# The Little Fleece grand opening



An abandoned Cotswold cottage has been transformed into an idyllic holiday spot to help fund conservation for some of the National Trust's outdoor sites.

The Little Fleece is a Grade II listed building and is situated in the tranquil Cotswold town of Painswick. It has been recently renovated to emphasise its beautiful historic features; it has three bedrooms which sleep up to five guests, two bathrooms, a spacious lounge with a large wood-burning stove and a dining room overlooking the enclosed Cotswold garden. Many of the furnishings have come from local manufacturers and all of the wood supplied for the stove is sourced from the local National Trust estate at Ebworth, near Stroud.

Money raised from this holiday cottage will be used to benefit the conservation and continued care of beautiful local sites, including Minchinhampton and Rodborough Commons, Woodchester Park and Haresfield Beacon.

Jayne Smith, Holiday Cottage Area Supervisor, said: "In its previous life this cottage was used as a bookshop, before standing empty for five years. It has been wonderful to give The Little Fleece a new lease of life and now see it being used once again by guests enjoying this stunning Cotswold location."

### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS 15th April by Mike Kerton

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear.

The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office.

#### PLANNING COMMITTEE

Chairman Rob Lewis opened the meeting with only 5 Councillors present. A sixth Councillor arrived during the course of the meeting. Apologies had been received from Cllrs Ian James and Ben Nicholls. Cllr Lewis advised the meeting that the Court House Application was still outstanding and that the two recent applications for change of use from shop front premises to private residences were being "called in" by Stroud District Council.

#### Matters requiring a decision

There were three matters requiring a decision:

**Painswick Mill,** Ticklestone Lane. Reinstatement of external door and surround in South West elevation. Unanimous support.

Land adjoining Painswick Mill, Ticklestone Lane. Erection of Stables. Unanimous support.

Land at Ticklestone Lane. Restoration of existing derelict cottage (Ticklestone Cottage). After a detailed discussion the Council unanimously agreed not to support the application. There were three main areas of objection. The Environmental Assessment report required further clarification, new access to the cottage expanded into an ANOB and thirdly access could be detrimental to footpaths and the Council would like comments to be obtained from the Highways Dept.

#### PARISH COUNCIL

Prior to opening the Meeting, Chairman Martin Slinger was presented with a cheque for £725 from Rita Bishop and David Linsell, representing Community Lunches in Painswick. The donation was towards providing a Defibrillator for Painswick. On behalf of the Council and the village Cllr Slinger expressed his sincere thanks for the donation.

The meeting was then opened and apologies accepted from Cllrs Ian James and Ben Nicholls.

#### **County Councillors Report**

County Councillor Jason Bullingham had submitted a written report. The County Council are urging businesses to remember pedestrians when putting out A boards or furniture outside their premises. Concerns have been raised by shoppers, particularly those who are visually impaired, in Cotswold towns and the County Council will be working closely with shop owners to make sure items for sale are not blocking pavements. It will be easier to access the internet from libraries in the County. Wi-Fi is currently available in the Gloucester, Cheltenham and Cirencester libraries and in the eight community libraries. Between April and the end of September this year, Wi-Fi will be extended to cover all libraries in the County. May will see Wi-Fi available in the library in Stroud.

#### **District Councillors Report**

As neither of the two District Councillors were present at the meeting there was no report.

#### To receive resignations

The Council had received letters of resignation from Cllr Caroline White. and Charles Perkins, a member of the Rural Environment Committee. The Council accepted the letters of resignation and requested that the Clerk send letters to both Cllr White and Charles Perkins thanking them for their hard work and the positive contributions they had both made to the Council.

#### To receive an update on the Recreation Ground Tennis Courts

Chairman Martin Slinger advised the meeting that despite extensive searches and discussions with the Council's Solicitors no trace of a formal agreement between the Parish Council and the Tennis Club could be found. There are existing agreements in force between the Council and the Tennis/Bowls Club Pavilion and the Youth Club Pavilion.

The Council agreed to form a working party to draw up an agreement between the Council and the Tennis Club. In the meantime a letter would be sent to the Tennis Club confirming that they could continue to use the courts and advising them that a formal agreement was being drawn up for their signature.

