their breeding grounds in Northern and Eastern Europe and vice-versa in Autumn. It is possible to know where Spring visitors come from but not where their final destination may be. Wheatears passing through in May could end up in Greenland.

That is part of the magic of watching birds migrating, the mystery of their origins and destinations. One of the best places locally to see this in action is Painswick Beacon. Regular watches take place, early morning to midday, from August to April to log the different species passing through. Crossbills have been seen in July already and the first Swifts moving south. Birds pass over southwards or follow the Scarp Edge towards the Severn estuary.

Typical birds recorded during Autumn migration include Yellow wagtail, Swallow, House martin, Tree pipit, Wheatear, Hobby and Spotted flycatcher. Late September onwards there is a strong passage of Common gulls, Wood pigeons, Meadow pipit, Siskin, Redpoll, Chaffinch, Brambling, Fieldfare and Redwing. Rarer birds do turn up and last year Hawfinch, Firecrest, Merlin, Woodcock and Osprey were seen.

Why not visit the Beacon and experience a different kind of bird watching.

Chatworth House and the Cavendish Family



On June 25th we had an excellent talk on the above by Gillian White which was illustrated throughout by portraits of the Cavendish family from 1550 to 1850. Sir William Cavendish began the building of Chatsworth in 1550 but it was not completed until after his death by his third wife Bess of Hardwick. At the time of his death he owed £5300 but fortunately Bess was a good friend of that other Bess, Elizabeth the First who let her off some of the debt and the remaining £1000 was settled by her new husband! The benefit of knowing the helping royalty continues throughout the Cavendish Family as they climb the social ladder. Sir William's second son becomes the first Earl of Devonshire following his loan of £11,000 to James the Second. The fourth Earl plots with others to overthrow the King and install William of Orange for which he is rewarded with a place at court and a Dukedom in 1694. He starts rebuilding Chatsworth in several phases over 20 years – very lavish and formal ornate gardens of the 17th/18th century style – these are only there for about 20 years.

The fourth Duke becomes Prime Minister for a short time. The fifth Duke married the beautiful Georgiana who became a political hostess for the Whig party. There was much lampooning of this in the press which annoyed the Duke and following Georgina's affair with Charles Grey (Earl Grey of tea fame) and when she became pregnant was banished but a year later he relented and following her death in her early 40's married his mistress. The sixth Duke doesn't marry but makes vast improvements to the house – a state of the art kitchen, library and a dining room where Princess Victoria had her first grown up meal. He built the sculpture gallery and employed Joseph Paxton as head gardener. The Emperor fountain was created – 263 foot high and the great conservatory, the centre aisle of which was wide enough for two carriages to be driven through side by side. He died in 1858 and was much mourned by all. It was an excellent talk delivered with so much knowledge and verve that we were all left wanting more.

time consuming repair work. No chemical spraying is permitted on the fairways which makes maintenance that much harder to keep the quality up to standard and there are restrictions as to when and where grass areas may be strimmed.

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

So we need to plan NOW in order to remain as independent as possible. If you are paying the full cost of your care you may have

Chosen not to approach the Gloucestershire County Council (GCC) for help

Been assessed but are not currently eligible for adult social care support

Been assessed and are eligible for social care support, however your savings and assets are above £23,250, and therefore not eligible for financial support

At the moment GCC's resources can only be provided if the social care needs fall within the Critical or substantial bands of eligibility. CRITICAL needs: when life is or will be threatened

Serious abuse or neglect has or will occur

When the person is unable to carry out vital personal care tasks. SUBSTANTIAL needs;

Abuse or neglect will or has occurred

When a person is unable to carry out most personal care needs

Most family or social roles cannot be undertaken

Care and support can mean being able to stay at home and having personal care, practical support, equipment or adaptations to make living at home easier and more comfortable, support and care allowing you and your carer to have a break, advice and information specific to your needs.

There are free services provided regardless of savings Advocacy: support to help you speak up for what you want.

Telecare: technology like monitoring devices and alarms.

What happens if you have been paying for your own care but now your savings and assets have fallen below the threshold but you want to keep your choice of care which cannot be financed by the council? Someone other than yourself (possible a family member) can pay the difference, known as a "top -up".

Please seek specialist advice before selecting your care and you may not have to sell your home or use all your assets to fund vour care.

PROPERTY REPORT for July from Hamptons International

As I sit in our lovely converted chapel (without air conditioning!) in the heart of Painswick it is easy to feel I am overheating but for once it seems there is also evidence to suggest the housing market is also warming up nicely!

The Nationwide Building Society has reported a year-on-year increase in June of 1.9% nationally. London is still hogging the lion's share of this growth but here in the South West we are 1.5% higher than 12 months ago. Interestingly, it is also commented that London prices (where the financial crisis began) are now 5% higher than at the peak of the market in 2007 whereas prices in the rest of the country are now languishing typically 9% below 2007 levels.

July has seen Mark Carney take the reins as Governor at the Bank of England and, contrary to normal policy, he has already been making ripples by giving "forward guidance" that under his watch interest rates are likely to remain low in order to avoid harming a fragile recovery with rising longer term rates. We believe that this is good news for the economy as it will encourage households and business to spend and invest now giving the economy a much needed boost in the knowledge that borrowing will remain affordable for some time.

Hamptons own data shows that housing market activity is on the up with sales agreed being up 15% year-on-year and new applicants (demand) being up 30% across our network. Here in Painswick we are seeing equally positive results with sales in June and July already up 60% on last year and we still have two weeks to go in July - with sunshine dawn till dusk and a buoyant housing market we really could have a vintage year ahead of us!
