



WI Centenary Baton Event

To commemorate the Centenary of the National Federation of Women's Institutes over 50 representatives of the four Painswick Group WIs paraded a Centenary Baton around St Mary's Churchyard. Led by a banner including the names of the local WI sector, a procession with lanterns wove its way through the famous yew trees to the sound of pealing bells. The baton was reaching the end of its journey, thousands of miles around every WI in the country, by tractor, boat, helicopter, horse and many other forms of transport. It has now been run by Celia Hargrave from WI House, Gloucester to Cheltenham Town Hall ready to be transferred to the Royal Albert Hall for the Centenary AGM in June. Members celebrated the occasion afterwards with drinks, canapes, cake and folk songs in the Church Rooms.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS 18th March by Terry Parker

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear.

The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office.

PLANNING COMMITTEE

Apologies. Apologies for absence were received from Cllr Ben Nicholls, Abigail Smith and Caroline White.

Matters requiring a decision. The committee agreed to recommend that the following applications be given consent by the District Council.

Olivers, Cheltenham Road. Insertion of a conservation window.

High clouds, Queens Mead. Addition of dormer window to front elevation. Reduction of window width in dormer to rear elevation.

Upper Cottage, Tibbiwell Lane. Separation of annexe from existing property to create new dwelling.

Theydon Cottage, Queens Mead. Proposed single storey extension and internal alterations.

Old Fleece, Bisley Street. Change of use of the ground floor from A1 retail back to C3 residential. The committee agreed to recommend the refusal of this application.

Sunnycroft, Hollyhock Lane. Erection of 2 storey extension to rear and erection of a detached garage. Conversion of existing garage into study, utility room/WC. The site had been visited by committee members. They could see no planning reasons that would justify a recommendation for refusal. The members were of the opinion that there should be no further alterations to the roof. There would be a requirement to arrange suitable parking and to ensure pedestrian access was maintained. They also recommended that all building materials be kept on the site. With these conditions the members recommended that the application be given consent.

PARISH COUNCIL

Public questions.

Terry Parker asked whether the Parish Council had plans to celebrate the 70th anniversary of the end of the Second World War in Europe, given that the Government had announced that there would be 3 days of celebration over the weekend of the 8th May. He said he understood that beacons were to be provided for use by borough councils. Councillor Rob Lewis supported lighting a beacon as had been done, for example, on the occasion of Her Majesty The Queen's Jubilee. It was agreed to contact Mr Amaury Blow who had arranged the positioning of the beacon on Painswick Manorship land in the past. Cllr Roey Parker asked whether there would be a similar event in August to celebrate the end of the Second World War in the Far East. Mr Parker said he could not answer that question.

Apologies. Apologies for absence had been received from Cllrs Ben Nicholls and Abigail Smith.

Matters of urgency. The Chairman, Cllr Martin Slinger, said that he wished to correct the statement made by Mr Leslie Brotherton in a TV interview where Mr Brotherton had referred to the number of co-opted councillors as opposed to elected members currently serving on Painswick Parish Council. Cllr Slinger said that 5 of the current members had been elected. Cllr Slinger reported that the Painswick Post Office Outreach Service in the Town Hall was planned to commence on Wednesday 22nd April.

County Councillor's report. Cllr Bullingham reported that the County Council had set its budget for 2015/16 with extra investment for rural transport, Wifi in libraries and the Highways local scheme. At the County Council meeting on 18th February the members agreed to set a budget of £420.03 million with £598,000 more targeted investment than originally recommended. In addition to the extra investments, it had been agreed to freeze council tax for the fifth year in a row. Responding to Cllr Lewis' question about the condition of roads, Cllr Bullingham said that roads were repaired within 28 days of the pothole being notified and that 80% of Gloucestershire's A Roads were in reasonable order.

District Councillor's report. Cllr Nigel Cooper said that there was to be no increase in Stroud District Council's council tax for the 2015/16 Financial Year. Cllr Cooper said that the District Council was providing a new waste depot for its contractors and also a new waste vehicle. He referred to the Boundary Review. If proposals were agreed it would mean that Upton St Leonards would form part of the Painswick Ward with the ward having three councillors. It was proposed that the number of District Councillors remain at 51.