# To receive an update on Painswick Post Office

Chairman Martin Slinger advised the meeting that a letter had been received from Post Office Ltd confirming that due to delays in installing a BT line the Post Office Outreach service would now open on the 13th May. The opening hours would be from 9.30am to 11.30am weekly on a Wednesday and Friday. With firm support from the village it may be possible



to extend both the opening hours and the services offered.

## To Receive an update on Policing in the Parish

Cllr Abigail Smith advised the meeting that a positive response had been received from the local Inspector following a letter from the Council in which had expressed concern at the lack of proactive policing in Painswick. Despite a follow up email by the Council in which an offer had been made to discuss the Council's concerns and follow up phone calls made no date has yet been provided by the Police.

A meeting with PCC Martin Surl, to which Parish Councils had been invited, has been postponed and no new date yet set for the meeting. Despite the return from sick leave of the local PCSO, concerns are still being voiced by residents about the lack of police resources in the area. Cllr Smith confirmed that the Council will continue to pursue this matter.

#### **Responsible Financial Officers report**

The Clerk, Roy Balgobin, advised the Council that the National Association of Local Councils had recommended to all local Councils the need to comply with new financial regulations recently introduced by the Government. It was unanimously agreed by the Council to adopt the new regulations.

#### Ward Reports

Cllr Abigail Smith updated the Council on the 20mph zone. Gloucestershire Road Safety Partnership have now been engaged to aid the further development of measures in Painswick to reduce traffic speeds. All the recent traffic data has been provided to them for detailed analysis. A site meeting is being arranged so they can help with the exact siting of the Vehicle Activated Signs and provide advice on other possible measures.

She then went on to raise the question of the fencing that has been erected along Golf Club Road. The Clerk advised the meeting that legal advice was being sought in an attempt to clarify the position.

The meeting closed at 8.20pm





# Cobblers, clinics and clouds


April was our members' research evening and we were treated to three very different presentations.

Barbara Blatchley talked about boot-scrapers, those small holes in the walls of 40 or more Painswick houses usually to the right of the entrance. Their purpose became largely redundant once roads were macadamed - Painswick's bath house, designed by Sydney Barnsley, is notable that scrapers were included in the design when roads were already improved. The boot connection was extended by David Archard into the subject of cobblers - notably Aaron Hopkins who worked from the house in New Street where his name can still be seen carved into a lintel and Charles White who acted as dentist in addition to being a cobbler. Lord Dickinson spoke about the lives of the Hyett Sisters Ida, Violet, Margaret and Lucy. Ida and Violet moved away from Painswick (living under their father's shadow – Francis was an intellectual, very much master of the household, a leading light on the Gloucestershire County Council – was perhaps too much) Ida teaching music in schools in Berlin and later South Africa, and Violet as headmistress in various schools in Hertfordshire. Lucy and Margaret remained in Painswick for the greater part of their lives though both were involved overseas during WWI. Margaret went to Serbia as an orderly in a VAD hospital where she became a prisoner of war when the Austrians over-ran the country before being repatriated. Lucy worked in respite homes for shell-shock victims in Ireland and India. In Painswick Margaret worked on many committees, ran a physiotherapy clinic in Gloucester and was a local magistrate to name but a few of her activities. Lucy is remembered above all for founding the Painswick Players.

Carol Maxwell took us through a delightful and varied slide show taken from some of the 250 glass negative slides given to the society by the descendants of Edward Warmington Reed. The family had once owned and lived at Reeds Mill (now Painswick Mill). The slides, dating from around 1900-1920, were of the family, their own home and other houses in Painswick from the Edwardian period, along with their gardens and other magnificent views of Wells Cathedral, the Bournemouth area coastline, individual flowers and, a personal interest, clouds. Edward W Reed was an amateur photographer but his shots were truly of professional standard.

### **Jottings for April**

The weather warming, grass and corn growing fast for next winter's foodstuff for our animals, and this brings people out into the Countryside. When you are out and about with your children or grandchildren and an unknown dog comes up to the children, you grab the child for their protection: this is exactly what a cow does when you get between a cow and her baby calf, when you get too close.

Children play together, so when your dog runs up to a group of young cattle, they may think that we have a new playmate and start playing about. This upsets the owner, who then tries to retrieve the dog: a bad thing to do, just leave the dog. But if the dog comes running back to you, followed by the cattle before you get to safety you could be in trouble, so it's best to keep your dog under complete control when out in the fields at all times when near to any animals.

If cattle take a liking to your dog which is on a lead whilst you are out walking, let the dog go, it can usually run faster than you and get you out of trouble. The cattle are more likely to follow the dog. Cattle are like humans in many ways. Some are quiet and watch life go by, some are nervous and sometimes bullied, some bad tempered and uptight, and so on. If people are nervous around animals, they can pick this up and they will play on this fact. You may not think so but they can. You lose control of your animals, they will play on that fact and ruin your life.

We work with animals all the time, so we manage the situation as we come across it, even being aggressive with our voices to get them to do as we wish. Animals do not like groups of people shouting and calling out near them. Neither do they like people dressed in the modern brightly coloured plastic clothes that runners wear.

#### **Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign**

With the successful establishment of the Community Speed Watch team, a number of this team have also signed up to support the use of a new, yet old, tool as our disposal...

Many years ago Painswick Parish Council, in conjunction with Bisley, bought a mobile Vehicle Activated Sign which flashes up the speed of oncoming vehicles, advising them to slow down if they are exceeding the speed limit. This device has been fished out of storage, serviced by the manufacturers and is now up and running again! Thanks to the enthusiasm of the volunteers, this is now being used on rotation at various locations within Painswick as a further reminder to drivers to stick to the speed limit. Whilst it has an immediate impact on drivers, it is also being used to collect data to demonstrate the proportion of speeding traffic to the Police and County Council.

#### Be a "Pace" Car

Everyone can play a role in helping to reduce traffic speeds. All drivers can act as "pace cars" – if you are sticking to the speed limit so will the vehicles behind you. 

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# **Surgery News**

#### **Change of Personnel**

Nicola, our Practice Manager, will be leaving us at the end of April after 15 years' service. How time has flown!! She is relocating to Cornwall to run three surgeries there and I'm sure you will join us in wishing her well for her future.

Nicola is being replaced by Mike Mack-Smith who comes to us from Leeds (albeit with local family connections, so he knows the area well). Mike has a background in Primary Care and we are sure he will settle in nicely.

#### Are you a 'Carer'?

Do you provide help and support on a regular basis to a partner, child, relative, friend or neighbour? Is this person frail, have physical or mental illness, a disability or issues with substance misuse? Then you are a carer. As a carer, who cares for you? Taking on a caring role can cause physical, emotional and financial strains which can lead to many issues including illness, depression, isolation and money problems.

Three in five people will be carers at some point in their lives in the UK. Carers can be any age, male or female, and they can come from any culture or background.

If you think you might be a carer then let us know at the surgery – we can take your needs as a carer into account. Also, think about contacting "Carers Gloucestershire" or take a look at their website (www.carersgloucestershire.org.uk) - they are a charity that support the practical and emotional needs that arise from caring roles. They offer a diverse range of services and support and this is delivered by a team of fully trained and committed staff.

For example you might want to speak to Carers Gloucestershire about:

- The emergency scheme what happens if you are taken ill? How is the person you care for supported?
- Hospital admission and discharge
- 'Training' courses providing skills to support carers in their caring role
- Counselling services

#### Immunisations for your holidays abroad

Most immunisations that you may need for exotic destinations can be provided by the surgery free of charge. These would be such vaccinations such as Typhoid, Hepatitis A, Tetanus etc. We are a Registered Yellow Fever Centre and can provide this vaccine but unfortunately, Yellow Fever, together with Japanese B Encephalitis and Rabies vaccinations are currently not available on the NHS and so we have to charge patients for the cost of the vaccine itself. An outline of our charges can be found near the reception desk, but if you need more information, do please ask.

If you are going on holiday and think you may need some vaccinations, we do in the first instance ask patients to book a telephone consultation with the Practice Nurse. This is so the Nurse can discuss what immunisations you have had before and what you might need for this particular trip. There is also an excellent website which will give you a great deal of information - www.fitfortravel.co.uk - this includes vaccinations, malaria prophylaxis advice, information about healthy eating while abroad etc.

#### New legislation regarding driving when taking certain medications

There is new legislation in place from 2nd March 2015 which places limits on the amounts of certain drugs that you have in your blood stream whilst driving. There is a 'medical defence' for those who are taking medicines in line with GP advice, provided that their driving is not impaired. If your driving IS impaired through drugs, regardless of whether you are taking them legitimately, you may still be prosecuted.