Councillor David Oxendale. The Council had received Cllr Oxendale's resignation. The members expressed their considerable thanks to Cllr Oxendale for the commitment he had given to the Parish Council's work, in particular his contribution in helping secure the Post



Office Outreach service and the creation of the Love Painswick social media web site.

Play Painswick. Cllr Caroline White updated the Council on the recommendations of Play Painswick concerning the preferred supplier for the play equipment. The Council agreed that Proludic would act as the preferred supplier in order that funding could be sought. There was to be no contractual agreement until the funding had been achieved.

Recreation Ground Tennis Courts. Cllr Emma Smith asked the Parish Council to consider allowing the Recreation Ground tennis courts to be used as a multi-functional sports area. The Chairman read out an agreement which only referred to the Tennis and Bowls Pavilion. It was agreed to seek further information concerning the original agreement between the Parish Council and the Tennis Club in regard to the tennis courts.

Finance and General Purposes Committee. The Council agreed to the approval of a grant of £500 towards the provision of youth facilities in Painswick. The council also agreed to the committee's request that a grant of £500 be made to the Friday Club in recognition of the services provided by the Club to the older generation.

Sheepscombe Village Hall Car Park. The Council agreed to a grant of £1,000 towards the refurbishment of the car park. The grant was subject to the erection of a sign stating that the car park can be used by the community.

St Mary's Street commercial units. The Council approved a quotation from Moulton Haus Ltd to act as sole agents to market the leasing of the commercial units. The quotation included identifying and targeting occupiers and also drawing up and securing a lease in consultation with the Parish Council.

Annual Parish Meeting. This would be held in the Town Hall at 7.30pm on Wednesday 6th May.

Date of next meeting: Wednesday 15th April.


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How to paint reflections at the Country Studio Art Club

Acupuncture, headaches and migraines



The practice of acupuncture has come a long way since its initiation two thousand years ago in China. On the 24th February Adrian Lyster showed us how evidence and experience has recently given it a more scientific base and understanding of the mechanics involved. Now it has become part of the mainstream NHS treatments. He has worked for twenty five years in Gloucester and Cheltenham Hospitals specializing in the management of pain.

It became apparent that acupuncture is very effective with certain conditions and these include headaches, migraines, long-term back pain, nausea and vomiting and post-menopausal hot flushes. Some relief can also be gained for osteoarthritis, throat cancer and tennis elbow. Some WI members had experienced acupuncture personally, especially to alleviate migraines, and could testify to positive outcomes despite earlier scepticism.

The meeting on 28th April will be a talk by Merieen Watson on " Hearing Dogs for Deaf People".

Next Bishop of Gloucester

Yew Tree Appeal 2015 Sponsorship Opportunities

Six years ago the Vicar of St Mary's Church Painswick asked for the support of the local community in preserving their historic Yew Trees and providing help with the maintenance of the church yard. Trees were numbered and offered for sponsorship over a three year period at £99. The offer was oversubscribed and all the trees found sponsors. In addition several generous gifts were received.

The offer was repeated 3 years ago when 70% of the original sponsors elected to renew their sponsorship. The remaining trees quickly found new sponsors

The money raised has enabled St Mary's church to keep the trees and the grounds well groomed. The cost of maintaining the trees and cutting the grass is over £10000 per annum. Stroud Choral Society

"Straudissimo" was a good way to describe an enjoyable evening of music, merriment and mirth: a Charity Concert presented by the Stroud Choral Society on 31st January. In addition to the Painswick singer members there were 3 tables of Painswick listeners enjoying Gershwin, Jazz, close harmony, Flanders and Swann and Sarah Conolly. And to top it all, there were 2 big auctions to fund a new Commission by Peter Ash of Roald Dahl's "The Giraffe,Pelly and Me" and the new Youth Choir which, including ticket receipts, fabulously raised about £10,000!

Haydn's Creation" is a landmark in the choral repertoire, ranking close to Bach's B minor Mass, and Beethoven's Missa Solemnis. It is a long work - about 2 hours - but it does justice to the awesome subject, taking us through the creation of the world, land, sea, wind, birds, animal and whales to the arrival of Adam and Eve, a story in 3 parts told by angels.

In Gloucester Cathedral, the Society presented us on 7th March with a truly wonderful, joyful performance, chorus enjoying their singing and orchestra going flat out, exuberantly conducted by Huw Williams, with 3 soloists - soprano, tenor and bass - representing the archangels singing their hearts out.

Rococo Reflections

One of the highlights of the past two years at the Garden has been the Shakespeare plays performed by the HandleBards. This troupe consists of four lads who cycle across the UK performing at up to 70 locations. Everything for the production is carried on their bikes and bike trailers.

A special event when on 5th March we had the pleasure of meeting Meurig Bowen, Cheltenham Music Festival Director since 2007. Brief history: Chorister in London, studied music in Cambridge, joined



London Symphony Orchestra, was music agent, 6 years in Sydney with Australian Chamber Orchestra and 4 years with Lichfield Festival and sings bass in Gloucester Cathedral Choir.

This year is the 70th anniversary of the Festival. Meurig outlined the programme which begins end of June and will be revisiting 1945, music written in time of war and of new beginnings. Strauss, Britten, Messiean, Copland, Shostakovich, Tippett, Howells and Finzi, and interspersed this with wonderful recordings of Messiaen's Quartet for the End of Time, a religious work (Meurig was once Church Organist in Paris); Eric Whitacre's Water Night and ending with Strauss' Metamorphosis.

Dennis Morgan, one of our long-term members, gave an excellent presentation on 19th March to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Richard Strauss (1864 - 1949) last year. He followed a fascinating account of this musician's turbulent yet highly successful career both as a composer of symphonic poems, concertos, operas and songs and as international orchestral conductor, with recordings of his music. Outstanding were Violin Concerto, Horn Concerto no. 1 - flamboyant but highly demanding on the instrument - an elegant delight, and Metamorphosen - a tragic masterpiece composed late in his life for 23 solo strings.

Sir Winston Churchill and the goldfish

The fiftieth anniversary of Sir Winston's death in January this year brought to mind a story about the former Prime Minister that had a Painswick connection. Eilleen O'Sullivan who lived in Tibbiwell before moving to Resthaven, died in April 2011. In the tribute to Eilleen at her funeral, held in St Mary's Church and conducted by Rev Andrew Leach, Mike Farmer her nephew, recalled the following story about Eilleen which took place when his aunt was a secretary to Sir Winston.

"I am indebted to Jonathan Mirsky for this story. Churchill surprisingly had a veritable menagerie around him at No 10. There was a budgerigar that chewed state papers, a pug with extremely bad breath and a very disagreeable poodle. There was also a large tank of many tropical fish, and one of Eilleen's tasks, in addition to helping run the most secret actions of the war, was to look after this tank of fish. She had to net the fish, put them into a bucket, empty and clean the tank, fill it again and replace the fish in the tank Voila! Job done. Unfortunately one of the blighters got away and by the time she had found it, it was rather dead. Eilleen was also capable of thinking rapidly on her feet and the dead fish was quietly dispatched down the loo and nobody thought too much of it - Churchill continued to feed the remainder of the fish every day, tapping on the glass to let them know that dinner was served. Some time later, when Eilleen moved on, she was presented with a signed photograph of the great man and publicly complimented by him on how well she had done – and his last words to her were "And now Miss O'Sullivan, would you like to say goodbye to the remainder of the fish?"





Financial Matters – Pension Reform

The biggest changes to Pensions in some time will come into force right around the time that this edition of the Beacon hits your doormat.

As of April 6th 2015, members of non- final salary Pension Schemes are intended to have complete flexibility as to how they access their savings once they reach the Scheme retirement age. As we have seen in the national press this new flexibility has been met with both positivity and also a sense of nervousness as to what exactly this might mean.

The previous rules meant that, after taking a tax-free lump sum, funds were either directed to an annuity which would provide a guaranteed income for life or to a drawdown arrangement that provided flexibility on when the funds were taken but in many cases capped the amount that could be accessed at any one time.