Keep suitable evidence with you when driving to show that you are taking your medicine as prescribed and supplied by a doctor. An example would be your repeat prescription slip. Best advice: You MUST NOT drive if you feel sleepy, dizzy, are unable to concentrate or make decisions, have slowed thinking, or if you experience sight problems.

If the medicine is one that could affect your driving ability, you should NOT drive until you know how the medication affects you, particularly when starting a new medication or following a dose change.

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# **Painswick Music Concert**

### **Review of concert 28th March**

The first concert of the Painswick Music Society's 2015 season was given on 28th March by the international star Sarah Connolly with pianist Eugene Asti at St Mary's Church.

After five songs by Gustave Mahler, where she showed us her full range of expressive contrast, we were treated to a tour de force Schumann's tuneful Frauenlieben undleben cycle, the eight-part story of a woman's life from courtship to motherhood and finally widowhood: its range of emotions made us want to cheer her all the way! One of the great things about the Painswick Concerts is that they often are in effect master-classes for any aspiring musicians in the audience and this was no exception. Edge-of-seat stuff and we loved it.

The second half continued in like vein: two energetic songs by the little-known French composer Albert Roussel and then songs by Britten and the Gloucestershire composer Ivor Gurney, beautifully clear and tuneful. Then, finally, a complete change of mood with Sir Richard Rodney Bennett's "History of The Dansant" – an uproariously three-part take off of "jazz-music-you-can-dance-to", which brought the house down. We didn't want to let her and her sparking pianist, Eugene Asti go so they kindly gave us two encores, to a standing ovation.

### **Review of concert 11th April**

The Painswick Music Society's second concert of the season was given by the Carducci String Quartet on 11th April. We began with Haydn's Quartet in E flat No. 2. Just right for a warm-up and also a wake-up! Not for nothing is this one known as the "Joke". It began with a spirited attack in the first movement followed by some notable contrasts in the middle movements before the final movement which suddenly stops in mid-flight and takes a four bar rest. Four bars is a long time in string quartets and as some began to clap the music started again ... and again. Loud cheers as we reached the real end ... but we had been warned by the programme notes!

Then Shostakovich's 1964 quartet, No. 9, after a helpful talk from the quartet's Leader, Matthew Denton. Like much Sovietera music it was influenced by the whims of Russia's leaders who gave composers a chance not just of being sacked by their patrons but being locked up too. Tricky and it shows in the music which is almost impossible to describe on paper. Five movements run together, wild changes of mood, lots of over lapping and they gave it their all: Bright start, gloom in the second, an excited middle fortissimo, more gloom and last an overwhelming final movement with lots of pizzicato as the instruments sometimes seem to be playing four solos rather than a quartet. Breathtaking. They are performing all the Shostakovich quartets at the Cheltenham Festival. Give it a try ...

Lastly, Beethoven's Quartet in F, Op 18 No. 1. Right in our comfort zone. Loud and prolonged cheers!

# Painswick Singers do it again

I have sat in many a church on Good Friday over the years and heard all the familiar repertoire to assist me in my meditation upon the crucifixion. There is comfort in the familiar. This year, the Painswick Singers presented something less familiar, with works by Ariel Ramirez and Karl Jenkins.

The mood was set with the Kyrie from the Missa Criolla by Ramirez. This South American piece evokes a strong sense of the call for God's mercy and our English choir conveyed this with a conviction worthy of performers from Argentina. Strong choral rhythms were felt as the tenor voice of Adrian Bressington soared and floated above, pleading upwards to the calvary rood scene above the chancel arch.

Then came the Stabat Mater of Karl Jenkins and again my eye was driven upwards to the rood scene, with the sorrowful Mary standing at the side of her dying son. There is tremendous variety in this work which the Singers delivered with undoubted commitment and full blooded volume, in appealing to the Virgin in the Sancta Mater. Leading all of this were our two soloists, who lifted their hearts and their voices to the wide vocal and emotional range of Jenkins' demanding melodies; we were treated to classical aria and native wailing, all filled with deep emotion. Both singers committed themselves to this difficult task with musical energy and remarkable sensitivity. Jessie Pywell is well known to the choir and many of the audience, who will not have been disappointed in the professionalism she brought to this challenge. A special treat for us all was to witness the debut, as soloist, of Lucinda Harrison; she delivered the soprano solos with aplomb and I doubt that it would have been evident to anyone that she was not an experienced solo performer. The commitment and professionalism of all the singers was evident in the burst of applause at the close.