The new rules still allow for the provision of a tax free lump sum but there will no-longer be a cap on the amount of income that can be taken. Annuities will remain an option for those looking for a guaranteed income. This has widely been publicised as turning Pension pots into bank accounts although at this stage it is unlikely that Pension Scheme administrators will offer that level of flexibility.

Final Salary Schemes will continue to pay the benefits which are defined within them and individuals will only be able to access the new flexibilities if they first transfer their funds out of the scheme and only after receiving professional financial advice

In addition to how a Pension pot can be taken there are also changes being made to the way in which remaining amounts are taxed on death. Although there is not enough room here to layout the new rules in any detail it is clear that Pension Savings may, in many cases, provide an efficient way to pass on wealth to the next generation.

Our finances always require careful planning and this is certainly no less true with the changes described. Having full flexibility to when we can access money sounds excellent on the face of it but does of course increase the chance that we run out. Each individual case will be different but it



will be key to assess how much we have, how much we need and how long we might need it for.

Understanding that these changes may be disconcerting to some the government has put into place a Guidance Guarantee. Although not fully rolled out the Pension Wise website is up and running (www.pensionwise.gov. uk) and provides a useful resource for those needing further detail on how they should approach their retirement finances.

Only time will tell us the impact that the reforms have had and who knows we may have new rules after the election in May. In the meantime I will be keeping a careful eye in Painswick for any increase in the number of Lamborghinis.

Jottings for March

Why do we bring our cows in, in the winter? In the autumn when the grass stops growing, what is available is very poor in nutrition, can be overgrazed and churned up in wet conditions. So we take the cows off and feed them with hay and silage; and perhaps pellets with extra nutrients. We want them to continue to build up weight for sale.

We may plough in some grazing land and replant for the next year and for hay.

If a field is under Higher Level Stewardship (HLS), we cannot cut it before the second half of July when the herbs in it have set seed. The grazing and



hay includes herb plants which give cows a good, varied diet. "Meadows" are defined as places where grass and flowers grow for hay, the winter fodder for livestock. Six million acres were ploughed in to grow cereals during the Second World War and now lowland meadows have declined by 97%. It is ironic that this man-made habitat now needs conserving!

Moles have been busy in the fields making long runs and pushing up clayey soil in their hunt for food and mates. The wet weather has brought the worms to the surface. Foxes and badgers have a feast. So do hedgehogs, which have been woken by the promise of spring. Unfortunately, the badgers find them; and are able to unroll them and eat the flesh leaving the spiny skin behind. The buzzards have been circling, meowing and coming too, for the worms. Wrens are making the most noise, in the hedgerows which are

white with blackthorn flower. Martin



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History in street art

At the March meeting of the Society Jenny Williams gave a clearly illustrated presentation on Gloucester's street art, explaining its historic significance for the county and the city.



Behind the cathedral stands the imposing Bishop Hooper's statue. Having Protestant leanings, this bishop was found guilty of treason on largely trumped up charges under Mary Tudor's

reign and his statue now stands on the site of his execution. Another statue, that of Robert Raikes, a man of national significance, stands in Gloucester Park. A statue of Charles II stands forlornly in Three Cocks Lane having been lost in the 18th century to be found in 1945 in a garden many miles away.

The city is blessed with many mosaics, some designed by children, depicting the industries which have been important locally. These include iron, bell making (Rudhall's were here until 1835 and their bells are to be found all over the world), tailors, innkeepers, market traders, dyers, weavers, apothecaries, cordwainers and pin making. There are also six mosaics on the wall of Shire Hall representing the departments within. These are, however, somewhat obscured from view by a tree.

A bronze marks the importance of the aviation industry, in the Docks the huge Candle is dedicated to Ivor Gurney and the Emperor Nerva AD 96-98 in Southgate Street was placed there because an excavation revealed remains believed to be of him. The Baker's Clock in Southgate Street appeared with the construction of the building in 1904, the Lion and Serpent are at the New Inn and in Three Cocks Lane are the delightful Booth Hall Cherubs.

The Flowing Wall behind Southgate Street represents the Severn as does the modern stone sculpture at The Cross, and various murals depict Gloucester's history from Roman times to the Civil War. 26 Westgate is considered to be one of the finest 15th century buildings and is depicted by a mosaic. In Cathedral Green is a memorial statue to the Gloucestershire Hussars Yeomanry, and the Kyneburg Tower recalls the story of a Saxon girl killed by her employer's wife and thrown down a well.

Perhaps rather neglected is the delightful Storytellers Bench in the churchyard of St Mary de Crypt and sadly more recently some artistic graffiti has now all been removed from Greyfriars. It is easy to pass through Gloucester and not be aware of its rich history. Members were certainly alerted to the fact that this visual art form is there in abundance.

At the next meeting three members will talk about their research into the Hyett sisters, boot scrapers and the glass slides of Reeds Mill. Tuesday, 21st April, Croft School, 7.30pm. Everyone welcome.

Shortly after the end of the First World War Painswick was invited to select a gun from a collection of captured German guns held in Gloucester. Apparently one was chosen and stood in front of the Institute, now Painswick Centre, for some time then possibly was taken to the Recreation ground. Does anyone remember the gun, and does anyone have a photograph of it?

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Flailing not failing

We have been successfully flailing in the 'Wildlife Corridor'



that joins Painswick Beacon (Painswick Parish) to Cud Hill Common (in Upton St Leonards Parish). The flail attachment replaces the unsuccessful mowing attachment that came with our Italian mountain mower. It makes a great job of taking brambles and weeds like Hemp Agrimony and Rosebay Willowherb right down to ground level. Many plants find it hard to recover from this, especially if second and third cuts occur as the 'weed' tries to grow back.

The Wildlife Corridor is nearly half a mile long, and when successful it will be full of flowers, butterflies and bees. The intention is to encourage Cud Hill flowers and insects to emigrate (legally, UKIP approved, no visa needed!) to Painswick Beacon/Common, and vice versa. We have only begun, it will take a number of work sessions using flail, brushcutters, chainsaws, loppers etc to achieve success. We will have to flail till we prevail!

A good example of a successful work party was Saturday 21st March with 5 power tools and fifteen determined volunteers. Thank you to Polly, Rita, Lilla, Jane, newcomer Di, Roger, Bill, Charlie, Simon, Wes, Ian, Paul and the three Davids.

A successful training course for chainsawing was completed in March, too. George Hodder, PBCG members David Little and Paul Baxter, and Cotswold Warden Saunders are now qualified to use chainsaws. With the four who were trained in February, there are now eight (plus two more Wardens) able to begin work improving access and productive growth in the Beacon's many woodland areas.

One final work party remains this Spring, on Saturday 11th April from 9 a.m.

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Kenilworth Castle & Elizabethan Gardens

the Haut Couture Department of Fortnum and Mason, London's luxurious and iconic West End Store. Gillian started work as a general assistant in January 1953 on £3 a week. Her boss was Mademoiselle Angele Delanghe who designed and produced exquisite designs for the Store. The East End girls in the workrooms were very talented, feisty and spirited and proved to be a real source of education on life for Gill!

High Fashion in the 50's didn't come much higher. Clients included famous actresses and wives of famous husbands. They were from the British aristocracy, Royalty from foreign climes and even our young Queen Elizabeth's Ladies-in-Waiting. The Department worked on Coronation robes for titled ladies and on many ball gowns for Debutante clients who were 'coming out' after the Coronation. Eventually the House Model post was offered to Gillian who accepted gladly, not only delighted to wear the beautiful clothes but to see her wages soar to £9 week. Pattern designs and fabrics were also sold to outside high class fashion establishments. A lady called Miss Powell who had four such dress shops up North was a regular buyer. Gillian modelled clothes for her consideration. On viewing outfits during one visit (not forgetting Gillian had a 23" waist) we were told that Miss Powell, who was of generous proportions, said in a lovely Northern lilt "Aye, very nice but us women up North yer know 'av 3 things in way - bust, belly and bum"!

Truly a remarkable and unique career experience which we all enjoyed hearing about.