Paignton Zoo was started in 1923 by eccentric millionaire Herbert Whitley. In 1924 he closed it! Government was claiming entertainment tax. Herbert Whitley was adamant it was educational and, eventually, the Government relented and the Zoo re-opened. In 1964 the Charitable Trust was formed. The Committee and their sub-committees ensure all aspects are covered to orchestrate the smooth running of a large and successful as well as financially viable Zoo. The Zoo has its own Vet and specialists attend for eyes and teeth. Keith did mention that a lion who had a bad foot actually had acupuncture! (brave Acupuncturist!)

Paignton has earned Worldwide respect for conservational education, for its involvement with preservation and protection of Rhinos in Africa, for work related to reintroduction of wildlife into natural habitats such as our Cornish Choughs, water voles and dormice and is involved with animal breeding programmes and disease control around the World. It accepts animals seized by Customs & Excise and neglected ones via the RSPCA. Most Zoos look after their old animals once retired from the breeding programme and ensure they are cared for. Pat, the pensioner penguin aged 37, has a toy boy penguin aged 13. (Pat !!!?) Zoos have changed a lot over the years and Keith's passion for animal welfare, education, conservation and the continuity of all species on our ever-changing planet for generations to enjoy was very evident and also, most reassuring.



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### Our young people

#### Stephanie's contribution

Stephanie Poole has been working as a PSALMS intern since last August and she loves what she's doing. The benefits to the children and young people involved are so obvious it makes her role immensely satisfying.

Graduating from drama school in 2010 Stephanie spent the next few vears acting in various capacities though more latterly in film work. She was married in October to a PSALMS minister. Her internship



lasts for one year but she hopes to continue for three, probably in a voluntary capacity within the community using her passion for drama.

Although her internship is part-time (24 hours per week) it covers several areas. PSALMS started initially as a sport-based activity but quickly expanded to cover many other activities. Stephanie's strengths are obviously in the field of drama which she is passionate about and she has already set up and now runs a thriving drama group for years 5-7 (ages 10-12) in the Church Rooms on Thursdays from 5.30-6.30pm. One of the aims is to integrate children from that age group regardless of which school they attend. "It is an opportunity for them to explore ideas creatively," she says, and hopes to present a small-scale production in the summer. Gratifyingly, it is already very well supported by local volunteers and the school.

In Painswick Stephanie also helps to staff the lunch clubs running at the school this year – a simple format involving a range of activities including books, drama, games and crafts. She is responsible for the drama activities. She is involved with Messy Church after school once a month on Thursdays and attends staff meetings which are held in Painswick.

She is also engaged in activities further afield in the Stroud area and in particular talks about her mentoring role in Stonehouse. This often involves young people with complex and difficult lives. For her this is challenging but can be especially rewarding when she feels they gradually connect and begin to respond positively. Stephanie received mentoring training for this aspect of her work but even though relatively young herself she is surprisingly understanding, concerned and knowledgeable about the anguished state such young people have to contend with.

Stephanie regards her role as one which offers plenty of exciting opportunities to initiate creative projects to bring young people together in a safe, nurturing environment for a positive and developing experience. She believes in the sound principals of mutual respect and moral behaviour upon which PSALMS is based and sees it as a way towards ensuring a more connected and cohesive society in the future. This enthusiastic, sincere and very personable young woman is without doubt a great asset to Painswick's youth groups, and our children and young people are indeed lucky to have her working on their behalf. 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# Paul and the Rococo Garden

Painswick is so fortunate to have what is effectively a national gem on its doorstep – the Rococo Garden. Since the start of the massive project to reinstate it to its original glory in 1984 it has continually evolved into something very special and is indeed unique.

As garden director since 1988, Paul Moir has overseen all of the changes and developments in the garden and in the shop and restaurant. At the end of this year Paul intends to retire and the trustees are therefore looking for someone to replace him. His wife, Claire, who has been involved with running the restaurant for many years, will



also be leaving. They will still be living in Painswick.