An old orchard comes back to life

Javelin Park Incinerator

Pauline Kenny of Gyleen, Edge Road writes: Work could start soon on the Javelin Park Incinerator, located beside the M5 near Haresfield, less than five miles west of Painswick. It will process up to 190,000 tonnes of municipal, commercial and industrial waste per year producing potentially toxic emissions and CO2 which contributes to climate change.

I am most concerned about the emissions from the 230 foot (70 metre) stack which has the greatest impact within a five mile radius. A government report on the safety of incinerator emissions was due last year but has been delayed. Other European countries are moving away from incineration because of the health and environmental concerns.

Over half of household black bag rubbish could be recycled, but instead this will be burnt. Mechanical Biological Treatment (MBT), which sorts the trash, extracting the recyclable, compostable and reusable material, is a more environmentally friendly alternative.



Gloucestershire Bus Service Survey

Gloucestershire County Council is currently undertaking a bus survey. Its Integrated Transport Unit (ITU) seeks to maintain then public transport network in such a way that it enables people to maintain independence and access employment, education, medical care and essential shopping, whilst working within a budget. In 2011, Gloucestershire County Council undertook a major review of its subsidised bus network, which resulted in a complete redesign of many services. The County Council now wants to understand how public transport is working for people and how well people's essential transport needs are met.

'Thinktravel' travel advisors have been issuing surveys across Gloucestershire to both bus users and non-bus users. The aim of this public transport engagement is to collect qualitative and quantitative data which will help to understand the success of the existing network. Feedback obtained from the 2014 Local Transport Plan stakeholder groups sessions will also be taken into account.

I was almost afraid to ask. "Oh that," said Marciano, "used coffee grounds from the machine, no-one must know, they're for his roses, he grows the finest in the village



Let's start this month with something really special: Oxstalls Tennis in Gloucester have been running a series of dementia friendly tennis sessions. Our body uses muscle memory for actions which we might think we've forgotten but

Did you know that all dogs MUST be micro chipped from April 6th 2016? The benefit of having a dog chipped is that if a stray is found, it can be checked by any animal shelter or veterinary clinic and reunited with its owner within hours. Recently I visited an elderly lady who was distraught because her 16 year old dog had gone out the previous evening and not returned. The dog had been behaving unusually for a couple of days and her owner was fairly convinced that the dog had taken itself off die. She was micro chipped so I was able to alert the dog wardens in case her body was discovered and her owner could be notified. If you are in receipt of certain benefits such as pension credit you can get help with the costs at the RSPCA surgery in Stroud and at Teckels.

Today I decided to drop in on a 90 year old lady I know, who lives on her own. I'd been contacted by a concerned friend who felt that this lady had been showing signs of having increasing memory difficulties. There was no answer from her when I rang the bell and none of her lights were on even though it was getting dark. Looking through her letter box, I was able to see her lying at the bottom of her stairs. Fortunately she was conscious but



unable to move. Would you like to hear the good news or the bad? The good was that previously, I'd arranged for her to have a personal alarm and a Key safe both which I always recommend for anyone living on their own. The personal alarm

is worn either around your neck or as a bracelet. The key safe is a steel box outside the property which has a combination lock. This code is accessible to the emergency services so they can gain access without having to break down the door.

So here comes the "bad" news Ringing Care Line, they were able to give me the code but when I opened the box there was only the Chubb key; the door had a Yale and a Chubb lock! Additionally, both keys were in the locks on the inside of the door, so the police had to smash the door to get access to the lady. Was she wearing her Care Line? Like many other people, she didn't like to wear it in bed and put it on when she got dressed. That morning she'd gone to get her post before dressing, fell, and had been lying there all day. Fortunately she was found in time and her injuries don't seem too severe but the outcome could have so much worse. Please check that the correct keys are in key safes, keys aren't left in locks and personal alarms are worn and not left in a "safe" place. No one ever expects to have an accident which is defined as "an unfortunate incident that happens unexpectedly and unintentionally, typically resulting in damage or injury"

PROPERTY REPORT for March from Hamptons International

Activity levels in the housing market continue to improve but still sit someway below the long run trends we were used to before the crash. 