With a degree in economics Paul had worked in sales and marketing, but, as he says, "I've always been an outdoor person," so when the job as garden director in the early stages of the restoration arose, he jumped at the opportunity. In the first few years he worked entirely in the garden, even planting the bushes for the maze himself, but as the charity grew the management aspects of the role became more demanding of his time. Now the role necessitates a wide range of managerial skills because the organisation has become quite complex.

The garden is now labour-intensive, requiring a team of skilled gardeners and volunteers. Paul has responsibility for managing this team plus the restaurant, the shop, the finances and all the projects which take place. Exhibitions, art classes, artists in residence and theatrical productions (the wonderful Handlebars are due back in July) continue to be accommodated in the grounds and buildings on a regular basis. The organisation is growing and developing all the time and Paul is at the heart of all the new initiatives. The new director will take on the challenge to develop the next stage of the garden's future. It is certainly not a stagnant job, with constant evolvement and new directions. It offers huge potential in a relatively small space. As Paul explains, the visiting public has higher expectations and demands nowadays and with social media and advanced technology the operation is now very sophisticated. Reputation must be without flaws for all parts of the business. Over the years Paul has done much to establish the superb reputation the Rococo enjoys in all respects.

Painswick Rococo Garden offers the visitor so much – horticultural significance, social, historical and cultural interest, art and performance, excellent food. As a centre of tourism it is a vital element of the local economy. The Garden Trustees will soon be advertising the post. This month I want to give you some very important information about "The Care Act 2014" which represents the biggest reformation of care and support in 60 years.



It is divided into three main parts. This means that some changes will have

been introduced in April 2015 and others in April 2016. In April 2015 the following was introduced: a new national level of care and support needs, making care and support more consistent across the country \*new support for carers\* deferred payment agreements for care costs

As part of the 2016 changes, there will also be more financial help for those who need it and people with modest means will benefit too. There will also be a new form of protection from unlimited care costs

The Act will put a limit on the amount those receiving care will have to pay towards the costs of their care, with a cap on care costs beginning in April 2016. No one will have to pay more than £72,000 towards the care element of the costs of meeting their eligible needs in their lifetime, and many people will pay much less. This applies to people funding their own care and support, as well as those helped by the council.

From April 2015, decisions made about the help you receive will consider your wellbeing and what is important to you and your family. All councils will use the same national level of care and support needs to assess what help they can give you. This may result in you being eligible for care and support, and will make it easier for you to plan for the future. It will also give everyone peace of mind that wherever you live in the country, or plan to move within England, if your needs meet the threshold you will be eligible for support.

Anyone receiving care and support will be informed how much it will cost to meet their needs and how much the council will contribute towards the cost. You will have more control over how that money is spent. Whatever your level of need, be it physical, mental or emotional, your council will be able to put you in touch with the right organisation to support your wellbeing and help you remain independent for longer.

Alongside the cap on care costs, extended financial support will ensure that more people are eligible for help with care and support costs. The council will assess your finances and may be able to offer extra help if you cannot afford to pay. Most people will still have to contribute something towards the cost of their care and support.

As part of the 2016 changes, the council will provide more financial help for those who need

it and people with modest means will benefit too. Currently, only people with less than £23,250 in assets and low incomes can get help with their care and support costs. The changes will mean that people with £118,000 worth of assets or less, could be eligible to receive financial support if they need to move to a care home.

From April 2015, changes to the way care and support is provided in England mean carers may be able to get more help so that they can carry on caring and look after their own wellbeing. From April 2015, all carers will be entitled to an assessment of their own needs, irrespective of whether the person they care for has eligible needs.

A carer's physical, mental and emotional wellbeing will be at the heart of the assessment, which could result in practical support such as respite care, a direct payment to spend on the things that make it a little easier to carry on caring, or information about local support groups.

From April 2015 deferred payment agreements will be available across the whole of England

A deferred payment agreement is an arrangement with the council enabling some people to use the value of their home to fund care home costs without having to sell their home in their lifetime. If you are eligible, the council will help to pay the care home bills on your behalf, and you can delay repaying them until you choose to sell your home, or until after your death.

A deferred payment agreement is only one way to pay for care. You can speak to a financial adviser or seek advice from an independent organisation to find out more about the options available to you.






### Gloucester's Historic Docks - With the Field Club




